Members of the Redistricting Commission,

Currently, House of Delegates District 14 runs from eastern Pittsylvania County, including the city of Danville, to eastern Henry County. Far too often, this area of the state is overlooked, and I fear this is happening again with the proposed maps by both sets of consultants. Consultants should consider drawing a House of Delegates district that includes both Martinsville and Danville.

Martinsville and Danville are connected via Route 58, share SOVA Health's hospital system, and are the region's economic hubs outside of Lynchburg, Roanoke, and Greensboro, NC. Martinsville and Danville represent an area of that state that has suffered significantly from economic and population decline since the textile and tobacco industries became unsustainable. Now, as both cities pivot towards an economy with an emphasis on technology and manufacturing, Martinsville faces the incredibly difficult task of reverting from an independent city to a town. Since 1995, three independent cities, including our neighbor South Boston, have reverted to towns. Though these reversions have been successful in the long term, I feel as though it's important to anchor Martinsville to Danville with a single delegate, to ensure economic stability and growth going forward.

These two cities also have similar racial demographics, including a large minority population. According to statistics provided by the US 2020 Census, Martinsville has a 'Black alone or in combination' population of 48.2%. Danville has a 'Black alone or in combination' population of 53.4%. I was able to create an example district that was 48.91% minority and 51.09% White. Though this does not constitute a minority-majority district, it would ensure that minorities would be able to elect a delegate of their choosing. The Readjuster Party, a biracial coalition that formed following the Reconstruction Era, had significant success in Virginia. Danville was able to elect a majority Black council and hired an integrated police force due to expanded voting access from actions taken by the Readjuster Party. Martinsville has two minority city council members while Danville has five. Historical legacy and current racial demographics must be factors in drawing a district that gives a voice to residents of the Southside.

Finally, these two cities share similar voting patterns. I won't go into too much detail here as it is obvious with national polarization that urban areas tend to vote for the Democratic Party while rural areas tend to vote for the Republican party. For the 2020 Presidential Election, Martinsville and Danville voted roughly 61% for Biden to 39% for Trump. State and Federal elections mirror these numbers.

I am concerned by the lack of engagement from residents in this area. My fear is that as this commission scrambles to complete its maps in the coming days, residents of Martinsville and Danville will be ignored at the expense of districts in Hampton Roads, Richmond, and Northern Virginia. A consolidated map that is hastily submitted on a weekend and hashed out early on a single weekday morning will not ensure fair maps for all residents.



District 36, by including Essex County with the Northern Neck peninsula, takes into account nearest medical, judicial, airport, and other services to many NN residents. Three major highways, Hwy 17, Hwy 3, and 360 are intersected at Warsaw and seven miles apart at Tappahannock by the 360 bridge across the Rappahannock River. 360 is the most direct route to Richmond. Essex County makes sense as part of District 36.

Without regard to party or other mitigating factors, I posted the above comment on HOD B3: All the proposed HOD district and the Senate district maps happily cover all counties of the entire Northern Neck peninsula. Thank you for making whole counties a first priority.

The unique nature of the Chesapeake Bay Estuary means we should especially consider the few bridges that exist in the Tidewater area. The Highway 50 bridge and The Bay Bridge/Tunnel connect the Eastern Peninsula. Residents of the Northern Neck and Middle Neck peninsulas generally use two major parallel routes to travel by road: Highway 3 and Highway 17, which are separated by the Rappahannock River.

Along with the bridge across the Rappahannock at Tappahannock, which connects Richmond County to Essex County:

The Highway 3 bridge across from the White Stone area in Lancaster County to the Saluda area in Middlesex County connects to highway 17. The 301 bridge across the northern part of the peninsulas connects to Richmond and to Maryland via the Nice Bridge across the Potomac.

The highway 17 corridor includes Essex County and Middlesex County in the Middle Peninsula. Please include Essex County and Middlesex County in HOD and Senate proposed districts.





Furthermore, I want to commend counsel for agreeing to the memorandum "Directions to Mapdrawers on Political Subdivisions, Political Neutrality, and Communities of Interest." Adopting these instructions seems to be a smart way to take the Virginia Redistricting process in the right direction in terms of ensuring that voters are choosing their elected leaders rather than elected leaders choosing their voters.

Although I doubt that these instructions were intended to be binding on citizen redistricting participants, I can confirm that, to the best of my knowledge, this map complies with the Commission's directions to map drawers (i.e., I believe this map avoids unnecessary divisions of existing political subdivisions, I did not consider political data, including election results or incumbent addresses, while drawing this map, and I sought to use the broad definition of "community of interest" set forth in the Virginia Code).

#### **Dear Commissioners:**

Thank you for taking on a very difficult task and for considering input from various points of view. I write to seek the preservation of the Franconia/Kingstowne part of Lee District in the same delegate district. One initial plan released for Fairfax County would divide the heart of a district I have represented for almost 18 years. I fully understand that my boundary preferences should not be your consideration but I think the following input is valuable regarding the geography and existing communities of interest. I assure you that I share your objective to keep communities together to the maximum extent practicable consistent with the Voting Rights Act and to end the partisan-advantage abuses that have occurred over the decades.

To be clear about what I say below, I will likely run for re-election in a new district that contains all or part of Greater Franconia. I realize that in doing your job, you will necessarily deny *some* voters the ability to vote for incumbents they <u>would rather have represent them</u>. While that cannot be avoided, it can be reduced by fixing obviously partisan gerrymandered districts but not otherwise upsetting communities that have been happily drawn together. (Why is the North Arlington border sacrosanct when it is impossible for any visitor to even know they have passed into Fairfax County? For the churchgoers in this affluent area of Northern Virginia, worshipers often cross the county boundary, both ways, to attend the Episcopal Church of their choice!) While your product should not continue partisan excesses of the past decade, your handiwork is important to constituents as well as to future constituents who currently like their representatives. Therefore, I urge you to think in terms of correcting partisan gerrymandering (cracking and packing) and avoid making change for change's sake.

A second point to consider: legislatures are organized by seniority. That fact does not change with more sensical districts in someone's estimation. If a voter is now served by a senior member, the Commission's actions on this new plan determines whether the senior member is taken *from* a voter and the voter's community. In the case of a "new 43rd," one map includes five precincts sliced off the district of the <u>longest serving woman in General Assembly history</u>, and, combined with other unnecessary changes, would, as a practical matter, end her service.

That was not a hoped for result of voters at the polls last November. Her constituents want to send her back as Chair of the Finance Committee overseeing tax policy for the Commonwealth. Why do this? It looks like change for change's sake.

In 2011, the previously roundish 43rd Delegate District was re-drafted into an even more Democratic-leaning district in elongated form extending deeper into Lorton and the Mt. Vernon magisterial district. The 43rd received 25 percent new voters despite growing at the Commonwealth's growth rate—i.e., considered in isolation, no boundary changes were necessary. Even with 25 percent new, however, the heart of the district remained in Greater Franconia/Kingstowne, and mostly in the Lee magisterial district. Greater Franconia has been in the 43rd district since it was created by the new single-member districts drawn in the early 1980s. Until, possibly, now.

Lee District is made of up three larger "communities of interest" plus a very large HOA Kingstowne having 5,400 homes. The three parts:

'First, Central Springfield, Mostly West of I-95 and all in 22150, Second, Greater Franconia including the large Kingstowne HOA and, Third, the Richmond Highway Corridor

While one draft plan largely keeps Greater Franconia and Kingstowne together, the other plan splits Greater Franconia and the Edison HS pyramid by carving out Bush Hill, Clermont, Rose Hill, Virginia Hills, Cameron, Mt Eagle, and Huntington precincts. Huntington, where I live, has a North Kings Highway/Richmond Highway orientation, but Huntington area students go to Edison HS in the heart of Franconia. Further, by splitting off Rose Hill, the current 43rd district also loses one of the four Kingstowne HOA precincts. Please do not divide these Greater Franconia communities from Van Dorn, Lane, Island Creek, Franconia, Kingstowne, and Villages, for no meaningful reason while dismembering the district of Virginia's most senior woman legislator in doing so.

In another draft, as noted above, map drawers decided to make the North Arlington County line THE sacrosanct boundary. Hence, the "new 48<sup>th"</sup> population distribution pushes the adjoining districts south through the County, and then through Alexandria City. The 45<sup>th</sup> loses Arlington's Shirlington area. And by losing Arlington, the 45<sup>th</sup> is moved further south into Huntington (instead of Belle View). None of these unnecessary changes makes these districts any more or less competitive from a partisan or minority influence point of view. It is simply change. But at least Arlington is not connected to Fairfax in the North!

I want to note that nothing I have said here should be interpreted as wanting the Commission to jettison ANY of the current 43rd District. I have enjoyed working for citizens in South Lorton for these last 10 years, for example, and would be personally happy if the Commission changed nothing. But incumbents should not be drawing their own districts. Best

of luck to you as you try to solve this Rubik's cube and thank you for keeping communities of interest together to the maximum extent practicable in concert with your important obligations under the Voting Rights Act.

On behalf of citizens and constituents in the middle of Lee District, Greater Franconia, and the Kingstowne HOA, please keep this community of interest together in the "new 43rd."

Below are the public comments I made at your 9-15 meeting. The second part of those comments address the "competing" definitions of compactness referenced in legal counsel's legal primer on the VRA. Is it possible that legal counsel will be able to address the question on those definitions that I pose below? Thanks Pete Costigan

Comments to Redistricting Commission, 9-15-21

Good morning,

My name is Pete Costigan and I live in Ruckersville, Va. in Greene County

This morning I'd like to make one suggestion regarding the district maps presented for the Commission's consideration. I'd also like to pose one question regarding the "compactness" section of legal counsel's memo entitled the Voting Rights Act Legal Primer which the Commission and legal counsel discussed during the Sept 13<sup>th</sup> meeting.

My one suggestion regarding draft district maps to be presented at the Sept 20<sup>th</sup> meeting is that they include state roads. Public comment to date on communities of interest suggests that state roads often serve – or could and should serve - as boundaries for such communities. Having those roads designated on the draft maps would be helpful both to the Commission and the public as they review the draft maps. The inclusion of state roads on the draft maps might also help citizen propose their own ideas for a community of interest in a given district. Finally, since the maps being considered will be of the entire Commonwealth rather than regions, I assume the map drawers will have the ability to zoom in on any district under discussion.

Now to my question regarding the definition of compactness. The compactness section of legal counsel's 11-page Primer on the Voting Rights Act begins at the top of page six an ends midway through page seven. I found this section quite informative and thought provoking - in particular, the second full paragraph on page six which begins, "For some time, there have been two competing definitions of compactness." That paragraph goes on to define a district's compactness as its shape on the map. The smoother a district's border and the more its shape resembles a square or a circle rather than a spider or a string bean, the more it's likely to be deemed compact by those who espouse this definition.

The next paragraph defines compactness in more functional terms. Those who espouse this definition want legislators to be able to explain the boundaries of their districts in simple, commonsense terms. The memo goes on to say that, under this functional definition, the guestion is not whether the district is aesthetically pleasing when viewed on a map, but whether it makes sense to the person on the street.

In my view both definitions make sense and both support the objective of fair maps. However, I return to the sentence I quoted a minute ago: "For some time, there have been two competing definitions of compactness." I'm possibly too hung up on the authors' use of the adjective "competing" in this sentence but that word does make me question if each definition's adherents and especially the courts – see those definitions as mutually exclusive? In other words, compact maps can reflect one definition or the other but not both. I hope legal counsel can assure us all that these definitions need not be mutually exclusive in practice. In fact, I hope the map drawers, the Commissioners and citizens who submit and react to draft maps will see evidence of both definitions of compactness in the maps of all of Virginia's districts.

As always, I thank the Commission and DLS for the efforts you continue to make in your difficult and historic task. Pete Costigan

I want to call your attention to an almost "difficult to believe" criteria in the commission guidance for population equality in drawing congressional districts. Hopefully it is a typo, but regardless, it urgently needs to be addressed.

The 2021 Redistricting Guidelines and Criteria state the following under 1-d:

"d. Commission guidance:

- i. Each legislative district should be drawn to be as equal as practicable, with total population variances minimized, with a target of no more than plus or minus 2%, while considering the other principles listed below.
- ii. Each congressional district shall be drawn with a total population of plus or minus one person from the ideal district size. (emphasis added)"

I hope you meant to say one "percent", not one "person". If not, this criteria would would require the commission to split precincts and actually choose individual households in drawing congressional boundaries. It would certainly wreck havoc with keeping counties and communities of interest together.

I hope this is helpful feedback. Good luck with your important work.

Dear Members of the Virginia Redistricting Commission,

I am providing comments to the published preliminary redistricting maps for the Columbia Pike (R244) corridor in Arlington, Virginia (Zip-code 22204). I do this as a resident and active community member in this corridor since 2006 and as the former Executive Director of the Columbia Pike Revitalization Organization (www.columbiapike.org) from 2009-2016.

The published preliminary maps show Columbia Pike as the dividing boundary between a northern and a southern future district. Such division ignores the fact that Columbia Pike is, in reality, the historic and current central axis of Arlington's most culturally, socially and economically diverse community, the geographic extend of which is mostly congruent with ZIP code 22204. This community has all the characteristics of a "Community of Interest" as defined by Virginia Code and therefore it is important that it is included in one voting district and not divided in two or three as currently proposed.

Columbia Pike is Arlington's oldest main street (chartered by Congress in 1810). With its surrounding neighborhoods it forms a major South Arlington corridor. The arrival of a new federal workforce during the New Deal era and the construction of the Pentagon in 1941 were catalysts for vigorous urban growth along both sides of the Pike. Significant "Garden Apartment" complexes (a typical legacy multifamily housing type in Arlington) were constructed on both sides of the arterial street along with the corresponding neighborhood commercial areas. Still today, Columbia Pike ranks among the 2 or 3 highest ridership bus-transit corridors in the Commonwealth. The combination of available and affordable workforce housing, good transit, schools and other services attracted immigrant communities that began to arrive in the region. Columbia Pike soon became what the Brookings foundation described as "World in a Zip-Code", Northern Virginia's most diverse, multicultural neighborhood.

There are more than 85 languages spoken in Elementary Schools along Columbia Pike. Among others, we have vibrant Latinx, Ethiopian, Mongolian and Middle-Eastern communities rooted on both sides of the Pike. Dividing them politically will be detrimental to their community cohesion.

The unique Columbia Pike Documentary Project has been documenting these communities for 25 years. There is a current photographic exhibit at the Virginia Library in Richmond, documenting our community along the Pike.

Arlington County has planned Columbia Pike always as one district, especially since the late 1990s when the County Board adopted the "Columbia Pike Initiative" with the goal of revitalizing the corridor. As a citizen and, later, as the <u>Executive Director of the Columbia Pike Revitalization Organization</u> I was deeply involved with the multiyear community-lead planning efforts. In 2012, the Columbia Pike Neighborhoods Plan received the Benjamin Banneker Award for Outstanding Social Commitment and Community. As a member of the Committee that co-authored this plan I firmly believe that the proposed political division will be detrimental to the revitalization efforts of our community.

On Columbia Pike, we are one, very tightly knit set of neighborhoods. We face significant common challenges. We are much more diverse and less wealthy than Arlington neighborhoods north of Arlington Blvd (R50). We have experienced disinvestment and lagged economically behind the rest of the County. We are the last in line to see investment in schools, public infrastructure, facilities and services. Columbia Pike is still the largest repository of affordable housing in Arlington and home to a disproportionately high share of moderate and low-income residents.

The existence of long-standing community-institutions like the Pike-Presidents-Group (which is the standing conference of all Civic Association Presidents along the Pike) and the Columbia Pike Revitalization Organization is a testimony to the fact that we have to stand and advocate for our community interests as one community.

We should be therefore represented as ONE district in the General Assembly.

We have worked hard for #Fair maps for many, many years, including helping to pass the Constitutional Amendment in November. Our position is that we want and need fair maps for the benefit of the voters of Virginia. Virginians want to elect representatives of their choice.

The biggest improvement in the process, we believe, is transparency – we are watching and listening to all your discussions and votes with great interest. Pouring sunshine into the process is important. We ask you to be wary of going around FOIA and transparency by allowing any decisions to be made behind closed doors.

Also, we fully support the establishment of other criteria for maps, especially the respect for Communities of Interest(COI) and the rights of ethnic, racial, and language minorities "to elect representatives of their choice".

Although we would have preferred a nonpartisan, all-citizen commission, we are hopeful that all of you on this commission, being balanced and bipartisan, will work for the benefit of all Virginians.

We hope that you are listening to the voices of the people. We hope that you are reading all of the comments – nearly 400 written comments submitted by email, over 125 in the newest portal, (more than 3/4 of those submitted in the past 10 days). League members have read all comments and note that a few threads have been woven throughout the meetings and hearings. We've heard loudly and clearly that people want their communities kept together rather than split into 2 or more districts unnecessarily. Reunite them into one cohesive community.

Secondly, another thread is that not one person who has submitted testimony has advised the Commissioners to begin with existing maps. Virginians do not want this to happen. Thank you to those of you who put aside partisanship today with your vote.

These messages are from the people of Virginia. Hear their voices. Do what's right for the people, not what's right for the Ds or the Rs, not what's right for partisan interests. What's fair for the people, not for politicians.

You are concerned with "landing this plane" and maps getting approval from members of the General Assembly. You might land the plane, but if the politicians are in the pilot seats and the cabin door is locked, you may not have the approval of the voters sitting in the passenger cabin. We hope that you will keep this in mind: draw maps that the residents of this Commonwealth will approve. You should work for us. And The League is here to work alongside with you.

The maps that have been reviewed thus far by both the Republican and Democratic consultants demonstrate a serious risk to the Latino community in the Commonwealth. In the strongest possible terms, I encourage the commission to alter any final result to bring greater equity to bear.

Specifically, the current maps draw the only two elected Latinos \*in the entire Commonwealth\* out of their districts. While some may argue that doing so still creates majority-minority Latino districts, there is \*no quarantee\* that Latinos will win in those districts. Indeed, it is more likely that they will not: Latinos are a historically disenfranchised voting group with nearly \*zero\* presence at any level of civil service in state government, the lowest voter turnout rates, and the highest poverty rates in the Commonwealth.

If the VRC approves maps that make it difficult for the only two legislators in Virginia's history who are Latino to compete in elections there would be a significant disadvantage to the Latino community in the Commonwealth that now numbers over 850,000 or 10.5% of the population. The seniority these two legislators have represents the only political currency of any kind in the General Assembly and it is unthinkable that good governance and equal representation would benefit if they were forced to compete under the maps as currently drawn.

Furthermore, this may be a legal issue. If adopted as the consultants drew them, it could (and likely will) be argued that the maps are creating multiple Voting Rights Act violations. Several state and national Latino organizations are discussing legal strategies to that effect and will be commenting publicly to the VRC in the coming days and weeks. As Chair of the Virginia Latino Advisory Board I ask that you not interpret this as anecdote; there are serious conversations taking place that will emerge as legal challenges if greater attention is not given to retaining what little representative power Latinos have in Virginia.

Thank you all for your hard work on this complex task and for the opportunity to participate

I am in general agreement with the changes to the map development and review schedule posted by the co-chairs Harris and Babichenko on the VRC website this weekend. I am, however, concerned about several issues.

First, fewer than 24 hours before Monday's Commission meeting, no materials have been provided to the public which explain the "additional specifics to current guidance" to the map drawers being considered. Thus the public is not able to review these materials and provide meaningful public comment prior to the meeting. The Commission is not fulfilling the promise of providing a transparent process when it fails to provide relevant information to the public, particularly regarding agenda items for Commission meetings.

Second, while it may be helpful to provide more guidance to the map drawers, a more significant issue remains, that being how to reconcile the two sets of maps drawn by the Democratic and Republican teams. As can be seen by reviewing the A2 and B2 NOVA maps, each team has taken a completely different approach to drawing the maps in the counties beyond Fairfax. These differences cannot be resolved easily by making adjustments to one or the other map. Also, Citizens I talked with are completely confused as to why there are A and B maps and two versions of each, as the website has no explanation of the various maps. This problem will become much worse if you proceed with drawing two set of statewide maps for each chamber. I therefore urge you to direct the map drawing teams to work together and produce a single draft statewide map for each chamber. Only in this way will the Commission and the public have a single starting point to review the draft maps.

Third, the website needs to be updated to provide a schedule of key events and milestones in addition to just the list of meeting and hearing dates now provided. This issue was discussed at the last Commission meeting where it was noted that the website contains only a list of upcoming meetings and hearings, but no indication of when the Commission intends to submit maps to the Legislature. I urge the Co-chairs to outline the schedule of events and milestones for the next four weeks at Monday's meeting and direct the staff to update the website to provide the public with a more complete schedule.

Thank you for the opportunity to add comments for your consideration and for the official record. I'm impressed that your mapping consultants are off to a good start, and the Commission Co-Chairs are effectively leading the deliberations.

I hope you can assure that the same sorting capabilities that are developed for the Commission's use in locating & organizing official comments will also be available for the public to use as well.

Second, adding "tags" later for the sorting/organization of comments is a bad idea, one that may be extremely confusing, if they wouldn't be applicable to all comments, including those submitted earlier. Give your Staff time to propose the "tags," these aren't the critical path milestone yet. Clearly, some tags could include several related topics (e.g., comments that reference incumbents and those that refer to gerrymandering.

Third, I applaud your attention to the Commission deliberations and hope that you will overtly avoid using your cell phones during the Commission's mapping deliberations because, otherwise, it could easily appear to The Public that you are getting secret instructions from unidentified advocates by phone in the middle of the meeting. The apparent integrity of this Commission deliberation will set an historical standard for future Commissions to meet/exceed, and I urge you to set the highest standard possible.

Finally, and most important, I am grateful for the comments offered by Delegates Simon and Barker concerning the implications that the "start from scratch" approach may have for incumbent legislators. I can understand and appreciate their concerns, and I'm very grateful for their speaking out about the interests of the legislators who will be asked to approve the maps recommended by the Commission, but I object to those incumbent concerns being considered in the Commission's mapping efforts.

My prayer is that you Commissioners, every one of you, are wise enough to understand and accept that protecting incumbents, even the very best, is not an appropriate consideration for the Commission in serving the interests of We the People. There are a few flaws in the new Constitutional amendment that you are working to implement, but nothing will diminish the apparent integrity of this new approach as much as any appearance that outside influencers might have a role in your recommendations to the General Assembly.

Members of the Virginia Redistricting Commission,

I submitted a request to provide virtual public comments on September 13. Unfortunately, because public comments are taken at the end of the meeting, rather than at the beginning, and because I have scheduling conflicts later that afternoon, I must withdraw my request to provide such comments.

Instead, I would like to share my thoughts in writing.

First, I am optimistic about this process. I have looked at the initial proposals and they all seem to show that there is a good faith effort taking place to come up with districts that are fair, that meet the constitutional requirements for Virginia legislative districts, and that would ensure that the Virginia General Assembly is a legitimate representative lawmaking body rather than something engineered to be a partisan organ carrying only the façade of democracy. Please make sure that you continue to act in good faith and that you carry out your duty successfully. I'm sure none of you want this commission to fail and for the Supreme Court of Virginia to have to step in, which would lead to more uncertainty and less transparency.

Second, I want to draw attention to a small, but meaningful bit of seemingly arbitrary border drawing evident in the current Virginia Senate districts (map 22), the A-line of proposed Senate districts (maps 36 and 62), and Senator Barker's proposal for Senate districts (map 60). The border I find upsetting is evident in, for example, map 62, just south of Tysons between districts 6 and 4 in the area between Chain Bridge Road, Leesburg Pike, and I-495.

In this region, district 6 extends down rather arbitrarily, cutting through neighborhoods with no apparent reasoning. I have been trying to make sense of this particular border and the best I can come up with is that it may have been influenced by an old (early 2000's) census designation for Tyson's Corner. If so, then this border is based on an obsolete understanding of these neighborhoods and it needs to be revised in future proposals to ensure that close-knit communities of interest are not arbitrarily split.

At this point, I can think of two reasonable options for borders in this region. One option would be to follow the borders shown on map 1 (page 2) of the 2017 Edition of the Comprehensive Plan for the Tysons Corner Urban Center. https://www.fairfaxcounty.gov/tysons/sites/tysons/files/assets/documents/pdf/comprehensive plan/fc\_comp\_plan2017ed\_tysons\_amended04\_04\_2017.pdf. This would be a good option as keeping the Tysons Corner Urban Center together as a community of interest makes a lot of sense.

The second option would be to extend the border of district 6 in this region to go all the way out to Chain Bridge Road, Leesburg Pike, and I-495. This is not as ideal as following the borders for the Tysons Corner Urban Center. But it would seem to be less arbitrary than what is evident in the current and proposed maps identified above.

I really do appreciate the time and effort that is going into the redistricting process. And I appreciate that the public has a meaningful opportunity to participate in this process, including identifying potential communities of interest, questioning unusual borders, and challenging potentially outdated assumptions.

Thank you all for your hard work. I look forward to seeing this process as it continues to unfold.






## Apportion SD senate districts in 'Nesting' congressional district CDs

The nested DD delegate districts in each congressional district CD can be apportioned in a nearly 'nested' fashion into SD senate districts.

In ten (10) apportioning steps allocating previously nested DD delegate districts within each congressional district CD, two-and-a-half (2.5) DDs can be drawn for each SD senate district (with the <u>only</u> exception the first small CD with ten small DDs which is insufficient to populate four small SDs alone).

Recall from the previous post: an <u>average</u> congressional district = 9 <u>average</u> DDs + 1 <u>average</u> DD = 10 DDs (= $\underline{2.5}$  +  $\underline{2.5}$  +  $\underline{2.5}$  +  $\underline{2.5}$  DDs) = 4 <u>average</u> SDs

#### Assume A:

The 1<sup>st</sup>-drawn CD in Northern Virginia should have a small population (average-2%=760,480) uniquely with 10 smallest DDs (ave.-2%=76,048). When one average DD is apportioned from the 2<sup>nd</sup>-drawn CD in NOVA, the total population of those unique 11 DDs equals the minimum population for 4.04 small SDs, leaving an additional margin beyond the nesting scheme range in population (4% v. 5% by law) for district boundary smoothing to four compact SDs of 209,135+ each in this unique SD districting case statewide.

<u>Note</u>: The delegate district apportionment is a mechanical procedure unrelated to naming them. Thus, the "inside-the-beltway" congressional district to be VA-08, and the two adjacent congressional districts, one CD north of US-50 to be VA-10, and one CD south of US-50 to be VA-11, so as to maintain their current numbering orientation, allowing for the 19<sup>th</sup> century's "Fighting Ninth" southwestern congressional district to be given VA-09, its traditional number that has been assigned there uninterrupted in previous redistricting.

#### <u>Assume B</u>:

Each congressional district chosen in sequence is adjacent to the previously apportioned congressional district.

#### Assume C:

The population hub(s) in each congressional district have their largest portion(s) in senate districts that do NOT straddle two or more congressional districts; only the lower density 'spoke' localities will be drawn into a 'straddling' senate district, while NO delegate district will straddle two or more congressional districts.

- Step #1. The small  $1^{st}$  CD mapped for SDs: VA-08 = 10 small DDs + 1 ave. DD (CD:  $2^{nd}$ ) = 4 SDs (SD:  $1^{st}$ ,  $2^{nd}$ ,  $3^{rd}$ ,  $4^{th}$ );
- Step #2. Next  $\underline{9}$  DDs (CD:  $2^{\text{nd}}$ ) + 1 DD (CD:  $3^{\text{rd}}$ ) = 10 DDs = 4 SDs (SD:  $5^{\text{th}}$ ,  $6^{\text{th}}$ ,  $7^{\text{th}}$ ,  $8^{\text{th}}$ ); (9-1=8)
- Step #3. Next  $\underline{8}$  DDs (CD  $3^{rd}$ ) + 2 DD (CD:  $4^{rd}$ ) = 10 DDs = 4 SDs (SD:  $9^{th}$ ,  $10^{th}$ ,  $11^{th}$ ,  $12^{th}$ ); (9-2=7)
- Step #4. Next 7 DDs (CD  $4^{th}$ ) + 3 DD (CD  $5^{th}$ ) = 10 DDs = 4 SDs (SD:  $13^{th}$ ,  $14^{th}$ ,  $15^{th}$ ,  $16^{th}$ ); (9-3=6)
- Step #5. Next  $\underline{6}$  DDs (CD 5<sup>th</sup>) + 4 DDs (CD 6<sup>th</sup>) = 10 DDs = 4 SDs (SD: 17<sup>th</sup>, 18<sup>th</sup>, 19<sup>th</sup>, 20<sup>th</sup>); (9-4=5)
- Step #6. Next  $\underline{5}$  DDs (CD  $6^{th}$ ) + 5 DDs (CD  $7^{th}$ ) = 10 DDs = 4 SDs (SD:  $21^{th}$ ,  $22^{th}$ ,  $23^{th}$ ,  $24^{th}$ ); (9-5=4)
- Step #7. Next  $\underline{4}$  DDs (CD  $7^{th}$ ) + 6 DDs (CD  $8^{th}$ ) = 10 DDs = 4 SDs (SD:  $25^{th}$ ,  $26^{th}$ ,  $27^{th}$ ,  $28^{th}$ ); (9-6=3)
- Step #8. Next  $\underline{3}$  DDs (CD  $8^{th}$ ) + 7 DDs (CD  $9^{th}$ ) = 10 DDs = 4 SDs (SD:  $29^{th}$ ,  $30^{th}$ ,  $31^{th}$ ,  $32^{th}$ ); (9-7=2)
- Step #9. Next  $\underline{2}$  DDs (CD 9<sup>th</sup>) + 8 DDs (CD 10<sup>th</sup>) = 10 DDs = 4 SDs (SD: 33<sup>th</sup>, 34<sup>th</sup>, 35<sup>th</sup>, 36<sup>th</sup>); (9-8=1)
- Step #10. Next  $\underline{1}$  DDs (CD  $10^{th}$ ) + 9 DDs (CD  $11^{th}$ ) = 10 DDs = 4 SDs (SD:  $37^{th}$ ,  $38^{th}$ ,  $39^{th}$ ,  $40^{th}$ ); (9-9=0, there are no [zero] DDs unaccounted for in the apportionment into 'nested' SDs.)

#### Dear Commissioners:

I have been observing the meetings of the Virginia Redistricting Commission and the release of the partial redistricting maps prepared by the map drawers. To date, these partial redistricting maps have been released on the day of or the day before the actual meetings, which restricts the ability of the public and others to review them and prepare comments and input for the Commission to consider. Were the Commission to vote now on these partial maps, it would do so without having given the public a meaningful opportunity to comment.

In addition, voting on subparts of the map necessarily distorts the process of drawing an entire map. Each partial map of course impacts the partial map adjacent to it, and it is impossible to intelligibly approve or reject a partial map without seeing it in context. Moreover, the redistricting criteria approved by the General Assembly includes criteria that require reviewing the map as a whole. When reviewing a partial map it is impossible, for example, to determine compliance with criteria #8, which states that "A map of districts shall not, when considered on a statewide basis, unduly favor or disfavor any political party." Again, the public cannot review a map's compliance without having the entire map before it and the apparent imminent action of the Commission to vote on these maps in this manner lacks both transparency and the opportunity to view a viable, legal map taken as a whole.

Therefore, on behalf of the House Republican Caucus, I request that the Commission not approve or adopt any partial map or partial maps.



On average, in each "nesting scheme" CD there will be 9.1 DDs.

It turns out, that 99 of 100 DDs can be nested with 10 CDs comprised of 9 DDs each, and only 1 small CD = 10 small DDs (see calculations graphed below).

**Assumption:** Northern Virginia will have the largest population growth over the 2020 – 2030 decade, so of the eleven congressional districts, one CD in Northern Virginia should have the smallest 2020 census congressional district with 10 of the smallest delegate districts.

Every 1 CD + 1 DD = 10 DDs = 4 SDs (except 1 smallest CD = 10 smallest DDs, see bold above) calculation graphed:

- **I.** Four (4) redistricting guides as provided by law and good public policy:
- GUIDE #1: Draw districts compact and contiguous.
- GUIDE #2: Draw districts "equal" in population, where

"equal" is by law a range of 5%, or smallest (average - 2.5%) to largest (average + 2.5%)

- \* in the DRAFT "Nesting Scheme" examples, use a range of +/- 2.0%: smallest CD = 760,480 & smallest DD = 76,048.
- GUIDE #3: Draw districts by "communities of interest": by policy aggregate "communities of interest" by how the citizens reside in elementary PK-5 school zones, whether those "communities of interest" are found by aggregating like cultural & social, commercial & economic, or geographic & historical settlement population characteristics.
- GUIDE #4: Draw districts to clarify and unify neighborhood communities represented in each district: (a) respect locality boundaries wherever possible and (b) nest smaller districts within larger, so that
- (i) most neighborhoods attending the same PK-5 schools are within the same delegate, state senate & congressional district.
- (ii) most living in the densest settlements are within the same delegate, state senate & congressional district, and
- (iii) <u>most residents in their neighborhoods within the largest population localities</u>, reside within the same nested delegate, state senate, and congressional district, even when the very largest localities must be apportioned to draw districts of <u>equal</u> populations.
- **II.** <u>Assumption for applying redistricting guidelines</u>: In a <u>democratic</u> republic, the voting people in their in their <u>political</u> <u>communities</u> are themselves a "community of interest",
- NOT as self-interested organizations for self-serving partisan interests,
- but AS NEIGHBORS in a common social contract that they enter into by geographic proximity within districts that are:
- (i) contiguous (as resolved by the 1842 Jacksonian Democrats in Congress),
- (ii) in compact (as resolved by the 1872 Lincoln-Republicans in Congress), and
- (iii) of <u>equal population</u> (as resolved by the 1911 <u>Progressives</u> in Congress [in a coalition of Teddy Roosevelt-Republicans & Grover Cleveland-Democrats]).
- **III.** Using the "Nesting Schema" as proposed, all <u>delegate districts</u> will be nested entirely within a <u>congressional district</u> (9 per district for 10 districts, the smallest CD with 10 smallest DDs). That will leave generally only 1-2 delegate districts in each congressional district apportioned into a senate district straddling two <u>adjacent</u> congressional districts.
- HOWEVER, those delegate districts in senate districts within two congressional districts will intentionally be drawn within the same economic-residential SMA (Standard Metropolitan Area) in each case, so as to provide a continuous economic, commercial and commuting "community of interest" for those residing in neighborhoods of the same PK-5 school zones whenever the "straddling" senate district is drawn.

The B2 NOVA HOD 9-8-2021 draft includes a map labeled #18 that is inconsistent with the concept of "Community of Interest". I ask that draft maps be reconsidered in such a way that Reston is not divided between multiple House of Delegates districts.

As Chair of the Fairfax County Redistricting Advisory Committee, I and the other commissioners are closely following the Community of Interest concept in order to maintain historical neighborhoods and communities that traditionally share commonalities. Reston is one such area.

This is not simply a conceptual designation. The Fairfax County Board of Supervisors explicitly considers Reston as a community that should not be divided when undertaking the magisterial district reapportionment process. Logic follows that equal representation and provision of services for General Assembly reapportionment should align with this.

SUBJECT: First Drafts of Maps

At the September 2 meeting of the Redistricting Commission I expressed opposition to maps for State Senate seats in the Alexandria-Arlington-Fairfax area that unnecessarily placed two incumbents in the same draft districts. Each map drawer placed two incumbents in one district, and I was the incumbent placed in a district with another incumbent by both map drawers. The map drawers indicated that they did not consider where the incumbents lived in drawing the districts and that the placement of incumbents in the same district was not intentional.

Mr. Morgan asked me for information addressing the issue. He placed me in his District 6 along with Senator Petersen. In his discussion of his draft of District 6, Mr. Morgan referred to it as the Petersen district, which indicated he knew enough about where Senator Petersen lives to know that Petersen lives in that draft district. Mr. Morgan also indicated he did not know that I live in the draft district.

Mr. Morgan asked for my suggestions to his proposed districts. There are nine Senators who live in the Alexandria-Arlington-Fairfax area and enough population for all or part of eight districts in that area. However, two of those nine Senators, Senators Howell and Saslaw, have indicated that they will not run for re-election in 2023. Consequently, there are no more than seven incumbents from that area who may run in 2023. Therefore, there is no need to place two incumbents in any of the eight districts that are all or partly in the Alexandria-Arlington-Fairfax area.

Furthermore, placement of both Senator Petersen's and my home precincts in Mr. Morgan's draft District 6 hardly would be part of a fair map. That draft district has 37 precincts that are currently in Senator Petersen's district but only 2 precincts that are currently in my district.

There is a simple solution to this issue. By moving only six precincts among Mr. Morgan's draft Districts 3, 6, and 7, there would be no draft district with two incumbents intending to run for re-election in 2023. The proposed shifts would be as follows:

- 1) Move Clifton and Woodyard precincts from District 6 to District 7;
- 2) Move Kings Park and Signal Hill precincts from District 7 to District 3; and
- 3) Move Gallows East and Woodburn precincts from District 3 to District 6.

This would result in the following:

- 1) I would no longer live in a district where Senator Petersen had about three dozen more precincts than I did;
- 2) I would live in District 7, where I would have a dozen more precincts than Senator Marsden;
- Senator Marsden would live in District 3 where he has precincts in both Mason and Braddock magisterial districts;
- 4) Senator Saslaw would not be affected because he is not running in 2023; and
- 5) No further adjustments would need to be made because the population in proposed districts 3, 6, and 7 would still be within 2 percent of the average district.

Please provide this information to the map drawers and let me know of any questions or concerns they might have.

Thank you for the opportunity to add comments for your consideration and for the official record. I'm impressed that your mapping consultants are off to a good start, and the Commission Co-Chairs are effectively leading the deliberations.

I hope you can assure that the same sorting capabilities that are developed for the Commission's use in locating & organizing official comments will also be available for the public to use as well.

Second, adding "tags" later for the sorting/organization of comments is a bad idea, one that may be extremely confusing, if they wouldn't be applicable to all comments, including those submitted earlier. Give your Staff time to propose a good set of "tags;" these aren't the critical path milestone yet. Clearly, some tags could include several related topics (e.g., comments that reference incumbents and those that refer to gerrymandering.

Third, I applaud your attention to the Commission deliberations and hope that you will overtly avoid using your cell phones during the Commission's mapping deliberations because, otherwise, it could easily appear to The Public that you are getting secret instructions from unidentified advocates by phone in the middle of the meeting. The apparent integrity of this Commission deliberation will set an historical standard for future Commissions to meet/exceed, and I urge you to set the highest standard possible.

Finally, and most important, I am grateful for the comments offered by Delegates Simon and Barker concerning the implications that the "start from scratch" approach may have for incumbent legislators. I can understand and appreciate their concerns, and I'm very grateful for their speaking out about the interests of the legislators who will be asked to approve the maps recommended by the Commission, but I object to those incumbent concerns being given any consideration in the Commission's mapping priorities.

My prayer is that you Commissioners, every one of you, are wise enough to understand and accept that protecting incumbents, even the very best, is not an appropriate consideration for the Commission in serving the interests of We the People. There are a few flaws in the new Constitutional amendment that you are working to implement, but nothing will diminish the apparent integrity of this new approach as much as any appearance that outside influencers might have a role in your recommendations to the General Assembly.

I am grateful for the time and energy that you are putting into this historic redistricting effort.

I urge the Virginia Redistricting Commission to avoid including Fairfax County in districts that are primarily Alexandria districts. Instead, include Arlington County areas to "fill out" Alexandria districts. There are a few reasons to take this approach: First, Alexandria and Arlington have recently worked closely on the Crystal City (Arlington County)/Potomac Yard (Alexandria) "National Landing" area where the Amazon Headquarters 2 and the new Virginia Tech Innovation Campus will be. The relationship between the two jurisdictions over this geographic area will continue for many years to come.

The second reason is population size. Alexandria has a population of 159,467 and Arlington's is 238,643. Fairfax at 1,145,670 is so much larger than either Alexandria of Arlington. Fairfax County's challenges are more numerous and more complex. A delegate or senator who represents both Alexandria and Fairfax County will likely have to spend a lot of time on Fairfax County issues although she or he represents only a very small part of the county's residents. Make the combination Alexandria-Arlington County, not Alexandria-Fairfax County.

Finally, under no circumstances should a delegate or senator have to represent constituents in Alexandria, Arlington, and Fairfax County. That elected official will have to split her or his time too many ways if she or he has to work with those three local governments' legislative agendas.


Green is the new 11th, which is more competitive than the current 11th.


Mauve is the new competitive 1st.

Dear Ms. Waters:

I wrote the enclosed tongue-in-cheek anecdote as a way to introduce my suggestion of a method to eliminate gerrymandering. But, seriously, I suggest this is a true method to remove politics from redistricting.

If you plug in certain perimeters into a computer, it should develop a fair set of districts. Those perimeters are:

- 1. Place a map of Virginia in a box.
- 2. Set the desired population for each district.
- 3. Place a vertical line at the horizontal center of the map.
- 4. Moving east and west from the center set a uniform distance between each vertical line.
- 5. Allow a district to "jump" a vertical line only once.
- 6. Set the number of desired districts.
- 7. Place horizontal lines, setting the boundaries of each district and providing for equal population among the districts.

Some districts may appear to be a big box, geographically and others might look small. Each, however will have an equal population. Gone, forever, will be squiggly lines.

I suggest this Committee has an historical opportunity. By utilizing this plan, politics can forever be removed from redistricting. There will be no more gerrymandering. Most importantly, this "Virginia Plan" could become the blueprint for the rest of the country and other democratic states. The fact is, any political jurisdiction, no matter its shape, can be redistricted fairly by using this method.

When I was a little boy, I became an expert critter catcher. I used to chase fireflies and put them in an old mayonnaise jar with holes punched in the lid. I'd turn over rocks and logs to find hibernating frogs. Turtles were easy to catch. Be careful catching grasshoppers because they spit brown stuff on your hands. My name is Kris Gregory and I am a resident of Fairfax County. My family was redistricted in 2011 from the 53rd Delegate District in Fairfax County to the 48th Delegate District. We were also redistricted from the 10th Congressional District to the 8th Congressional District. I urge you to correct this mistake.

My immediate neighbors and I have a Falls Church mailing address even though we pay taxes for the McLean Community Center and technically are McLean residents. The results of the 2011 redistricting divided the McLean area of Fairfax County between 4 delegate districts and 2 Congressional districts. Many voters in McLean are confused about who represents them and it is not their fault.

The current 48th Delegate District is located approximately 1/3 in Fairfax County and 2/3 in Arlington County. Our Delegate Rip Sullivan (D-48th) is a friend and does a great job since he lives in the Fairfax County section of his district. Having to split his time between 2 counties limits the time he can spend on Fairfax issues through no fault of his own.

The VA 8th Congressional District is currently made up of Alexandria City, Arlington County, Falls Church City, and most of the Fairfax County areas with Alexandria and Falls Church mailing addresses. Congressman Don Beyer (D-VA 8th) has family and business ties to McLean and Falls Church City so he has been a great representative for the entire 8th Congressional district. However, the majority of McLean residents are in the 10th Congressional District and many voters who live in the 8th Congressional District mistakenly assume that they are too until they vote.

My experience as a candidate leads to these observations. The currently gerrymandered and numbered districts create confusion among voters. For example, when I ran in the 33rd Senate district the district overlapped with eight House of Delegate districts and 11 Board of Supervisor districts in two counties.

In general, many voters are unfamiliar with the state legislature. The reference to State Senate is often confused with our US Senators from Virginia. The House of Delegates can often be confused with the U.S. House of Representatives. There are several ways the Redistricting Commission could reduce the confusion moving forward.

#1 Because the Senate is 1/40th of the state population and the House of Delegates is 1/100th of the population there should be 2 1/2 House of Delegate districts in one Senate district. This alone would greatly reduce the confusion. Currently during campaign season, voters will see campaign signs, ads, news articles, and internet email and advertising for candidates in whose districts they do not reside.

#2 The numbering of the districts could also be used to reduce confusion. The numbering of House of Delegate districts should not be the same, or close to the US House of Representatives seat for that district. For example, the 10th House of Delegate district resides in the 10th Congressional District. This major redistricting effort provides the opportunity to totally re-number the districts. The same follows for numbering the Senate districts. Likewise, it would be ideal for the House and Senate districts not to overlap in their numbers. For example, the 33rd Delegate District currently resides in the 33rd Senate District the 32nd district being right nearby also often gets confused with the Senate district. A suggested number naming plan that would avoid this confusion follows.

#3 When referring to district numbers for the House of Delegates, State Senate and US House of Representatives, a letter should be placed in front of each district number to help voters understand which race is being discussed. For example, a "D" should be placed in front of the district number for House of Delegates, an "S" for Senate District, and an "H" for the House of Representative district. While that information might seem superfluous on the voter's voter registration card it would help them to become accustomed to the new nomenclature. Hopefully campaigns, websites, government entities would all be informed and encouraged to use the new nomenclature. Introducing the new nomenclature would also help to clarify new district compared to old districts.

Congressional District 6 includes Amherst County, Augusta County, Bath County, Botetourt County, Highland County, Page County, Rockbridge County, Rockingham County, Shenandoah County, Warren County, portions of Bedford County and Roanoke County. The cities of Buena Vista, Harrisonburg, Lexington, Lynchburg, Roanoke, Staunton and Waynesboro.

With the exceptions of Amherst County and Lynchburg City, all CD6 is on the I-81 Corridor. Amherst County is on the 29 corridor. Route 29 runs through the center of Amherst County and the Town of Amherst, the County Seat.

Amherst County and the 24HD are separated from the rest of CD6 by the Blue Ridge Mountains and the George Washington National Forest. This can make it very difficult and sometimes dangerous to attend meetings on the other side of the mountain, especially in the winter months, at night.

We ask that you put our county back together and put us on our side of the Blue Ridge Mountains.

We want to vote with our neighbors, with counties on our side of the mountain. We cannot address issues that affect us if Amherst County remains divided and isolated from voters who share those issues and concerns.

Thank you for your recent vote to start afresh with maps, rather than making incremental adjustments to the existing district lines.

As you move forward into the next critical phases of your work, I urge you to

- Hire a nonpartisan consultant to create the maps
- Direct the consultant to mathematically apply an algorithm based on Virginia's criteria.

Using a modeling process to optimize across the multiple criteria is a clean, peer-reviewable, verifiable approach that can give citizens - and legislators - confidence that the maps are being drawn in an objective, fair way.

Multicriteria decisionmaking has been around since the 1960s (Multiple-criteria decision analysis - Wikipedia) and the map-drawing software that is now available can create boundaries that are based on algorithms for multicriteria decisionmaking. These algorithms can evenly distribute population by district, maximize overlap with existing political boundaries, maximize conformity with the "compact and contiguous" objectives, and maximize competition within districts.

As a voter, I earnestly seek a fair system of voting. Fairness starts with fair maps. A fair approach for drawing maps would be to first agree upon the criteria; then agree on the relative weighting of each criterion; and then to use an impartial model (with algorithms to mathematically operationalize the criteria) to draw the boundaries.

Keeping the process as transparent and mathematically clean as possible will give citizens and legislators assurance that our democracy is based on the principle of fairness.

Dear Virginia Redistricting Commission:

My colleague Rob Rose and I have co-taught a legislative redistricting and GIS class at William & Mary for the last 3 years and we are doing so again this year. We are very much looking forward to our students engaging in this process in real time.

To that end, we request that the commission make all data used (including the Racial Vote Analysis, and the reattribution of prison data) available in useable format for members of the public in general and our students in particular to use to draw compliant maps along with the Commission. Our students plan to submit their maps to the Commission for consideration and can only do so effectively if they can access the same data the Commission is using. The public can meaningfully take part in this process only if the Commission makes a commitment to making all data it uses and produces immediately publicly available.

As you know, Virginia law, both in spirit and letter, requires immediate release of the all data and analysis the Commission considers. Section 30-396(D) of the code requires that "All data used by the Commission in the drawing of districts shall be available to the public on its website. Such data, including census data, precinct maps, election results, and shapefiles, shall be posted within three days of receipt by the Commission." (emphasis added)

Thank you very much for your commitment to fair maps and to your dedication to a fair process. We very much look forward to being part of this historical redistricting cycle.

Virginia voted 66% in favor of the redistricting amendment, almost twice as many in favor as opposed. Many voted with the phrase ringing in their ears, "voters should choose their representatives rather than representatives choose their voters". The commission voted to defy this sentiment and subvert the spirit of the amendment by permitting the addresses of incumbents to be considered in the drawing of legislative boundaries.

The context was how to flesh out the requirement that a map, considered on a statewide basis, may not unduly favor or disfavor any political party. One commissioner presented a hypothetical outcome: ten Democrat incumbents put in the same district to compete with each other while Republican incumbents remained solitary. Would this scenario disfavor a party on a statewide basis? On the face of it, the outcome would disfavor individual incumbents. Perhaps packing incumbents of one party would lead to a statewide loss of seats. Maybe, maybe not. Political data and projected electoral outcomes would seem to be a more direct measure of party rather than individual disfavoring. But regardless, the argument rests on the assumption that the status quo occupies a privileged position, one that is to be the standard for determining 'favored' and 'disfavored'. Needless to say, if the electorate supported the status quo, they would not have voted overwhelmingly to replace the redistricting process that brought it into being.

Some commissioners argued that the tight schedule makes it impractical to draw a map without incumbent addresses only to revise the map later when this information is available. True, but as Commissioner Simon pointed out, there is no loss of time if addresses are not used at all.

Some worried that a map with incumbent clashes will not pass the General Assembly. The amendment indeed gives the General Assembly veto power over the map. But only you can give it the additional power to determine where the lines are drawn. You do this by abdicating your mandate and drawing lines on their behalf. Commissioner Abrenio said it well: the job of the Commission is to draw a map as apolitically as possible. If members of the General Assembly choose to thwart the work of the Commission, then let them face electoral consequences.

Nothing says 'representatives choosing their voters' so vividly as a process that protects incumbency. You can best serve Virginia by listening to the millions of citizens who voted this Commission into existence and barring the use of incumbent addresses.

Hello VA Redistricting Commission members,

We can all feel Chair Greta Harris's despair near the end of last Tuesday's meeting (Aug 17). A split vote effectively sent back to counsel the task of finding a map-drawing entity. "We just made our lives a lot more complicated", she sighed. It looks like counsel will not be able to find a single map-drawing entity acceptable to the Commission. How will the Commission deal with two?

There is a way, inspired by our common experience.

Suppose you and I agree to share one doughnut. We both want as much of it as possible. What procedure can we adopt to ensure that the portions are equitable? "I'll cut the doughnut!" "No, I will!"

The solution is simple. One person cuts the doughnut, and the other person chooses which piece to eat. It doesn't matter who cuts and who chooses. Either way, the incentives are in place to get as close to 50:50 as possible.

This insight has been adapted to redistricting, most recently by Palmer, Schneer, and DePalma, 1921 (I've attached a copy of the paper). In brief, the authors simulate two opposing partisans redistricting various states (including Virginia). One side starts by creating a map that defines \*twice\* the number of districts (e.g. 80 Senate districts). Then the other side combines two adjacent districts to make one. Using this procedure -- called Define-Combine -- it makes little difference which side makes the initial map. The predicted electoral outcome is about the same.

If you get two map-drawing entities from the two sets of counsels, then let them play Define-Combine (of course limited by the guidance provided by the Commission). The map or maps made by this process can serve as the starting point for the commission to move forward.

I propose this as a possible way out of the quagmire of two separate map drawers, but I'm not enamored with the idea. The model presumes that the only motivation is partisan advantage, clearly not the case in Virginia, where Democrats have worked with Republicans to preserve the status quo. Still, at this point, Define-Combine or something like it may be the least bad choice left.

If you're willing to bend, then I think you'd get better results, and better optics, from starter maps that are computergenerated based on well-defined priorities composed by the Commission (as has been suggested many times in previous e-mails).

There was certainly reason to hope for an end to the brazen incumbentprotection racket that had prevailed for decades, enabling sitting lawmakers, helped by ever-more-deft technological gizmos, to choose their own voters. But even before the commission has drawn a single state legislative or congressional district, it is engulfed in tribal partisan skirmishing, precisely the opposite of the compromise and consensus it was designed to encourage. First, the 16-member panel — split evenly between Republicans and Democrats, citizens and state legislators — was unable to agree on hiring a single, nonpartisan lawyer to guide its work, settling instead for one affiliated with each party. Then, at a similar impasse over hiring a firm to draft boundaries for congressional and state legislative districts, it opted for two firms, each partisan. So much for consensus. Some members still express optimism that compromise will win out in the end. But the dysfunction so far suggests a stalemate is likely this fall, when the deadline arrives for the commission to produce agreed-upon maps is They are going to bomb us for this," said Brandon Hutchins, a citizen commissioner from Virginia Beach, evidently worried about a public backlash and not imagining his words would be caught on a hot mic in a meeting this week. Not to worry, state Sen. George L. Barker (D-Fairfax) reassured him, adding that only a "fairly small segment" of the electorate is paying attention. Fig. That bit of cynicism nicely encapsulates the commission's work to date, which, if it continues down the split-lane highway of polarization, will end without producing agreed-upon maps to present to the General Assembly for up-or-down votes. If that happens, it will mark a failure, the latest bit of evidence that democracy is fraying throughout, and that elected officials are ill-equipped to fix it. Firthe commission's rules allow any two of its legislator members of either party to block a proposed map, a structure intended to promote compromise. That could lend Republicans a partisan advantage; a majority of the court's judges were appointed by past GOP-led legislatures, although some have shown an independent streak PDemocratic opponents of the commission warned of that scenario. The National Black Nonpartisan Redistricting Organization provides the following comments in response to The Virginia Redistricting Commission's meeting on August 16, 2021.

- 1. The Virginia Redistricting Commission (VRC) should issue a clear statement as it relates to the consistency of the Census data released on August 12, 2021 and the data that will be released on September 30, 2021. If the Commissioners are unclear as to the difference in the data being released, and they should not be, then the VRC should expect the same from some members of the public.
- 2. If the Commission is seeking to gain public confidence in its final determination, it must do a better job explaining its actions and its determinations to the public in better detail.
- 3. If the Racial Polarization Data is key to complying with the Voting Rights Act, then how can the VRC start drafting boundaries on August 26, 2021 without the Racial Polarization Data that will not be made available until August 31, 2021?
- 4. Whose going to be checking the data provided by the VRC's contractor On August 26, 2021 to ensure the accuracy of that data and compliance with Virginia law? If it is determined later that this data is flawed, then the whole process will be flawed.
- 5. Why hasn't the VRC's legal counsel provided a detailed legal opinion as to why August 12<sup>th</sup>, August 26<sup>th</sup> or September 30<sup>th</sup> is the legally sufficient date to start the 45-day time line? In its February 12, 2021 press release, the U.S. Census Bureau announced that, "it will deliver the Public Law 94-171 redistricting data to all states by Sept. 30, 2021." There should be a written legal opinion stating that the data released on August 12, 2021 complies with Public Law 94-171 if the Commission intends to rely on that data to draw its redistricting maps.
- 6. The VRC should be cautioned with tying its redistricting decisions to political considerations such as maps being approved by a lame duck General Assembly session. If this is a concern, the VRC should consider going to Court and seeking a stay in its final determination until a new General Assembly is seated in January 2022. There is a legitimate legal argument that can be made that such a delay is reasonable based on the delays in the release of the census data because of Covid.
- 7. Will VRC legal council provide a legal opinion as to the sufficiency of the Racial Polarization Data provided to the Commission?
- 8. Since both legal counsels were unsure as to whether they or the Virginia Attorney general's office would be defending the VRC's actions in Court, it would seem reasonable to provide a clear statement as to which counsel would be representing the VRC in a legal challenge.
- 9. Will the proposed subcommittee meetings be open to the public?
- 10. Is the VRC subject to the Virginia Open Meetings laws?
- 11. Overall there seems to be quite a bit of confusion on the Commissioners' part as it relates to process and requirements which is to be expected being that this is the first time a Commission has been tasked with drawing redistricting maps. The VRC has hired four highly qualified attorneys who can provide the VRC with sound written legal opinions and guidance to ensure its actions are legally sufficient and comply with State law. Seeking counsel advice during a public hearing does not suffice for sound legal analysis and opinions. In the end, a good legal team can and will pick apart this Commissions' decisions and decision-making process apart if the VRC's determinations lack sound legal foundations. The VRC should seek to ensure that all of its actions are done with an understanding that its determinations may be challenged in a Court of law and that they will be setting a precedence for future redistricting commissions. Thus all effort should be made to develop a sound process that can be defended and provide the foundation for future redistricting.

### Dear Commissioners,

I am a citizen who grew up in Fairfax County writing to you to express my strong support for hiring the Spatial Analysis Lab and the Digital Scholarship Lab at the University of Richmond as your single nonpartisan mapdrawer; and my strong opposition to hiring two partisan mapdrawers. Hiring two partisan mapdrawers to draw maps is a sure way to either create dysfunction or to create an incumbent protection gerrymander.

First, it is unclear how two partisan mapdrawers would even work together. Would they each draw their own maps and then the Commission would have to select one of the two maps as its choice? Would they at first draw their own maps and then compromise on one map after seeing each other's ideal maps? Would they work together from the start to draw one set of maps? If the first option, as Delegate Simon said, there is no way a supermajority of the Commission would vote for either map. If either of the latter two options, this seems likely to lead to an incumbent protection gerrymander, as the two mapdrawers come in with partisan goals and "compromise" on protecting incumbents from both of their parties. In addition to being morally wrong and the antithesis of what the people of Virginia expected from this Commission, those maps would also be unlikely to clear a supermajority threshold, as a clear majority of citizen commissioners have made clear they will not vote for any kind of gerrymander. In short, hiring two sets of partisan mapdrawers is very likely to lead to failure.

Hiring the Spatial Analysis Lab and the Digital Scholarship Lab at the University of Richmond as your single, nonpartisan mapdrawer, on the other hand, would set the Commission up for success. These organizations clearly have a high degree of experience with mapping software. They have run innovative mapping projects that often rely on the exact same Census data that the Commission will rely on to redistrict. And they have a lot of experience with the geography, demography, and population statistics of Virginia.

There is further no question about this group's nonpartisan nature—all lawyers have agreed on that. The only real objection is that the Republican legal firm questioned their experience, while the Democratic legal firm did not. This is emphatically *not* a disagreement centered on partisanship. It is simply a technical dispute regarding experience. It is my strong belief that this firm has more than enough experience to do this job well, and also fulfills the difficult criteria of being seen by all as nonpartisan. I implore you not to look at the upcoming vote on mapdrawers as "right vs. left" but rather "right vs. wrong." Hiring partisan mapdrawers would simply be wrong for Virginia. Hiring a well-respected nonpartisan mapdrawer would be the right choice for our state, and that's true whether you are a Democrat or Republican.

Dear Commissioners,

I am submitting to you a proposed draft map for our state's congressional districts: https://davesredistricting. org/join/5cd0b205-7c2d-404c-9bc4-8d6a654dfe8b. Given the demographic changes in the state since 2010, this map creates four majority-minority districts rather than three as we have now. Districts 3 and 4 remain predominantly Black/African American. Thus, this map complies with the Voting Rights Act. Furthermore, this map minimizes splitting municipalities and counties to the extent possible and scores better than the current map on measures of compactness including the Reock and Polsby-Popper metrics. Furthermore, I have tried to unite communities of interest (e.g. major higher ed institutions in district 5- UVA, Liberty, James Madison). This map would also be quite competitive. Five districts would likely be winnable by candidates of both parties. Districts 2, 5, 7, and 10 would have all backed both democrats and republicans in statewide races since 2016. Additionally, democrats over the past 5 years would have generally won District 1 by mid- to high-single digits, meaning that this district is likely winnable by a strong Republican candidate in a favorable environment. To give a sense of the competitiveness of the districts, here are the results of 2016 presidential and 2017 gubernatorial elections by district:

District 1: 51% Clinton, 43% Trump; 54% Northam, 45% Gillespie District 2: 48% Trump, 46% Clinton; 52% Northam, 47% Gillespie District 3: 62% Clinton, 33% Trump; 66% Northam, 33% Gillespie District 4: 61% Clinton, 35% Trump; 63% Northam, 36% Gillespie District 5: 50% Trump, 45% Clinton; 51% Gillespie, 48% Northam District 6: 63% Trump, 32% Clinton; 64% Gillespie, 35% Northam District 7: 49% Trump, 44% Clinton; 51% Gillespie, 48% Northam District 8: 71% Clinton, 22% Trump; 74% Northam, 25% Gillespie District 9: 68% Trump, 27% Clinton; 68% Gillespie, 31% Northam District 10: 47% Trump, 46% Clinton; 51% Northam, 48% Gillespie District 11: 64% Clinton, 29% Trump; 67% Northam, 32% Gillespie

I encourage the commission to consider this map for adoption.

I am a resident of Fredericksburg City. I am writing to request that the Virginia Redistricting Commission redraw Senate District 28 to include Stafford County, Fredericksburg City, and Spotsylvania County, and that the City of Fredericksburg itself be contained in one House District (28 with Stafford), one Senate District (28) and one congressional district (remain in the first).

Virginia law requires electoral districts to be drawn around communities of interest. Currently, Senate District 28 is a sprawling leviathan that includes communities that have very little in common from Prince William County's Rural Crescent to the shores of Westmoreland County. Residents of these areas have very little in common culturally or economically and, therefore, do not represent a community of interest.

Furthermore, Fredericksburg City's population is only 28,000 and only 10.4 miles in size, yet is currently split into multiple House districts (28 and 88). This split divides neighborhoods, such that on Lee Avenue, one side of the street is in the 28th, and on side is in the 88th.

The current split also divides students at the University of Mary Washington, with on campus students in the 28th and off campus and some University housing located in the 88th. The University is certainly a "community of interest" but housing is spread through different precincts.

The City itself is also absolutely a "community of interest." The City is a regional, national and worldwide destination for lovers of history, nature, art, music, shopping, dining, and entertainment. We are a small community with shared interests of preserving the Rappahannock River, celebrating our diverse community, advocating for increased school funding, for efficient transportation solutions, and supporting our small business community.

As for the Senate District, a more appropriate district should be centered around Fredericksburg City. Stafford County, Fredericksburg City, and Spotsylvania County have a strong community of interest. We eat at the same restaurants, shop at the same stores, our families worship at the same churches, and we all consider ourselves from "Fredericksburg", as does most of the postal system. Senate District 28, therefore, should reflect that strong community of interest and be drawn around Fredericksburg City; and our City should not be divided into multiple House Districts. If the Commission is truly interested in eliminating gerrymandering, as all the pre-election campaigns maintained, then these recommendations should make sense in light of our shared community centered around the City of Fredericksburg.

My community is a suburban working and retired community. There are families who need to stay safe even while there are many visitors to the Wetlands, Pony Pasture and other aspects of the James River Park System in this area.

Common links between me and my neighbors are environmental stewardship, continued access to our local businesses in nearby shopping centers, recycling efforts, water reclamation efforts and most importantly, improving education in our public schools to make up for the interruption in learning caused by covid.

That means, living in the vicinity of both the Granite Hills and the Stratford Hills shopping centers plus Huguenot HS along the fall of the James River is our microcosm within the greater Richmond area. We have put up with a lot of flat tires from pot holes and road construction, destruction of precious trees that used to live here. That is why the main street was named "Forest Hill Ave." However, it could be renamed "Tree Murder Alley" after what I've seen take place over the past 10 years.

As Economic Recovery Coordinator for the Cumberland Plateau Planning District Commission, I would like to express support for preserving the community of interest in the deep coalfields of Southwest Virginia that includes the counties of Buchanan, Dickenson, Russell and Tazewell. I'm writing you as a long-time volunteer dedicated to fair redistricting in Va. I worked hard—as did scores of volunteers—to educate Virginians and end what I considered an "incumbent protection program" in our state. I was elated to see Virginians all over the Commonwealth overwhelmingly support the creation of the Commission to which you've now dedicated yourselves.

Because of my commitment to good governance, fair maps, and transparency, I'm appealing to you to avoid the temptation to use existing maps as a starting point for drawing new maps.

I'm sure you are aware of the multiple reasons to begin afresh but here are the ones that particularly seize me:

—I believe that a genuinely fair process cannot be driven by partisanship. Starting with new maps, Virginia can be less polarized and more pragmatic in its approach to solving the real problems of our citizens. As the fifth worst gerrymandered state in the nation, Virginia would suffer from a real credibility gap if the Commission chose to make only minor changes to the existing maps, perpetuating the problems that the the creation of the Commission sought to solve. A likely result would be voter disillusionment. In other words, failure to start anew will undermine public confidence in not only the ultimate maps but this brand new process.

—My guess is that like me, you're committed to racial and social equity in the creation of our maps. As you know, two of the three sets of maps under which we currently operate are the result of court intervention to undo racial gerrymandering. The regions affected by these changes are living under a band-aid, and many of the districts cut through communities in order to provide more racial balance. You can redress this situation and ensure greater equity by starting with a new process resulting in new maps.

—I believe we have an obligation to set the right precedent for future commissions here and across the country by saying that 45 days is not too short to do anything beyond tinkering. By this reasoning, Virginians will never get a fresh start they voted for.

Many excellent alternatives to "adjusting" existing maps have been proffered so I'll only mention a few. To make your work easier but to produce NEW maps, please consider, among the others, using computer-generated "starter maps," of which there are several; a "fairness report," like the one available from the Princeton Gerrymandering Project; or "third-party maps," like the ones put forward by the Citizen Advisory Board.

I'm grateful that you have taken on this challenging task. You have been entrusted to make important decisions that will affect the lives of all Virginians over the next ten years. I know you're up to the task.

I could not believe that in Virginia in 2021 that the legal counsel would even recommend such a fraudulent course of action. It is the coward's way out to accept it. Virginia deserves better from their Commissioners and the legal counsel. I feel strongly this will undermine not only the ultimate product, but also public confidence. I am hopeful that when presented with options somewhere between starting from existing maps (which is unpopular and not ideal) and starting from zero (which is a daunting task), that you will strongly consider one or more of them.

Why starting from existing maps is not only a bad idea, it is playing into the hands of politicians and corporate interests seeking to protect their political cronies as opposed to protecting each Virginian's God-given right to vote and have fair and equitable representation in their government.

- · Over the past decade Virginia's maps have been fifth worst in the nation. To start with them as a template and make minor changes will perpetuate the problems that were the impetus to create the Commission
- In November 2020 Voters were overwhelmingly in favor of a new system established in a constitutional amendment. Fulfilling their democratically determined mandate is crucial for our state to move forward.
- · Virginia can be less political and more pragmatic to solve many real problems and get better overall governance if we have fairer elections based on fairer maps.
- 2 of the 3 sets of maps are a result of court intervention to undo racial gerrymandering. The regions affected by these changes are living under a band-aid, and many of the districts cut through communities in order to provide more racial balance.
- It sets a bad precedent for future commissions to say that 45 days is too short to do anything beyond making adjustments. By this reasoning, Virginia will never get a fresh start.
- Starting from existing maps also means starting with incumbent addresses and will make it harder to assure Virginians that the final maps were not put in place to protect incumbent politicians.

You are up against a very big task in just a matter of days and I truly believe that you will follow the harder right rather than the easier wrong in this matter. Some alternative approaches you might consider:

- Computer-generated "starter maps" using an algorithm based on the legally-mandated criteria, someone like Moon Duchin (Metric Geometry and Gerrymandering Group at Tufts University) could quickly and easily create maps to use as a starting point.
- "A fairness report" using the existing maps but running them through a fairness report like the one available from the Princeton Gerrymandering Project. This would point out the biggest problem areas and direct your attention to where the biggest changes need to happen.
- Equal Population map starting from a map that is just districts determined by population and no other criteria and adjusting from there.

The National Black Nonpartisan Redistricting Organization (NBNRO) is still concerned with the Virginia Redistricting Commission continuing to hold meetings during workday hours. Many of the people who are the least represented in the redistricting process cannot take off one, less known two days straight during normal workhours to attend these important meetings. In addition, holding a meeting at 8:AM in Richmond is all but saying that the Virginia Redistricting Commission is not concerned about citizens and voters who live outside the Richmond area and would need to drive two to three hours to get to Richmond to attend a meeting.

Early morning hearings and meetings were always a tool of the Virginia General Assembly to ensure that public participation on certain legislative proposals would be limited to only the very committed; or those with Richmond addresses; or people with the resources to stay overnight in Richmond. This Commission like those legislators are tasked with doing the people's business. The NBNRO and many of our citizens did not vote for a Constitutional Amendment to create a redistricting commission to only have that commission temper down public participation in the process by holding meetings at inopportune times.

We hope that in the immediate future as this process moves forward the Virginia Redistricting Commission will make the time of its meeting more opportune for those citizens unable to miss work to attend an important government hearing and/or meeting. They say time is money, and many people in this state can't give up that time, so let's please take them into account in your scheduling decisions in the future.

Commissioners: I know today is the big day - the data has arrived. Now the hard work starts!

I am taking this special moment to write to you to ask that you DO NOT start this round of redistricting with the existing maps.

I have a number of reasons for asking this:

- 1) using existing maps will only ensure that current gerrymandering is perpetuated. Our current districts are often drawn in tortured ways to divide communities and ensure incumbent protection. A fresh start would give all of the Commonwealth a better chance at having a truly representative government and give the commission a better chance at keeping communities of interest together.
- 2) If you start from existing maps that means you will be implicitly starting with incumbent addresses already baked into the process. I implore you to NOT consider incumbent protection either explicitly or implicity when drawing our new maps. I understand that for the elected officials on the commission this will be an extremely hard ask but I would urge the citizen members to push back as hard as you can so as to give all of Virginians, not just our elected officials, a fair voice in how our districts are created.

I understand that staring at a blank sheet of paper can be a daunting experience. But when it comes to drawing new maps for the Commonwealth that is not your only choice. You have a number of other options, including:

- 1) a computer-generated "starter map". You could use an algorithm based on the legally-mandated criteria which could quickly and easily create many maps that you could use as a starting point. I understand that Moon Duchin (Metric Geometry and Gerrymandering Group at Tufts University) has access to some tools that could be very helpful if this is the option you choose.
- 2) Another option might be to use "a fairness report" like the one available from the Princeton Gerrymandering Project. This would point out the biggest problem areas of our current maps and let you know where changes could have the best impact.
- 3) You could start with the maps created in 2011 by students in the LWV/Wason Center Competition or the maps put forth by the 2011 Citizens Advisory Commission. While these maps are a decade old they would be a better start than the current maps (which, by the way, are also a decade old) that were created specifically with political considerations in mind.

I wish all of you the best of luck. The next 45 days could be the beginning of a new era for the Commonwealth. We can show the rest of the United States that Politicians and Citizens can work together to create a more open, fair, and just society by starting with ending political and racial gerrymandering!

With the benefit of internet/virtual meetings, the powerful visibility of your deliberations in public has increased substantially at a time when America needs assurance that our government decisions are sound and not corrupt. Please, in the short time that remains, strengthen our faith and confidence in the democratic process by deliberating at the key junctures in public!

- 1. Start From Scratch -since the existing district maps are widely considered to have been tainted by gerrymandering, it only makes sense to start fresh, without any priority given to preserving existing district boundaries for any of the district maps the Commission will recommend.
- 2. **Mapping Priorities**, as Bill Millhouser suggested in your Fairfax County meeting, should be clearly articulated and <u>ranked by the Commission in public session</u>. Having the staff work and Commission deliberation in secret will diminish the apparent integrity of the Commission's recommendations.
- 3. Single Mapping Consultant -it would be best if your selected sets of lawyers could agree on a single mapping consultant to support the Commission deliberation. This will help the Commissioners work together and avoid the schism of partisan debate, and should save a considerable amount of time, as well.

4. **Recommended Maps** should be presented to and discussed in public <u>before</u> they get final sign-off from the Commission and are recommended to the General Assembly. Dear members of Virginia's 2021 redistricting commission:

Today is the day you get the population data from the Census Bureau that you have been waiting for. Now you can get down to the business of drawing fair election districts for Virginia voters.

I am sure that, with the 45-day deadline you have to complete the state maps, it will be tempting to start with the current maps and just tweak them here and there. PLEASE DON'T.

This would be a huge mistake. The courts had to redo two sets of the current maps in order to fix their racial gerrymandering. The court fixes are a temporary patch and are in no way ideal. Trying to tweak these maps would be putting patches on patches.

Virginia's voters overwhelmingly endorsed a new way of drawing election districts with the constitutional amendment that establishes your commission. The voters are expecting you to Do Things Differently. Tweaking old maps is not Doing Things Differently. Such a course of action will shake public confidence, both in the maps you draw and the whole commission process.

There are better ways to promote good government through fairer maps that will result in fairer elections. There are two that spring to mind. The folks at Tufts University's Metric Geometry and Gerrymandering Group could prepare computer-generated starter maps using an algorithim based on your legally mandated criteria. Or, you could use the Princeton Gerrymandering Project's fairness report process to pinpoint the biggest problems in the existing maps.

Either way, you'd get analysis from outside observers who have made fair redistricting their business for years. Worth a shot, no?

Please don't let us down. We're counting on you to make our elections fair, to give every Virginia voter an equal chance to affect the outcome of any election.

#### **Dear Commissioners:**

The possibility of using existing district maps as a starting point for drawing new maps was introduced at your August 3rd meeting. My understanding is that the Commission will vote on that possibility at its August 16th meeting.

Given the daunting and time constrained map-drawing task you face, I fully understand the temptation to use existing maps as a starting point. However, I urge you to resist that temptation in favor of another option.

In the four most recent elections, I advocated at the polls for the passage of an amendment creating the Commission on which you now serve. Having spoken several hundred voters in both progressive and more conservative districts who have long supported redistricting reform, I was gratified but not surprised when in Nov. 2020, 67% of Virginians voted for the amendment.

Attached is one of the handouts I distributed during those conversations with voters. It shows the boundaries of two blatantly gerrymandered districts: one drawn by Democrats for a senator's seat and other drawn by Republicans for a house delegate's seat. While neither of these gerrymanders were anomalies, both gave voters more than sufficient proof to conclude that Virginia must scrape entirely all past map drawing methods in favor of one that produces more competitive and representative. Responsibility for implementing that new method is now in your hands.

An alternative to starting with existing maps is starting with computer generated maps using an algorithm based on the legally mandated criteria that each district must meet. I believe the Commission is aware of the work of Moon Duchin of the Metric Geometry and Gerrymandering Group at Tufts. She has the expertise and experience to quickly and easily create such maps that then could be used as starting maps.

After having "zoomed in" on ten of the Commission's meetings, a few Sub-commission meetings, the Richmond-based public hearing and having read much of the content posted to the redistricting website maintained by DLS, I have developed high respect and appreciation for your efforts. I suspect that the 45 days allotted to produce the maps could be stressful for you all. However, I can't see how starting with existing maps when alternatives are available will reduce that stress. I


do see how it might disappoint the many Virginia voters who have pushed for redistricting reform for so long. Thanks for all you do.

At the last Commission meeting, we learned that "all four legal counsel strongly encouraged the Commission to gain map drawing expertise." Given the short window of 45 days from tomorrow - August 12 - to present the maps to the General Assembly, bringing nonpartisan map expertise on board is certainly wise.

Many are very concerned, however, that the law firms also recommended using current maps as the starting point for redistricting. These lawyers were not there for the eight hearings when the commissioners listened to Virginians plead that their communities, cities, and counties no longer be divided. If they had been, they would never have considered such a recommendation. Virginia's maps have been terribly gerrymandered and there are major problems with our legislative districts that cannot be solved with a "band-aid" approach.

How are you going to decide which districts remain intact and which will need to be moved to another area of the state as population changes are taken into account? Which politicians will benefit? Wouldn't it be less complicated, less political, and actually faster to start afresh? The delegates and senators who represent their constituents well should have no problem winning re-election no matter how the lines are drawn. They may even appreciate how much easier it is to get to know their districts.

As a starting point, you could use computer-generated maps using an algorithm based on the legally mandated criteria. As Sen. George Barker suggested, a racially polarized voting analyst could begin right away looking at data and opportunities for minority representation districts. In addition, our cities and counties should be considered "communities of interest" and kept together as much as possible.

I hear you are feeling a lot of time pressure due to the requirement to redraw Virginia's electoral maps within 45 days; I understand this is an awesome responsibility that puts a heavy weight on your shoulders.

However, those of us, like me, who have been fighting for years for fair, democratic, and nonpartisan maps that empower currently under-represented communities will be very disappointed if you do not start from a clean slate. Virginia should not use as the basis for new lines the old maps that resulted from gerrymandering, court cases, or special deals for politically-connected individuals. The suggestion that the Independent (?) Redistricting Commission use the existing map as their base for redrawing the voting districts in the Virginia will taint your new map with the stench of corruption.

#### Dear Commissioners:

At the beginning of this process, our organization, OneVirginia2021, made the very conscious decision to avoid taking public positions on individual decisions the Commission has made. Both laborious and time consuming, it would also give the inaccurate impression we are trying to interfere with the herculean task you have before you.

That said, today we feel compelled to speak on behalf of our supporters as you consider and debate whether to use existing legislative district lines as a beginning point to draw new maps for the next decade. We strongly believe that starting from existing maps will not only harm the final product but will also immediately undermine public confidence in the new maps as well as the new constitutionally mandated process.

We understand that this decision is being considered in the interest of saving time. It was clear by the comments made by several members of this Commission at the August 3 meeting that it seems unfeasible to begin this formidable process from a blank computer screen. But this is not a binary choice, and we want to make it notably clear that there are several viable alternative options that do not involve using the existing electoral maps. The options include, but are not limited to:

- 1. **Computer-generated "starter maps"** using an algorithm based on the legally mandated criteria. For example, Moon Duchin (Metric Geometry and Gerrymandering Group at Tufts University) could quickly and easily create maps to use as a starting point.
- 2. "A fairness report" using the existing maps but running them through a fairness report such as the one available from the nonpartisan Princeton Gerrymandering Project. This would point out the biggest problem areas and direct your attention to where the most needed changes should occur.
- 3. **Equal Population map** starting from a map displaying districts determined by population only, with no other criteria, and adjusting from there.
- 4. **Third party maps from 2011** review of maps designed by students in the League of Women Voters/Wason Center Competition or the maps put forth by the Citizens Advisory Commission. Both are obviously a decade out of date, but so too are the current maps.

Any of these options will allow you to save time when compared to beginning without a reference point. We feel very strongly that the Commission should do everything possible to avoid the impression they are using existing electoral maps to protect incumbent legislators -- even if the intent of using this data is to simply meet a looming deadline. In other words, even if this rationale is not nefarious, the optics of it may tell another story.

Finally, we would once again like to thank you for your hard work thus far. The mere existence of this Commission proudly represents the most transparent redistricting process in Virginia's history, and we stand at the ready to assist you with our vast array of resources in any way possible in the coming weeks and months.

#### To the Virginia Redistricting Commission:

Thank you for the opportunity to provide comment to the Commission in the important work you all are engaged in, ensuring fair representation and a citizen led redistricting process. We at the Princeton Gerrymandering Project are following your process intently and wish to provide some suggestions regarding the starting procedure for drawing maps for the Commission.

If the Commission wishes to start from existing maps, it may do so, so long as it adheres to the criteria laid out in the enabling law. Va. Code Ann.. Sec. 24.2-304.04 and 30-391, et seq. These criteria include equal population, respect for communities of interest, Voting Rights Act compliance, and avoidance of undue partisanship, as well as the traditional criteria of compactness and contiguity. These criteria can be met by the following procedure.

First, the Commission should score the existing maps for partisan and racial fairness. The Commission may wish to establish its own criteria. The Princeton Gerrymandering Project has devised a fairness report card that grades the existing map, and which will identify core inequities and deficiencies. And of course the Commission must identify areas where district populations are no longer equal.

The northern part of the state will need to be significantly redrawn for three reasons: partisan advantage in the existing map, rapid population growth since 2010, and the requirement to respect communities of interest. The Commission should examine the current map for places where it divides communities of interest, which can be obtained from public input and tools like Representable.org. Keeping communities of interest whole improves their chances of gaining representation.



In the southern part of the state, starting from existing districts has the advantage that part of the map was redrawn in the *Personhuballah* and *Bethune-Hill* lawsuits after the community sued claiming the districts were unconstitutionally drawn with race as a predominant motive. These districts have already passed constitutional muster. Adjustments may be potentially small, provided that the existing map is deemed adequately fair to Black communities and ensures equal population. One might want to check for additional Black opportunity-to-elect districts, but this would not require a large-scale overhaul of the districts.

Our team at the Princeton Gerrymandering Project stands ready to provide scoring assistance to maps as the Commission drafts them. We thank you again for the opportunity to offer our thoughts on redistricting in Virginia.

Dear members of the Redistricting Commission,

I ask that you not start your line-drawing from the heavily gerrymandered existing maps. No matter how much these lines are tweaked, starting from this baseline inevitably will bake gerrymandering into the final product. Your legal counsel has suggested this option because they believe there is not enough time to start from scratch. But if you don't think you can start from scratch, there are numerous alternative options available to you. These options can be grouped into three buckets:

- 1) Have your mapdrawer use an algorithm to generate a computer-drawn map. The algorithm would be based on the ranking of the redistricting criteria the Commission will soon vote on. This map can serve as a starting point for the Commission and the Commission can then adjust that map to make specific changes that commissioners feel necessary. This would allow an algorithm to start the process, and for the Commission to complete the process
- 2) Have your mapdrawer use their redistricting software to generate equi-populous districts that do not take the Commission's criteria into account. This would create a starting point that the Commission can then adjust
- 3) Start with another set of non-gerrymandered maps. Either the 2011 Independent Bipartisan Advisory Commission maps or the winning maps of the 2011 Virginia College and University Redistricting Competition would be fine starting points for the commission, as these maps were drawn with fairness in mind

As you can see, there are more than two options available here. The Commission can easily engage in a clean break from the current gerrymandered maps while also giving itself enough time to draw maps by the statutory deadline. I urge you to reject your attorneys' suggestion of starting from the current maps and pursue one of these other options.

#### The Honorable Members of the Commission:

My name is John Stone. I have lived in Chesapeake, Virginia, for nearly forty years now and have been represented over that time in the State Senate and the House of Delegates by members of both major political parties. My family and I live in a community which is really made up of parts of the cities of Chesapeake, Portsmouth and Suffolk in Hampton Roads.

It became obvious to me and to many other Virginians some years ago that partisan redistricting/gerrymandering was beginning to make it much more difficult to solve the problems that we have and have had in the Commonwealth. Every time either party had control of the redistricting process, the House and Senate districts were drawn deliberately to keep that party in power. This in turn led to more extreme positions being taken by many of our delegates and senators and a reluctance to compromise on various important issues.

It also led to noncompetitive elections. Since 2003, I have lived in both the 18<sup>th</sup> and 14<sup>th</sup> State Senatorial districts. In the 18<sup>th</sup> District, the incumbent has been unopposed in four out of five elections and won with 70% of the vote in 2003. The incumbent in the 14<sup>th</sup> District has been unopposed in three of five elections and won the other two with 71% and 60% of the vote. Democracy is always stronger when the voters have a meaningful choice.

Because of all this, I enlisted 15 years ago in the long and exhausting fight to make Virginia's redistricting process bi-partisan or non-partisan. (I am proud to be a member of the OneVirginia2021 Foundation Board of Directors). I believed strongly that we should have an independent citizen-controlled commission to draw the new lines every 10 years. While that's not exactly what has happened, I believe we have the means to make the process more equitable and more transparent. And I salute all of you on the Virginia Redistricting Commission for agreeing to take on arguably the most important task in recent history in our state.

Chapter 1265 of the Virginia Acts of Assembly (SB 717 in the 2020 Legislative Session) requires the commission on which you serve to draw lines that: do not discriminate against racial and ethnic minorities; that preserve communities of interest; that provide for compact and contiguous districts; and that do not "when considered on a statewide basis, unduly favor or disfavor any political party." Those are all important.

I would also urge that you-to the extent possible- respect jurisdictional boundaries. Currently, the incumbent in the 14<sup>th</sup> State Senatorial district represents portions of seven different cities

and counties, some of them obviously with conflicting interests. The incumbent in the 18<sup>th</sup> district represents all of or parts of twelve jurisdictions. This does not allow for effective representation, no matter how many hours the senator works or how many miles they must drive.

In addition, the city of Chesapeake is currently represented by three senators and six delegates. That seems like a few too many for me, although it's not as bad as Fairfax County- represented by nine senators and eighteen delegates. Of Chesapeake's nine legislators, just four actually live there.

The city of Suffolk is represented by six legislators, only one of whom lives in Suffolk.

I do not subscribe to the argument that redistricting is necessarily a political task which can be done only by politicians. That narrative puts our legislators in a difficult position in which they are perceived as working to advance their own political interests. I do believe strongly that every seat in the Virginia Senate, the House of Delegates, and the United States House of Representatives belongs not to the elected official who might currently hold it; every seat belongs to the people of Virginia, who have a vested interest in seeing that those seats are held by the individual- Republican or Democrat, male or female-most capable of doing the job.

Thank you for taking the time to read my comments and thank you for your commitment to this great state of Virginia.

#### Commissioners:

My name is Carol Parke, and I am following Virginia's redistricting process with great interest. With this email I wish to state my hope for an honest and fair redistricting process. The stakes are immense.

I am a former academic library administrator living in Westover Hills, Richmond since 2004 and newly retired from the Syracuse University Library. Mid-career, I spent eight years at the VCU Library, and earlier I was in charge of Government Publications at the Yale University Library. There I had the privilege of working with faculty, students and ordinary townspeople who needed to find information the government produces and distributes, and to help them understand its content and context. I often needed to clarify the differing roles of the three branches of government, whose actions and publications truly document our priorities and our progress (or not) as a nation. Year after year, the Congress, and Congressional documents, were among our most heavily requested sources of needed information.

The fair assignment of Congressional districts according to law is one of the most important components of good government, and, it seems, one of the easiest to be compromised. We've seen that again and again. Fair and transparent redistricting that permits us to govern according to the needs and wants of all Americans - not just the powerful, not just insiders - is more crucial than ever this year. In the wake of January 6th at the Capitol, we must not lose this rare opportunity we have been given!

It is not so common to see congressional districts fairly-drawn – but a critical mass of citizens here in Virginia seems to have awakened to the reality that the evils of Jim Crow are still with us, and gerrymandering is still rampant. (Covid-like, powerful, swiftly adapting, those evils have had no trouble clothing themselves in newer realities. They have always had their followers, and still do.) Too many of us have not understood how pervasive and tenacious the old, discredited ways of operating can be, and in this, I believe we've been naïve. All eligible voters need to have the same opportunity to vote, and their Congressional districts drawn to make all of their votes count.

Fair and legal redistricting is a foundational component of good government, a first step on which nearly everything else will build. It can rectify old evils, give those who have been silenced a voice, advance the dreams of so many, make a better Virginia for all Virginians, and model for the less enlightened how good governance can work for the good of all. In Virginia we've made a start, but we must not flinch. Done well, redistricting will move us toward a more equal state and nation. Without it? Just look around you. Without it, I am truly afraid.

I have made my home in Charlottesville since 1984. During the 37 years I have lived in Charlottesville, my voting district has been outrageously gerrymandered, resulting in a subversion of the democratic process and of fair and equitable representation, and making it exceedingly difficult to meaningfully address pressing regional issues relating to economic development, jobs, housing, infrastructure, transportation, the environment, climate change, and healthcare.

I am excited that we now have a chance to redraw the district lines in a way that is NON-PARTISAN and that will thereby revitalize the democratic process, rather than secure the lopsided victory of the most extreme partisan candidates. I believe this gerrymandering has led to disastrous results not only in Virginia but across the country.

In order to achieve a non-partisan redistricting, I urge you to not to use political considerations in designing district boundaries. Instead, please prioritize the following criteria:

Attached is a PDF showing my proposed OUTLINE of eleven Congressional Districts for Virginia.

The "Hub and Spoke" organization was suggested by a citizen at one of the first two panel presentations.

I adopted the principle, and for each numbered district, I have listed an index of the "population hub" for each district. Dotted lines indicate the locality boundaries at the edges of proposed compact districts.

Whenever districts cross the locality boundaries that are remote from population centers, the priority should be to embrace the "community of interest" which is the social and cultural attendance district for a local public primary school. An overlay of Census BLOCKS can be used to closely approximate the numbers of residents in each elementary school district.

Please let me know if there are any clarifications or extensions I can provide to make this submittal more useful to the Commission.



Thank you for serving on this important commission and for making genuine efforts to abide by the Constitution and VA code and to be as open and transparent as possible.



Dear Commissioners:

I am writing on behalf of the Henry County Board of Supervisors to let you know of their views on redistricting and its impacts to Henry County.

The Board of Supervisors realizes that your job is difficult, and the results of your work will be met with joy from some localities and angst from others. Henry County does not envy you. However, we want to let you know of our preference to remain in the district boundaries that seem logical to our citizens.

These would be the 9<sup>th</sup> District Congressional district; the District 20 Virginia Senate; and the 9<sup>th</sup>, 14<sup>th</sup> and 16<sup>th</sup> District Virginia House of Delegates districts.

We feel these districts generally are comprised of similar localities, and therefore share similar concerns and needs. This is particularly true regarding the Congressional districts. We believe that including Henry County in what is today called the 9<sup>th</sup> Congressional District would be the correct community of interest for us rather than the 5th Congressional District, which runs from the North Carolina line to Northern Virginia.

We appreciate, and would like to maintain, Henry County's inclusion in a single State Senate district. This has proven to be very beneficial to the County as we promote the County's interests before the Senate of Virginia.

However, we have received great cooperation and assistance from the House of Delegates' representatives we currently have in the 9<sup>th</sup>, 14<sup>th</sup> and 16<sup>th</sup> districts. We would like to maintain that relationship with these districts.

To the Members of the Commission:

I regret that I was unable to participate in the virtual public comment meeting on redistricting for Southwest Virginia that the Commission held recently. I did wish to contribute a comment that pertains to redistricting as it affects my home community, Patrick County. Patrick County is wholly contained within the 9th Congressional District, the 20th Virginia Senate District, and the 9th Virginia House of Delegates District. I have no particular problems with the first two districts. which have had to become larger geographically over the years, as the population of Virginia shifted away from rural areas, particularly south central and southwestern Virginia. This is true also of the House of Delegates districts, as Patrick lost its "own" delegate and became part of a geographically larger district. Before 2011, this district included all of Patrick and most of Henry County and Martinsville. This made sense from many perspectives: this is an area with historic ties, a shared economy, a major transportation link (Hwy. 58), and shared governmental and public institutions, including the circuit court, the regional public library system and the community college. However, in 2011, the Republican-controlled Virginia legislature went through a redistricting exercise that included redrawing the House of Delegates districts in Patrick County and Henry County/Martinsville, with the result that one district was lost--it just happened to be that of the then-Minority Leader of the House of Delegates, and Henry County/Martinsville was split up among three different House districts. Patrick County was small enough to be kept whole, but it was put into a district with Franklin County and a few border precincts of Henry County. This district, the 9th House District, while not a terrible example of gerrymandering, could and should be made to better represent the people of Patrick and western Henry County by reuniting them in a district with their natural community of interest, which includes the rest of Henry County and Martinsville, and separating this area from Franklin County. A district that includes Patrick and Henry Counties and the City of Martinsville would have a population of about 80,000, which is within the current range for House of Delegate districts. This would not only make sense for Patrick County, but would reunite Henry County into one House district; this is especially of interest since the City of Martinsville is in the process of reversion to town status and should be united with Henry County in its state legislative district. I do not believe that such a district would have very much, if any, impact on the partisan makeup of the House of Delegates, at least not in the near future, but would make a district that makes sense for local government, businesses and voters.

I believe that it is helpful for district boundaries to conform to county and city limit lines, where possible, so that our elected officials will be strongly correlated with local government boundaries. So I suggest that your districts minimize districts that divide counties or cities into separate districts.

As you implement the Constitutional requirements of contiguousness and compactness, please make explict and public the sub-priorities and criteria you use in your re-districting, to increase the confidence and appreciation the public will have for your important work.

I suggest that "compactness" of various districts might be objectively compared by calculating the ratio of each district's perimeter to the area inclosed, for instance miles of perimeter to square miles of included habitable area (not including bodies of water or swamps, or areas where people are not allowed to reside, such as cemeteries or parks). Please concentrate on existing districts that have narrow "peninsula-shaped" protrusions from their boundaries, and those with many small "wrinkles" in their boundaries, which will inflate their perimeter-to-area ratios.

I support reports that you have announced that you will avoid basing district boundary decisions on where particular incumbents or candidates live, and that you avoid basing such decisions on prior voting patterns.

# My assessment of the Virginia Redistricting Commission progress /prognosis

## Introduction/Background

The Virginia Redistricting Commission was launched in December, 2020 to the best of my knowledge and its establishment is to be noted due to the tireless work of "One Virginia 2021". I have been actively engaged with the Commission since February, 2021.

I have made comments in each of the Commission's public Zoom meetings since that time. My comments laid out a step-by-step roadmap on how the Commission should go about redrawing any needed state election maps and the criteria to be used in particular for redrawing as needed any Virginia congressional election maps. I packaged all the comments into one comprehensive 10-page Adobe Acrobat document which I forwarded to the Virginia Redistricting Commission via email and they published that document on their Web site.

Additionally, I downloaded U.S. Census Bureau data from the American Community Survey's 5-year estimates for all of the current Virginia congressional districts and stored the data in Microsoft Excel workbooks. I then analyzed the data to discover relevant demographic trends and patterns to help guide redrawing the election maps for Virginia's congressional districts. The Virginia Redistricting Commission requested a copy of my data analysis which I forwarded to them in May of this year via email.

## My observations of the Virginia Redistricting Commission's Conduct and Progress

- There is no dialogue between Commission members and the public. Citizens making comments to the Commission are heard but no feedback is provided by Commission members. For example, in the most recent Commission meeting held on Monday, July 19, 2021, "One Virginia 2021" in the person of <u>Liz White</u> and the state representative from the Virginia League of Women Voters, proposed some excellent redistricting tactics and posed some pointed questions. The only response from the chairperson of the Virginia Redistricting Commission was "Thank you".
- The Commission did purchase a robust mapping software package which is very complex and was to receive training on said software in May or June of this calendar year. However, no mention has been made of that in any of their recent Zoom meetings.
- No status reports have been issued by the Commission.
- There is no project plan for doing the redistricting.
- No preliminary redrawn election maps have been developed.
- There is no evidence that any Commission member has any prior experience with redrawing election maps.

- There is no comprehensive, established methodology that the Commission is following for doing redistricting. Instead, Commission members fall into multiple camps as regards redrawing any state election maps:
  - $_{\circ}$  One camp wants to hire outside mapping experts with one set of experts to be hired by the Democrat members and the other set of experts by Republican members.
  - $_{\circ}$  The other camp wants to do at least some of the map drawing in conjunction with the mapping experts.
  - $_{\circ}$  Some Commission members want to start from scratch and draw brand-new state election maps. Other members want to adjust existing state election maps as needed.
  - o Finally, some members wanting to adjust existing state election maps, wish do so without incumbent addresses published on the maps.
- The Commission announced in their most recent public meeting that Calendar Year 2020 Census data is due to arrive in the next few weeks. Once the data is received the Commission has 45 days to redraw any needed state election maps:
- There are a total of 151 state election maps; 11 congressional district maps, 40 Virginia state senate maps and 100 Virginia House of Delegate member maps. If we assume a worst-case scenario of all of the maps needing to be at least adjusted if not completely redrawn, a total of 3.35 maps would have to be produced daily!
- Currently there exists a limited set of criteria for doing redistricting (e.g.; keeping communities of interest/place intact). However, no set of weighted demographic attributes have been put forth by the Commission for deciding which existing state election maps need to be modified or replaced.
- The Commission has appeared to be transparent in their actions but it is unknown if there are any backroom deals going on.

Prognosis for Success of the Virginia Redistricting Commission Given the above-mentioned facts that:

- 1. There are no mapping experts on the Commission as far as known.
- 2. The mapping software package chosen is complex
- 3. There is no apparent established methodology for doing the redistricting
- 4. No preliminary redrawn election maps have been developed.

I forecast a low probability of the Virginia Redistricting Commission being successful in their mission. Most probably there will be some minor tinkering of existing election maps that will satisfy none but the citizens who want things to stay as they are. Further, the task of redrawing any election maps will probably default to the panel of retired judges who are tasked with reviewing any product developed by the Virginia Redistricting Commission.

The one possibility for a limited successful outcome would be to immediately hire outof-state mapping gurus who are experts in the mapping software chosen by the Commission and let those experts do the redistricting as needed. --

To Whom It May Concern,

I am Sara Bohn, Supervisor, District A, on the Montgomery County Board of Supervisors.

10 years ago I went to a redistricting hearing in Roanoke and shared my perspective about redistricting here in:

- Montgomery County
- The New River Valley
- Roanoke and southwest

My perspective and recommendation haven't changed.

## Here are my recommendations:

- The towns of Blacksburg and Christiansburg, let alone all of Montgomery County should not be split at all. If anything, the surrounding
  counties should be split since Montgomery County (including Blacksburg and Christiansburg) have an influx of employees on a
  daily basis.
- The New River Valley should stay as one entity if at all possible. The counties and city have worked hard to become a cohesive group of
  entities for the outside world. The NRV includes Floyd, Giles, Montgomery, and Pulaski counties and Radford City.
- Montgomery County and the New River Valley have stronger ties with Roanoke and the Roanoke Valley versus when compared to southwest. In fact, we have stronger ties with Lynchburg when compared to southwest, primarily because we are more industrially oriented.
- Geography is important:
  - o"Christiansburg Mountain" brings people "up to" the New River Valley (approximately a change of 1,250' in elevation)
  - The Blue Ridge Mountains are a barrier:
    - The NRV is west of the Blue Ridge Mountains.
    - The Roanoke Valley and southwest are west of the Blue Ridge Mountains
    - We have more in common with the Shenandoah Valley than the Piedmont

## **Present Districts:**

- House of Delegates' districts Montgomery County has 3 Delegates. This should not be. Montgomery County only has 100,000 residents.
  If anything, keep Blacksburg and Christiansburg in one district. From an outsider's point of view, they don't know where Blacksburg ends and Christiansburg starts.
- State Senate districts Montgomery County has 3 State Senators representing it. Please don't do this again! Keep Montgomery County intact and add other New River Valley counties and Radford if necessary.
- Congressional district:
  - Keep the New River Valley intact.
  - o Include the Roanoke Valley-Alleghany planning district, since they have been a planning district, and are most similar to the New River Valley.
  - We (NRV and Roanoke Valley) have more in common with Lynchburg than southwest or south.
  - o Geographically: stay west of the Blue Ridge and Shenandoah mountains (unless it is possible to include Lynchburg; only exception)

## **Background Information:**

The New River Valley - Planning District - total population 185,098 grew 3.8%:

- Montgomery County:
  - O Has two of the largest towns in Virginia:
    - Blacksburg:
      - Where Virginia Tech is. Our economic engine.
      - Has more technology based companies when compared to any area west of Charlottesville.
      - Leans strongly Democratic.
    - Christiansburg:
      - The retail hub of the county.
      - Leans moderately Republican.
  - o Population exceeded 100,000 for the first time in 2020, with a growth of 6.3%
  - o County leans Democratic (typically the only blue county in all of southwest Virginia; Roanoke City is the only other entity that is "blue" in our sea of "red")

## Radford City:

- Where Radford University (state and public university) is. Its economic engine. Often the second largest economic engine in the NRV.
- With a population of 18,120 grew 10.4%.
  - There is a significant housing shortage in Blacksburg, so families look to Radford and Christiansburg as alternative places to live.
- o Presently leaning Democratic, but pretty much 50/50.

## Pulaski County:

- The second largest county in the NRV has a population of 34,2121, shrank, -1.9%.
- o The second most industrialized county in the NRV with Volvo as the economic driver.
- Strong Republican.

## • Floyd County:

- o Population of 15,670 grew 2.6%
- o Even though there are several industrial companies there, they have successfully leveraged their Tourism amenities.
- O Leans Republican but has many "earthy" people that lean Democratic.

## Giles County:

- o Population of 16,784 shrank, -2.9%
- o With the New River splitting the county, they have leveraged their natural beauty and the river's recreational opportunities.
- olt includes Mountain Lake, where the Dirty Dancing movie was filmed.
- Strong Republican.

## The Roanoke Valley - Planning District - total population 335,039 grew 1.2%:

## Roanoke City:

- o The economic, retail, and recreation center for our region.
- o Population of 99,795 with growth of 2.8%.
- O Largest African American population in the area.
- o Leans Democratic.

## Roanoke County:

- Surrounds Roanoke City like a donut.
- o Entity most like Montgomery County in amenities.
- o Population of 94,224 with growth of 2.0%.
- o Leans Republican.

## Salem City:

- o Roanoke City, Roanoke County, and Salem City seem like one from an outsider's perspective, although locally there are several distinctions.
- o Population of 25,522 with growth of 2.9%.
- o Roanoke College, along with industrial and service businesses.
- o Leans Republican.

## Other comments:

- Proponents of splitting Montgomery County, let alone the New River Valley talk about "the number of representatives that we have in Richmond." That representation hasn't "brought the bacon" back to this area. It allows our representative to pick the low hanging fruit outside of Montgomery County, and not deal with the difficult issues in one of the biggest economic engines in southwest Virginia (second to Roanoke).
  - The biggest addition to our economy is the fact that Amtrak will be expanding to Montgomery County. This is only after the expansion to Roanoke that has been more successful than expected (the New River Valley riders are a substantial portion of the ridership).
  - o Virginia Tech, Radford University, and New River Community College receive substantial funding from Richmond, but that would happen anyway despite Montgomery County and the New River Valley being split among elected state level districts.

## The Honorable Members of the Commission:

My name is John Stone. I have lived in Chesapeake, Virginia, for nearly forty years now and have been represented over that time in the State Senate and the House of Delegates by members of both major political parties. My family and I live in a community which is really made up of parts of the cities of Chesapeake, Portsmouth and Suffolk in Hampton Roads.

It became obvious to me and to many other Virginians some years ago that partisan redistricting/gerrymandering was beginning to make it much more difficult to solve the problems that we have and have had in the Commonwealth. Every time either party had control of the redistricting process, the House and Senate districts were drawn deliberately to keep that party in power. This in turn led to more extreme positions being taken by many of our delegates and senators and a reluctance to compromise on various important issues.

It also led to noncompetitive elections. Since 2003, I have lived in both the 18th and 14th State Senatorial districts. In the 18th District, the incumbent has been unopposed in four out of five elections and won with 70% of the vote in 2003. The incumbent in the 14th District has been unopposed in three of five elections and won the other two with 71% and 60% of the vote. Democracy is always stronger when the voters have a meaningful choice.

Because of all this, I enlisted 15 years ago in the long and exhausting fight to make Virginia's redistricting process bi-partisan or non-partisan. (I am proud to be a member of the OneVirginia2021 Foundation Board of Directors). I believed strongly that we should have an independent citizen-controlled commission to draw the new lines every 10 years. While that's not exactly what has happened, I believe we have the means to make the process more equitable and more transparent. And I salute all of you on the Virginia Redistricting Commission for agreeing to take on arguably the most important task in recent history in our state.

Chapter 1265 of the Virginia Acts of Assembly (SB 717 in the 2020 Legislative Session) requires the commission on which you serve to draw lines that: do not discriminate against racial and ethnic minorities; that preserve communities of interest; that provide for compact and contiguous districts; and that do not "when considered on a statewide basis, unduly favor or disfavor any political party." Those are all important.

I would also urge that you-to the extent possible- respect jurisdictional boundaries. Currently, the incumbent in the 14th State Senatorial district represents portions of seven different cities

and counties, some of them obviously with conflicting interests. The incumbent in the 18<sup>th</sup> district represents all of or parts of twelve jurisdictions. This does not allow for effective representation, no matter how many hours the senator works or how many miles they must drive.

In addition, the city of Chesapeake is currently represented by three senators and six delegates. That seems like a few too many for me, although it's not as bad as Fairfax County- represented by nine senators and eighteen delegates. Of Chesapeake's nine legislators, just four actually live there.

The city of Suffolk is represented by six legislators, only one of whom lives in Suffolk.

I do not subscribe to the argument that redistricting is necessarily a political task which can be done only by politicians. That narrative puts our legislators in a difficult position in which they are perceived as working to advance their own political interests. I do believe strongly that every seat in the Virginia Senate, the House of Delegates, and the United States House of Representatives belongs not to the elected official who might currently hold it; every seat belongs to the people of Virginia, who have a vested interest in seeing that those seats are held by the individual- Republican or Democrat, male or female-most capable of doing the job.

Thank you for taking the time to read my comments and thank you for your commitment to this great state of Virginia.

## Dear colleagues:

I am so pleased that the public has the opportunity to have some input into our redistriciting process! Thank you for the opportunity to submit comments.

I think that there are three primary principles that should guide redistricting. In decreasing order of importance, they are:

- 1. A preceinct should never be divided. First, since a precinct is so small, it would be reasonable to say that, by definition, a precinct is all within the same community of interest. Second, it adds so much to the possibility for confusion and mistakes if precinct poll workers have to manage multiple ballots. All voters in a precinct should receive the same ballot.
- 2. A jurisdiction (county, city, even town) should not be divided unless it is absolutely necessary. Some cases of absolute necessity are easy to discern, for example if the jurisdiction has a population greater than the district is supposed to have. If a jurisdiction absolutely has to be divided, then a division based on communities of interest should be apparent. For example, southern Page might go with Rockingham; or the Fort Vally, in eastern Shenandoah, might go with Page. Elsewhere in the state, eastern Goochland might go with Henrico; or the part of Carroll County east of the Blue Ridge might go with Patrick.
- 3. A media market should not be divided similarly to how a jurisdiction should not be divided In somewhat the same way, a Congressional district should not be divided among media markets unless absolutely necessary.

A corollary to all this is that if the above puts two incumbents in the same district, then may the better person win!

Another thing comes to mind as a rule of thumb for testing the contiguity and especially the compactness of a district. Draw a circle which includes the whole district; or draw a square which includes the whole district; or draw a rectangle which is not more than twice as long as it is wide and which includes the whole district. If more than about a third of the figure is outside the district, then the district may need reconsideration. Exceptions may be reasonable if the part outside the district is in another state or is water (such as the Chesapeake Bay).

Members of the redistricting commission, I thank you in advance for your work. My guess is that there will be a lot of sqawking and griping about your work, but here's a test of that: if it's coming relatively equally from both sides of the aisle, then that means you've done a good job!

I have been voting in the Woodbrook voting district for 30 years. I am an Independent and have voted for candidates from both of the major parties. Over that time, the General Assembly seats have often run unopposed, as has the 5th Congressional District. Initially, our district ran east to west for the Congressional Representative. Later it was changed to its present day north to south. As our district has recently voted more often for the Democratic candidate, we were changed such that our Republican representative in the General Assembly was redistricted out of our district (saying that the district was built for him, not the voters) such that he has run unopposed for years and we were placed in the Democratic representatives district, who also runs unopposed. ## Hello Commissioners,

My name is Ankit Jain. I grew up in Fairfax County and I am a citizen hoping the state will finally have fair districts. I submit these comments to supplement the written testimony I will deliver to you at the 7/27 Northern Virginia public hearing. I have two requests for you. First, I want to explain why I am strongly opposed to the suggestion at your last meeting that your two sets of partisan legal counsel will hire their own partisan map drawers to draw district maps.

I worry this is a great way to back into an incumbent protection gerrymander, because each set of partisan mapdrawers will come into the process with the goal of protecting their party, and the two groups then may agree on an incumbent protection gerrymander as a "compromise." Even if the Commission were to make it clear that is not what they wanted, the partisan mapdrawers could still sneak in partisanship into the maps they send you.

Rather than doing this, you should hire one, nonpartisan mapdrawer. If you are worried you do not have time to put out a Request for Proposals (RFP), you can direct your legal counsel to work together to hire one, nonpartisan mapdrawer as a consultant for both firms. I specifically recommend you either hire or direct your legal counsel to hire Moon Duchin from MGGG Redistricting Lab at Tufts University. Hiring a nonpartisan mapdrawer is the best way for this Commission to ensure that fair maps will come out of this process and to earn trust from the public that this is the Commission's goal.


Second, as an Indian-American from Fairfax County, I ask this Commission to draw a House of Delegates Asian opportunity district in either Fairfax or Loudoun County. The first time an Indian-American was elected to the Virginia General Assembly was in 2019—only two years ago. There have still been very few Asian-Americans who have ever been elected to the General Assembly. Fairfax and Loudoun counties now have large Asian-American populations. To ensure Asian-Americans have a proper voice in our state government, the Commission should draw a HOD district that gives Asians the opportunity to elect a candidate to represent them. This is eminently possible—attached to these comments are two potential Asian-American opportunity districts I drew that retain basic compactness criteria. They are also available to





Dear Members of the Redistricting Commission:

Thank you for permitting me to speak today. I am scheduled to be in trial today in my full-time position as an attorney, so I regret that I cannot be present live. However, I did want to share some thoughts in writing.

I have represented the central Fairfax area for 22 years: eighteen as a state lawmaker and four as a City Councilman. One of the things I like about representing this area — and what I commend to you — is the contiguity of shape and community of interest currently in place amongst the neighborhoods I represent.

Previously, i.e. prior to 2001, our portion of Fairfax County was subdivided in a very unhelpful way. Communities like Kings Park West and Fairfax City were often divided in two, which was confusing for constituents and lawmakers.

Currently, the 34th Senate district which I represent consists of central Fairfax which is Fairfax City and the County neighborhoods wrapped around Woodson High School, Robinson Secondary School, and George Mason University, as well as the I-66 corridor stretching from Dunn Loring to Centreville. The district also reaches a bit north to take in the Town of Vienna. The Senate district has a wide demographic diversity yet its focus is on local neighborhoods and schools, which is where most people congregate. There are no meaningful geographic features, unless you count the Accotink Creek which most people don't.

Again, the fact that Fairfax City and Vienna are the "two nodes" within this district make it more user-friendly for constituents to find their state lawmakers and speak with them, whether at town halls or community events. Whether that person is me or somebody else, I would humbly request that the core of the 34th Senate district stay in place so that citizens impentral Fairfax can be effectively represented.

Dear Commissioners,

I was unable to attend the hearing on July 22 for the Eastern Region, but would like to add my comments to those already submitted.

My husband and I have lived on the Eastern Shore (Accomack County) since 2005, and enjoy the rural lifestyle here. There is a strong sense of community and history on the Shore, and we feel proud to call this home.

We have actively participated in elections at the county, state, and federal level since moving here, and support the Commission's mission to make districts at every level more contiguous and representative.

I noticed that the map the Commission is using includes the "Eastern Region," with Accomack and Northampton counties on the Eastern Shore, along with Essex, King & Queen, Lancaster, Middlesex, Northumberland, Richmond, and Westmoreland counties on the Western shore of the Bay. Although these counties have a lot in common in terms of the issues we're dealing with (rural nature, demographics, tidal environment, coastal economy), there is one major obstacle in combining all of these into a future district (if in fact that is being contemplated). The obstacle is a 30mile-wide body of water called the Chesapeake Bay -- anyone representing the Eastern Shore along with any of these western counties will spend a lot of time travelling, and less time dealing with the concerns of their constituents. Currently, our representatives travel across the 17-mile CBBT to reach us; to travel from the Shore to some of these Western counties would take the better part of a day.

Sen. Lynwood Lewis, our current State Senator, has related his experience in dealing with this issue, since at one time his district included Matthews County along with both Eastern Shore counties.

As you know, our current State Delegate, State Senate, and Congressional Districts combine the Eastern Shore with parts of Norfolk, Virginia Beach, and beyond. Although this combines our two rural counties with more urban counties, we still have a lot of issues in common -- flooding and sea-level rise, tourism and water-based economies, military installations, poverty. Although specific "tweaking" may be required, please don't burden our representatives unnecessarily for the sake of uniformity. In this case, I would hope that "contiguous" and "compact" will win out over similar demographics.

Thank you for your hard work on this important issue.

First, I want to offer my thanks to each of you for your service to Virginia. You are doing hard, important work, and I'm grateful to you for your leadership, skill, and care as you weigh the many considerations before you.

I write as a Lynchburg native and current at-large member, as well as vice-mayor, of Lynchburg City Council, and urge you to unify Lynchburg into single legislative districts. As you may be aware, until 2011, Lynchburg was wholly encapsulated within the 23<sup>rd</sup> House of Delegates District and 23<sup>rd</sup> State Senate District.

That districting arrangement made sense, given that Lynchburg is, as it was then, a single community of interest: a geographically distinct city with a rich history and cultural legacy, a single city council, single school division, single police and fire departments, etc.

After 2011, however, our city was split, between two House districts and two Senate districts. Because we are not a unified whole, these lines have had the unfortunate effect of diluting Lynchburg's influence in Richmond. It's also costly — our registrar, for example, has to print up to four ballots for state elections — and is terribly confusing for voters, many of whom live across the street from someone in a different House or Senate district, or both.

Surely, Lynchburg voters have more interests in common with each other than Virginians living not just counties away, but in the case of the 22<sup>nd</sup> Senate District, nearly 100 miles away.

With approximately 83,000 people of innumerable common interests, Lynchburg deserves to be unified into single House and Senate districts.

Nelson County is a lightly populated (population 15,000), geographically compact community bounded primarily by Albemarle County, the James River, Amherst County and the Blue Ridge Mountains.

Due to Nelson's small population, organizations tend to have county-wide scope and cooperation between residents from different parts of the county is required for these organizations to be effective.

Charlottesville is the largest nearby city and the one with, by far, the most influence on Nelson's employment, business and culture. Important issues that periodically arise are debated within the county through personal contacts, public, county-wide meetings, letters and articles in the Nelson Co. Times, the Daily Progress and within organizations of countywide scope. In the past these issues have included the Atlatic Coast Pipeline, county and state ordinances, including those for zoning, dogs and guns, the construction of a state prison, a license for an automobile racetrack, the construction of a nuclear power plant on the James River, a series of low-frequency towers for emergency military communication, a county comprehensive plan and numerous other issues of importance to residents of the county. Many of these issues required the involvement of elected and appointed officials. These include local officials such as those on the Board of Supervisors, the Planning Commission and other elected and appointed boards as well as officials elected to the state legislature.

The dividing line appears to be entirely arbitrary or drawn for political reasons. My name is Liz White, I'm the executive director of OneVirginia2021, a nonpartisan organization focused on fair and representative redistricting in the Commonwealth.

As Virginia enters this new phase in the journey toward fresh legislative maps, I applaud your work on the in person and virtual public hearings held last week and look forward to those in the upcoming weeks. But time is flying and the Census data's projected arrival date is just about a month away.

You all and DLS staff published a very helpful timeline back in the Spring that outlined your work plan for those preparatory months. I encourage you to do the same for the remainder of this process - the more the public can understand your schedule and see when you intend to make some big decisions, the more secure they can feel in this process and the more they can focus on giving you input about their communities.

My name is Ankit Jain and I am a volunteer with OneVirginia working to ensure the state passes fair maps. I write to you to ask that you hire a third-party to either draw the district maps or to consult closely with you as you draw them. I further ask that you issue a Request for Proposals (RFP) for this position as soon as feasible, and that you ultimately select Moon Duchin from MGGG Redistricting Lab at Tufts University to draw or support you in drawing the district maps.

Most members of the Commission have no experience drawing district maps using the redistricting software. It is of course possible for members to learn, but there is no need for that. Members of the Commission were selected so they could imbue the new maps with their values, their understanding of their communities, and their ability to combine that knowledge with what they learn during public hearings. This can be done without members literally drawing the maps themselves. Members can easily lay out the parameters and guidelines of what they are looking for and leave the actual map-drawing to an outside expert. I am worried that if the Commission tries to draw the maps themselves, then the few members who *do* have a lot of experience in map-drawing will dominate the process. This would result in those members' values and understandings having an outsized influence on how the maps are drawn. If the Commission feels strongly that its members should actually draw the maps, it should hire an outside expert to at least consult with as it draws the maps to ensure the Commission is on the right path.

The Commission should hire Moon Duchin and MGGG Redistricting Lab as its outside expert. They are some of the foremost experts in drawing district maps. Ms. Duchin already has experience analyzing district maps for a government entity—she was hired in 2018 to analyze maps in Pennsylvania for fairness after the previous maps were struck down by the state

Supreme Court. She has run a program training others to become expert witnesses in redistricting lawsuits. And she has done groundbreaking research on how to use mathematics to make fair maps. Her reputation as nonpartisan map-drawer is unquestioned—if the Commission hires her, Virginians can rest assured that truly fair maps will come out of this process. If the Commission does not hire Moon, they should hire someone with similar qualifications who has a clear nonpartisan track record and who has not worked with a specific political party in the past to draw proposed maps.

The Commission needs to begin the process of selecting an outside expert to draw the maps ASAP. Census data will be released in less than a month, and the Commission must submit its first set of maps within 45 days of the release of the data. In order to hire an expert in time to actually support in drawing the maps, the Commission should put out an RFP for the position immediately. At the very least, the Commission needs to discuss and decide within the next few weeks who will actually be drawing the maps.

What does the Redistricting Commission need to know about your community?

Louisa County is a rural county where a lot of the people know each other, we have the "Mineral Farmers' Market" where vendors and customers meet not only to sell and buy homemade foods and crafts items but to converse and enjoy meeting and greeting all. There is no racial tension. The Louisa Arts Center has entertainment and classes. This summer, they had several day "camps" for children to explore various art forms. At the end of each camp, there was a graduation performance where the students exhibited what they had learned in camp. The local Rotary Club sponsored the camps with a grant, there were other grants, and there were two funds that provided scholarships so that all the children who wanted to attend could attend without concern for finances.

We enjoy the slower tempo of rural living but want to have the internet speed and communications available in the "city". Our Fire and Emergency Services are guite good, but the County is large and the coverage is spread thin. It may take 30 minutes to get a response to a "911" call and transportation to the nearest hospital takes almost an hour. One area, around Lake Anna, has gotten together to fund a Fire and Rescue Squad site and would like to have an Urgent Care Facility, too. the Board of Supervisors is aware and is facilitating this endeavor.

From what I have observed, most of the county is fiscally conservative and socially outgoing to help others in need, when the ned is known. Local farmers and gardeners contribute produce to the Resource Center (Food Bank) to be distributed. Church groups regularly contribute gallons of fresh milk to the Resource Center.

Although Louisa has many people whose financial status is below the poverty line, there is a helping hand available.

Louisa county should be treated as one entity when drawing voting districts. We have districts within the county and supervisors responsible for that district. People choose where they wish to live, for the most part, so they should be able to vote within their district and county, in a convenient place, or by requesting a mail-in ballot.

Thank you again for the opportunity to address the Commission during the virtual public hearing on July 15. My comments were:

My name is Bill Bestpitch, and I serve as a member of Roanoke City Council. Following the 2008 and 2012 presidential elections, City Council heard from numerous voters who waited for extended periods of time to cast their votes. Some said that they were not able to wait due to job or family requirements, so they were not able to vote at all.

At that time, Roanoke had 32 precincts, some with fewer than 1,000 voters and some with approximately 3,500 voters. The larger precincts were the ones that experienced the greatest delays in voting, and most of them were majority African American precincts.

Working with the Electoral Board and our General Registrar, we revised our precinct lines so that we now have 20 precincts, with an average of approximately 2,500 voters in each precinct. We have not experienced any significant wait times for voters since the new precinct lines went into effect.

All our elections for mayor, city council members, and Constitutional Officers are conducted at large. All of the City is in the 21st District of the Virginia Senate and the 6th Congressional district. Eight precincts are split between the 11th and 17th House of Delegates districts. We respectfully request that the Commission simply follow our precinct lines when drawing districts for the General Assembly and Congress.

Dear Commissioners,

I am submitting to you a proposed draft map for our state's congressional districts: https://davesredistricting. org/join/5cd0b205-7c2d-404c-9bc4-8d6a654dfe8b. Given the demographic changes in the state since 2010, this map creates four majority-minority districts rather than three as we have now. Districts 3 and 4 remain predominantly Black/African American. Thus, this map complies with the Voting Rights Act. Furthermore, this map minimizes splitting municipalities and counties to the extent possible and scores better than the current map on measures of compactness including the Reock and Polsby-Popper metrics. Furthermore, I have tried to unite communities of interest (e.g. major higher ed institutions in district 5- UVA, Liberty, James Madison). This map would also be quite competitive. Five districts would likely be winnable by candidates of both parties. Districts 2, 5, 7, and 10 would have all backed both democrats and republicans in statewide races since 2016. Additionally, democrats over the past 5 years would have generally won District 1 by mid- to high-single digits, meaning that this district is likely winnable by a strong Republican candidate in a favorable environment. To give a sense of the competitiveness of the districts, here are the results of 2016 presidential and 2017 gubernatorial elections by district:

District 1: 51% Clinton, 43% Trump; 54% Northam, 45% Gillespie District 2: 48% Trump, 46% Clinton; 52% Northam, 47% Gillespie District 3: 62% Clinton, 33% Trump; 66% Northam, 33% Gillespie District 4: 61% Clinton, 35% Trump; 63% Northam, 36% Gillespie District 5: 50% Trump, 45% Clinton; 51% Gillespie, 48% Northam District 6: 63% Trump, 32% Clinton; 64% Gillespie, 35% Northam District 7: 49% Trump, 44% Clinton; 51% Gillespie, 48% Northam District 8: 71% Clinton, 22% Trump; 74% Northam, 25% Gillespie District 9: 68% Trump, 27% Clinton; 68% Gillespie, 31% Northam District 10: 47% Trump, 46% Clinton; 51% Northam, 48% Gillespie District 11: 64% Clinton, 29% Trump; 67% Northam, 32% Gillespie

I encourage the commission to consider this map for adoption.

My wife and I, both recently retired, have lived for 15+ years in Braemar, a planned urban development in west-central Prince William County formed under the laws of the Commonwealth of Virginia approximately 20 years ago. I am a former officer and chair of the New Castle Village Homeowners Association, which is a sub-association of the Braemar Community Association.

Braemar residents are all members of the Braemar Community Association, which consists of approximately 3400 housing units, both detached single-family homes and town homes, as well as one of approximately 10 sub-associations. Geographically, our community is bisected by Broad Run (river/large creek) and sits between Vint Hill Road to the South, Linton Hall Road to the North, farmlands that are part of the Prince William County "Rural Crescent" to the west, and adjacent neighborhoods that are situated about 1/4 mile beyond the Braemar Parkway and Garry Glen Drive to the south.

To our Commissioners -

1. I am an active volunteer for several Virginia organizations with a major interest in redistricting in our state. I understand there are problems with recruiting a Communications and Outreach Services coordinator for the Commission. Please don't wait for this Coordinator to be hired before starting outreach for the hearings.

Many of us stand ready to immediately help alert the public to the upcoming hearings in July but need further information and clarification.

- What time will the four virtual hearings begin on July 15, 22, 29 and August 5?
- When will links to those virtual hearings be advertised on the website?
- Where will the public go to sign up to speak at both the in-person and virtual hearings? How far in advance does this need to be done?
- Was a decision made on whether speakers can sign-up for any of the in-person and/or virtual hearings?
- Was a decision made about how to handle groups that wish to speak?
- How much time will individuals and/or groups be allowed to speak?
- Will the in-person meetings also allow for speakers to do so virtually?
- 2. I would also suggest the Commission start preparing the RFP and advertising for a "map drawer" now. We are only eight weeks away from the tentative date for delivery of the Census data. Your time for drawing the maps will be very short but there are very qualified experts to help guide you through the process. I realize there are several legislators who have experience and may feel comfortable drawing maps but Virginians are expecting more than easy "tweaks" and slight boundary shifts from the Commission for 2021. Please don't let "oh we ran out of time" be the excuse for wasting this historic opportunity.

Experts such as Moon Duchin with nonpartisan Tufts University could swiftly guide you through the various components of map drawing from meeting concise population demands to requirements of the Voting Rights Act to prioritizing criteria including Communities of Interest. They could also make it easier to compare various maps that may be drawn in order to achieve your desired outcome.

At the June 7 meeting of the Virginia Redistricting Commission, it was suggested that the Commission maintain their biweekly meeting schedule but retain the option to cancel the meetings if there's no pressing business to discuss. This suggestion was made concrete when the June 21 Commission meeting was canceled. This decision was not publicized or explained members of the public could only find out that the meeting had been canceled (and stop checking the website, waiting for an agenda to be posted) by emailed DLS staff directly.

The individuals and organizations who have co-signed this letter encourage the Commission, in the strongest possible terms, to continue meeting regularly. This process happens once every ten years and will affect Virginians for the next decade. As a brand new Commission, you all have been gifted several extra months to figure out how best to work with members of the public to create historically representative maps - please take advantage of that time. Even if there are no scheduled votes to be taken, these meetings are unique opportunities for citizens to engage with the process and provide comments and feedback to the Commission's work.

To deny the public any available opportunity would be a disservice to the voters of Virginia, and would go against the spirit of transparency the constitutional amendment mandates. Even without new agenda items, we ask that the Commissioners treat these previously scheduled biweekly meetings as listening sessions. In the absence of the U.S. Census data, we feel this is the best use of the Commission's time.

We look forward to the subcommittee meetings this week and the full Commission meeting on Tuesday, July 6, and continue to offer our support and our services to aid you in this momentous task.

RE: Bridgewater Split Precinct

Dear Co-Chair Babichenko, Co-Chair Harris, and Commissioners:

As you get underway with your map drawing responsibilities in the coming months, we wanted to bring to your attention an existing split precinct between the 25<sup>th</sup> and 26<sup>th</sup> House District in the Town of Bridewater that we hope can be addressed in the upcoming redistricting.

While we are certain you have every intention to minimize the number of split precincts, both in terms of eliminating exiting split precincts and avoiding the creation of new split precincts, we felt it would be prudent to register our position and concerns. These are concerns that have also been shared with us by our local registrar, the electoral board, and other officials.

The split precinct between the 25<sup>th</sup> and 26<sup>th</sup> House District came about as the result of a friendly annexation by the Town of Bridgewater that occurred around the same time as the 2011 redistricting. Currently, there are roughly 75 voters impacted that live within the town boundaries and vote at the West Bridgewater (401) precinct, but they are within the 26<sup>th</sup> House District. All the remainder of Bridgewater lies within the 25<sup>th</sup> House District. While multiple legislative attempts were made to correct the issue, they were ultimately vetoed by the Governor. He took the position that no such corrections should be made outside of the decennial redistricting.

As you may expect, this split precinct has caused voter confusion, additional complications and expense for the registrar's office, and has increased the prospect of errors in the voting process. While not a problem unique to the Bridgewater split precinct, it presents its challenges, nonetheless.

We recognize should newly proposed district lines move from this general area entirely it may be a moot point. If they remain roughly the same around the town's northern border, we hope you will give these concerns your attention and work to address this issue. Thank you for your consideration. Please let us know If you have any questions or if we might provide any additional information. Please know that we appreciate your service to our Commonwealth performing this important work to facilitate our representative democracy.

As "Communities of Interest," our counties need more cohesive representation. I reside in Stafford County which has three House Districts and three State Senate districts. (On the other hand, my Delegate for the 88<sup>th</sup> House District represents four jurisdictions - Stafford, Spotsylvania, and Fauquier Counties and the City of Fredericksburg.)

In 2021, the Commission should use this historic opportunity to divide counties and cities into as few districts as practicable. In addition to keeping "Communities of Interest" together, it would also be more compact – another constitutional criteria.

I am attaching a copy of a report from Virginia's 2011 Independent Bipartisan Advisory Commission on Redistricting. On Page 8 of The Public Interest in Redistricting, they describe testimony received at one of the Public Forums -

"The splitting of municipal and county jurisdictions drew the ire of citizens, who gave numerous examples of how several delegates and more than one senator represented one, sometimes small, locality. Understandably some might argue that localities may gain more effective representation by having more than one legislator look after their interests, but that was not the position of most, if not all, citizens who testified on this point. Instead, they pointed out the difficulties that citizens have in knowing who to contact, who to hold accountable, and who among several legislators should coordinate or lead the representation of local city and county interests in the General Assembly. Citizens who testified feel that cities and counties receive more effective representation from unity rather than diversity or multiplicity of representation."

I hope you will take the time to read the full report (43 pages) from 2011. It also includes model maps recommended by the Commission which you may find helpful as you begin our 2021 redistricting.

## Introduction

# Background

In 2020, a Virginia constitutional amendment to end gerrymandering in the state was passed and a Virginia Redistricting Commission was established. The Virginia Redistricting Commission's mission is to redraw as needed the state's election maps for both its congressional districts and for its state legislative delegates. This document was developed in response to public comments on the redistricting process being encouraged by the Commission.

## Guiding Principle for Redrawing Virginia Election Maps

The overriding principle for redrawing Virginia's election maps should be that it is "data driven" not partisan driven. Key demographic factors such as ethnicity, race, industry, occupation and educational levels of residents should be the driving forces in shaping any new state election maps.

# Redistricting Criteria for Congressional Districts

## Overview

Any new Virginia congressional district maps needing to be drawn should be guided by the following criteria:

- 1. Incorporate the concept of communities of interest/communities of place
- 2. Congressional district land areas must be contiguous and be of approximate equal population
- 3. Allow for racial fairness
- 4. Don't give a partisan edge
- 5. Preserve existing geographic boundaries
- 6. Reflect the U.S. census data as concerns the number of congressional districts allocated to Virginia.
- 7. The land area chosen for each new congressional district map should be reflective of key demographics.

## Communities of Interest/Communities of Place

The *Virginia Redistricting Commission* has established that one of the criteria for redrawing any Virginia election map is that the map represents a "community of interest" or "community of place". The *National Conference of State Legislatures* (NCSL) has also established this criterion for every state in the United States. Communities of interest share similar historical, cultural, or economic interests. **However, they should not be defined by political affiliation.** 

Wikipedia defines a community of place as such:

"A community of place or place-based community is a <u>community</u> of people who are bound together because of where they reside, work, visit or otherwise spend a continuous portion of their time." Such a community can be a <u>neighborhood</u>, <u>town</u>, <u>coffeehouse</u>, <u>workplace</u>, <u>gathering</u> <u>place</u>, <u>public space</u> or any other geographically specific place that a number of people share, have in common or visit frequently...."

# **Contiguous Space and Equal Populations**

Per past U.S. Supreme Court rulings, each congressional district's land area must be contiguous and each district within the same state must be of approximately equal size in population. In the case of Virginia, this implies that each newly designed district's population must be within a 5% +/- range of one-eleventh of Virginia's current population (currently at **784,201**). At the present time, the following Virginia congressional districts do NOT fall within a 5% +/- range of 784,201: VA-01, VA-02, VA-05, VA-09, VA-10.

### Racial fairness

The redrawn congressional district maps should not intend to or have the effect of diluting the power of minority voters or their ability to elect candidates of their choice.

# No Political Party / Candidate Advantages

The newly redrawn Virginia congressional district maps must not give a partisan edge or advantage to any one political party, candidate or incumbent.

## Preserve Existing Geographic Boundaries

The newly redrawn Virginia congressional district maps should adhere to the guideline of not splitting existing city, town, or county boundaries as much as possible.

### Reflex U.S. Census 2020 data

Unless the U.S. census data 2020 for Virginia indicates otherwise, the number of Virginia congressional districts will remain at eleven (11).

# Reflective of Key Demographics

The newly drawn congressional district maps must take into consideration percentage breakdowns of the following demographics:

- a) Race/Ethnicity % Distribution (White, Black, Hispanic, Asian, etc.)
- b) Industries and Occupations
- c) Urban/Rural breakdown
- d) Education (Enrollment/Level of Educational Achievement)

# Rationale/Criteria for Redrawing a Congressional District Map

The overriding rationale for redrawing the map for any particular Virginia congressional district is to have its demographic attributes fall within a 95 % to 105% range of the averages for those demographic attributes for all of the state congressional districts.

The demographic attributes recommended to be used as benchmarks for redistricting are:

- 1. Urban versus Rural percentage breakdown of a congressional district
- 2. Congressional District Population (use actual count not averages)
- 3. Land Area (square miles)
- 4. Median Household Income
- 5. Race/Ethnicity %s Distribution (White, Black, Hispanic, Asian, etc.)

# Redistricting Decision Matrix for Virginia's Congressional Districts

The primary data source used to develop the Decision Matrix was the most current data available from the US Census Bureau for zip codes/ZCTAs from the American Community Survey's 2019 5-year estimates.

# Blueprint for Redrawing Virginia's Congressional District Maps

## Overview

Any Virginia's congressional district map needing to be redrawn should be based on a **hub-and-spoke** architecture where the hubs are Virginia's 25 most-populated counties and the spokes are adjacent smaller populated counties. The proposed overall congressional district maps architecture is modeled after how the **Virginia Association of Counties -Regions** ("VACo") is organized which currently has thirteen designated state regions and a subset (80+) of all existing counties in the state of Virginia.

## District Architecture -the Hubs

Virginia's 25 most populated counties represent significant communities of interest and place and account for two-thirds of Virginia's total population. These counties can be used as the <u>hubs</u> for any new congressional districts because that is where:

- Most people live in Virginia
- Highest concentration of schools exists
- Highest concentration of jobs and industries exist
- The largest collection of major shopping centers occurs
- Where many major religious centers are located
- And further these counties provide a wide-array of government products and services to their residents and neighboring smaller counties (e.g.; Police, Courts, Utilities, Election Polling Locations & Libraries).

# District Architecture – The Spokes

Each district hub will have attached to it adjacent smaller populated counties going out in wider arcs until a congressional district population of one-eleventh of the total population of Virginia is achieved. The total population of Virginia as of 2020 was: **8,626,210**. The total population of the twenty-five (25) most populated counties in Virginia is: **5,756,900**.

Candidates for the adjacent counties must satisfy the following criteria:

- Either be adjacent to the congressional district hub and/or each other to be in compliance with the "contiguous" rule.
- Should have similar demographics as much as possible as regards:
  - a) Race/Ethnicity % Distribution (White, Black, Hispanic, Asian, etc.)
  - b) Industries and Occupations
  - c) Urban / Rural breakdown
  - d) Education (Enrollment/Level of Educational Achievement)

# Tactics for Redrawing Virginia Election Maps

Develop a Preliminary Set of Election Maps Prior to Receiving 2020 Census Data Virginia has a total of **151** distinct election maps that comprises:

- 11 Virginia congressional districts
- 40 Virginia state senator maps and
- 100 Virginia House of Delegate member maps

If all of Virginia's election maps will have to be at the very least modified (or perhaps completely redrawn) this means the Redistricting Commission would have to produce a daily average of 3.35 new or modified election maps once the 45-day mapping period begins!

To address this time crunch, once the Redistricting Commission has completed the training on the "CityGate GIS" mapping software it is recommended that they develop a preliminary set of new election maps using the U.S. Census data for Virginia from the "American Community Survey 2019 5-year estimates" Then once the US census data for 2020 is received, modify as needed the preliminary set of maps.

# "Divide and Conquer" Methodology for Redrawing Virginia Election Maps

Consider having the 16 members of the Redistricting Commission be divided into three (3) teams of five members each with each team having its own project leader and a sixteen-person chosen as the overriding Project Manager:

- 1. Team #1 would be devoted to redrawing if needed the state's congressional district maps;
- 2. Team #2 would be devoted to redrawing if needed state senator election maps and finally
- 3. Team #3 would be devoted to redrawing if needed Virginia's state delegate election maps

# Resources for Redrawing Virginia Election Maps

# "CityGate GIS" Mapping Software Training Support

The "CityGate GIS" mapping software is a very robust software product but also quite complex. Given the constraints that the Redistricting Commission is operating under (time, learning curve to use the mapping software and possible number of election maps to be redrawn) it is recommended that the Commission reach out for help to other state agencies that have experience with this particular mapping software or similar mapping software. The best likely resource would be the GIS/Demographic Departments of the major populated Virginia counties that are currently using "CityGate GIS"; for example, Prince William County.

# Assistance in Defining Communities of Interest/Place

The Redistricting Commission might consider contacting local school boards, real estate associations, civic organizations such as Rotary Clubs, the Virginia Beach Council of Civic Organizations and regional Chambers of Commerce for their ideas on this topic.

# Redistricting Efforts to Date

## Demographics Data Collection/Organization

As of March, 2021, I have downloaded U.S census data for 2019 for the state of Virginia as it pertains to the existing congressional districts of Virginia and its twenty-five most populated counties. The data has been organized into a set of multiple separate Microsoft Excel 2019 workbooks. Each Excel workbook contains multiple worksheets presented in several formats; raw data, data ranges, tabular and charts (e.g., funnel charts) The data that has been captured includes:

- Congressional district population counts, median incomes and land areas in square miles
- Current political party representing the Congressional district
- Urban/Rural Percentage breakdowns of Congressional districts
- Congressional district ethnicity percentages and population counts
- Congressional district educational levels and resident counts
- Congressional district income brackets and resident counts
- Congressional district industry types and corresponding employment counts
- County population counts, median incomes and land areas in square miles
- County ethnicity percentages and population counts
- Henrico County Programs & Services
- Compilation of a list of all the community colleges in Virginia; enrollment counts and location

## To the Virginia Redistricting Commission:

Following its meeting this past week, I was concerned that the commission's Budget and Finance Subcommittee voted, 5-3, to recommend that the commission issue RFPs seeking legal counsel only from lawyers affiliated with each of the political parties. While I have previously submitted public comments on this issue, I am concerned about how this divided decision could be perceived by the public—and opinion leaders throughout the Commonwealth—at this important point in the commission's process.

As Sen. Newman said, the commission will take a vote and it will be time to move on. But up to now the commission has worked hard to take a bi-partisan approach. It should continue to search for compromise among all the sides that are represented at the table. Hiring partisan counsel may make it easier to sell a redistricting plan to legislators. It may, however, make it more difficult to sell a plan to the citizens of Virginia, some of whom remain deeply cynical about whether our voter-approved redistricting process can work. In addition, political commentators will likely point to the decision as a victory for the same old supporters of political gerrymandering.

### Some observations:

- 1) The subcommittee rejected the idea of issuing an RFP for non-partisan or neutral counsel. Issuing these RFPs would be the easiest way to confirm, as some of the legislators insist, that there is no such thing as a non-partisan redistricting expert. However, by refusing to even issue the RFPs, the commission is sending a message that its mind is already made up, and it's not open to any other approach. What kind of a message does that send to Virginia citizens before the commission has even scheduled its first public hearing? Are your minds already made up? Are you willing to even consider approaches other than those taken in the past by commission members, who, as members of the General Assembly have now set themselves up as the "experts" on redistricting?
- 2) The commission has been more than happy to accept non-partisan legal advice from the lawyers who work for the Division of Legislative Services and/or the Office of the Attorney General. Why is this legal question so different? Can't you at least pose the question to the legal profession and see who offers their services?
- 3) Over the past decade, Virgnia taxpayers have been forced to bear many of the costs associated with legal battles over gerrymandered districts. As some commissioners noted, hiring two counsels to represent the parties' views may make it easier to sell a plan to partisan legislators, but it will amount to a continued waste of taxpayer money. If the parties need to hire counsel to provide advice from a partisan perspective, let their respective caucuses foot the bill. If helpful, let those lawyers testify before the commission—or submit public comments—just like the rest of us will have to if we want our views to be considered. If the partisan lawyers raise valid points, the commission, can, as a whole, consider their opinions and respond.

So far, the commission has come up with many creative ideas for preserving its bi-partisan approach, and has done an admirable job of keeping politics out of its deliberations. The judicial selection panel did the same thing with the applicants that it reviewed. As a matter of course, you should always ask yourselves: is a compromise possible? While decisions on RFPs were delegated to the Budget and Finance Subcommittee, this is, in fact, a "bigger" decision than just a procurement document, and one the whole commission should discuss thoughtfully.

May I offer a compromise approach that will keep YOUR options open for a brief period of time and communicate that you are more open-minded than your initial vote suggested:

- 1) Issue the RFPs for neutral or non-partisan legal counsel (as well as the partisan RFPs).
- 2) Try to make a choice from among the respondents to the first group of RFPs. If the choice cannot be unanimous, at least follow the same guidelines that you will have to follow when you approve your ultimate plan, namely that the lawyer or law firm must be the choice of a supermajority of commission members.
- 3) If no lawyer responds, or responders to the non-partisan RFP are not qualified, then proceed to award contracts to two party-affiliated firms.
- 4) If commissioners don't feel they have the time to scope out the partisan leanings of lawyers purporting to be non-partisan, publicize their names and let other partisan activists do it for you.
- 5) If the commission still cannot decide on a single counsel, let commission members affiliated with each of the parties pick a firm from those that responded to the non-partisan RFP.

While time is of the essence, this decision is important enough that it should not be rushed through the full commission on June 7. There will still be time to make a decision from a bigger pool of respondents by early July. This approach will provide commission members with two more weeks to reflect on the issue and hear from the public, and to more carefully determine what kind of legal advice is actually available.

In the end, the commission may still end up hiring partisan counsel. Following this kind of approach, however, will at least communicate to the public that members are trying to keep an open mind on the issue—and still trying to seek a consensus. In all of your deliberations, that should be your ultimate goal.

# Citizen Engagement - Hearings and Guidelines

Commissioners -

- 1. The draft RFP for Communications and Outreach Services asks for a workplan that would identify "Appropriate hours for meetings for each target community to accommodate all residents (e.g., regular business hours, on weekends, or during evening hours)." The proposed hearing schedule does not allow for consideration of weekends.
- 2. The Note under the schedule for "Virtual Public Hearings" states "\*Virtual public hearings provide members of the public from all regions the opportunity to speak." I don't believe this was the intent of the Citizen Engagement Subcommittee. There was much discussion at their May 26 meeting about the importance of focusing on each region. I agree with Del. Adams who suggested having the inperson not confined to region because map lines may make it easier to get to another site. However, he would make the virtual hearings regional and use libraries for online access. Mr. Harrell added "if virtual meetings are open to all, the same people could speak every time." He also suggested priority be given to the locality in virtual meetings.
- 3. Signs at hearings? The "Rules of Conduct" under "Public Participation Guidelines" prohibit "Banners, Signs, bullhorns, or similar devices . . . " There may be members of the public who would like to use a sign to indicate their "Community of Interest" or suggestion for districts. (For example: I have an 24" x 18" map on a sign to accompany my presentation.) Signs of this type should be allowed.
- 4. Please ensure there is a method for persons who sign up to speak to know when their time is approaching. We could then be ready to quickly come to the podium. This would also be much more efficient for virtual hearings.
- 5. There should also be a way for all commissioners at the virtual hearings to be viewed at the same time. It has been less than ideal for those of us who are now watching the live-streaming of Commission meetings. Unless we are signed up to speak in person, the live-stream shows only the speaker, not the full commission.

### **Budget for Map Drawing Services -**

- 1. As you consider the line item in the budget for "map drawing services," I hope you will not see this as a place to
- 2. There are many very qualified experts to guide you through the various components of map drawing from concise population demands to requirements of the Voting Rights Act to prioritizing criteria such as Communities of Interest.
- 3. From the very first meeting of the Commission, there has been discussion about the process of map drawing.
- 4. Some legislators have considerable experience with drawing maps and feel the Commission can "come up with maps fair to everybody."
- 5. While several citizen commissioners have taken advantage of an opportunity to train on Citygate software, their experience seems to have been mixed.
- 6. The Commission needs to hire as many experts as would be necessary to ensure all commissioners citizens and legislators - are comfortable with the map drawing process.
- 7. Most importantly citizens should feel that their voice is heard as maps are drawn. Legislators that have drawn maps in the past have not made the interest of voters their top priority.

### What should be the starting point for map drawing?

- 1. While it would perhaps be considered less expensive and time-consuming to "tweak" existing maps, fair redistricting for Virginia must begin with a fresh map.
- 2. The problems of gerrymandering, e.g. split precincts have resulted from simply shifting lines every ten years just enough to benefit a particular party or incumbent.
- 3. As Communities of Interest, our counties need more cohesive representation. I reside in Stafford County which has three House Districts and three State Senate districts. The Commission should use this historic opportunity to divide counties into fewer districts.
- 4. Many Virginia cities also want to no longer be divided into multiple districts.
- 5. The needs of these and other citizen-drawn COI would be much easier to accommodate if the map was started from a blank slate.
- 6. If current districts are just "tweaked", it would be too easy to draw the map to accommodate a single legislator. If created with COI as a priority, there would be no need for legislator addresses.

Dear Ms. Harris and Ms. Babichenko,

We applaud and appreciate the time and effort on the part of all Commissioners and Division of Legislative Services staff to address needed contractual and budget issues and to develop Public Participation Guidelines during the seven subcommittee meetings held over the last three weeks.

We are writing today to address several concerns regarding the Communications and Outreach Services Request for Proposal (RFP), improvements to the Commission website, and the need for an effective public outreach campaign to maximize public participation in the public hearings proposed to be held beginning in July.

The draft RFP describes a broad "scope of services" including traditional press/public relations, social media presence development/management, public input compilation/maintenance in a database/periodic reporting and analysis to the Commission and public hearing management. (see draft Request for Proposal – Communications and Outreach Services, pp. 3-4)

The RFP also requires a work plan that will include strategies to increase public engagement and input in the development of draft redistricting maps, with particular focus on communities of interest, underserved communities and communities historically disengaged from the redistricting process, appropriate translation services, website enhancements to maximize interest, user friendliness, traffic and engagement, a media and public relations strategy, a variety of tools to solicit broad and diverse community input and a methodology for producing useful and appropriate data for drawing district maps from public comment and other sources of information (see draft Request for Proposal – Communications and Outreach Services, p. 6)

This is a significant portfolio, a broad range of responsibility. And the work starts, at the very earliest, on July 12, one day before the first public hearing is to be held, according to the draft public hearing schedule.

The work of the Citizen Engagement Subcommittee should continue in earnest between now and July 12. And much of the focus should be on the Commission website.

## <u>Capability to receive comments and proposals from citizens on the Commission website</u>

The content and design of the Commission website needs to be improved to more effectively meet the statutory requirements to receive and consider public comments.

<u>To make a live public comment</u>: There are two ways website visitors can currently accomplish this –

- 1) From the website Home page, click 'About Us', then click on 'FAQ'. If the website visitor does not know where to find this, they will probably click on several of the top level links until they find it. Then they must click back to the Home page, select 'Meetings and Hearings' and follow the instructions provided in 'FAQ'.
- 2) To actually register to make a public comment, from the website Home page, a visitor clicks on 'Meetings and Hearings', locates the specific meeting date, clicks on the Agenda and selects the link to register. (Occasionally, there will be a separate link to register to speak without opening the Agenda, but this option is not available on a regular basis).

## To submit a written comment:

There is no explanation of how to make a written comment on the 'FAQ' page.

The only location that offers guidance on how to make a written comment is within the Agenda for each meeting:

The comment will be posted on the Division's website at: https://virginiaredistricting.org/. Please note that comments will be posted in full including the name of the commenter and any contact information provided.

Written comments are then attached only to the meeting dates proximate to the date of their submission; they are not organized by content. Also, timely posting of written public comments is crucial.

Adoption of Public Participation Guidelines and their inclusion on the website and in public notices will provide much needed clarification. However, these guidelines should be amended to describe how citizens can provide place-based geographic recommendations regarding community of interest (COI) or State or Congressional election district(s) in the form of shape files. Public comments in the form of shape files need to be compatible with the map-drawing software to be used by the Commission. This gap needs to be addressed as the Commission will rely on citizen input to assist in meeting the community of interest criterion contained in the Virginia code.

Also, citizens can provide COI input at any time; such input does <u>not</u> need to be based on new census data, as COI input is an individual or a group's definition of their community. Therefore, citizens can provide meaningful COI input now and throughout the summer, including during the first round of public hearings scheduled to begin on July 13.

We also urge the Commission to enhance the website to include a module or portal dedicated to accepting and organized citizen comment and proposals and address the concerns noted above. We fully support the recommendations of previous commenters that the Commission

implement a function similar to the Michigan Redistricting Commission's "Public Comment Portal" https://www.michigan-mapping.org.

The Michigan portal is a well-organized user-friendly process for submitting text comments as well as shape files for either communities of interest or election districts. Public comments are uploaded in real time, are searchable by tags and are not linked solely to a particular commission meeting. Although it would be beneficial if this feature is available at the earliest possible date, we urge the Commission to make sure that the development of such a module is one of the key tasks of the Communication and Outreach specialist.

## Update and reorganize other parts of website

The website needs a basic overarching narrative of the process and description of the Commission's core activities as well as a detailed timeline of events and milestones. Both are necessary to effectively inform citizens about the redistricting process, and how and when citizens can participate. This is particularly important for providing information to interested citizens who may be unfamiliar with the new redistricting process in Virginia.

The website also needs regular updates to keep citizens informed of major developments and future milestones. For example, the most recent item in the "News" tab is dated February 12, 2021.

Significant news items such as the announcement of the July public hearings should be prominently featured on the Home page of the website and not under a tab. The 'FAQ' section of the website also needs to be updated on a regular basis and more prominently featured on the Home page.

Other sections of the website such as 'Publications', 'Criteria', 'Maps and Data' and 'Plan Reports' are basically files from previous redistricting cycles; they are of limited value to the 2021 redistricting cycle. These should be organized under a heading/title that so indicates to avoid confusion with current law and criteria.

In conclusion, we urge the Commission to pursue a robust public outreach effort, including targeted website improvements, to maximize citizen participation in the July public hearings and the overall redistricting process. To that end, we suggest the Commission work closely with the Communications and Outreach Services contractor to fully implement the work plan elements laid out in the RFP.

The new website is very attractive. However, you have a problem with the links both from DLS and within the website itself. The website URL is http://www.virginiaredistricting.org/ and all the links should begin that way. Instead, the links are written with https:// in the URLs. The result is that I get an error message: Warning: Potential Security Risk Ahead.

Some users may not have their browsers set up to warn about security risks while others may not be able to access your site at all. I've encountered the problem before so I tried dropping the s off http and found that worked.

You need to do one of two things. Either correct all the links to http or else correctly make use of https which ensures a more secure connection. Since you are collecting emails for a mailing list, you really should choose the latter, more secure method. The sooner this is done, the better, but certainly before you begin to accept uploaded Communities of Interest maps.

I appreciated your responsiveness to my request for closed captioning and I hope to see this fixed quickly as well. Thank you for all your support as we Virginians jointly map our future.

I have spoken and written to you before, but I think it's important to share my ideas again as you make some key decisions today.

**Transparency** is a key strength of this new redistricting process. Virginians voted – they clearly want this process to be fair, open and as non-partisan as possible.

### **Public Engagement**

- We are pleased that a **listserv** has been created to improve communications with the public; however, I have received only one email so far. I hope we will receive them more frequently in the future.
- The stand-alone Commission website is a step in the right direction, but it definitely needs improvement. Please consider hiring a webmaster to create and maintain a high quality website. Michigan's redistricting website is, in my opinion, the "gold standard". I know that at least two Commissioners have visited the website and agree that it is an effective one. One key feature is the public input portal which is like a Google form -- it is so easy to submit comments, shapefiles and Comm of Interest maps; there is no need to use an email address. The comments appear to be automatically uploaded into a "Gallery" in "real time. In the Gallery, Commissioners and the public can sort comments by region, date, or topic, and view every submission. There is no need to wait until a couple hours before a meeting begins to read the comments.
- I recommend that the Commission **hire a communications director** who can determine how best to reach all Virginians whether it's print media, radio, or social media. Use our tax dollars wisely. It should not be necessary to spend \$160,000 on print media (which most of us never saw). Keep in mind, too, that the League of Women Voters, One Virginia 2021, the NAACP, VCET and other organizations are ready to help inform the public of important hearings, etc.
- Schedule as many public hearings as possible to hear from Virginians. I hope that you will consider using the 21 Planning Districts, rather than the 8 Weldon Cooper regions as you schedule hearings. I urge you to consider holding 8 inperson hearings before map drawing begins. It's vitally important to hear citizens' input and respect that input as you begin to draw lines. In-person hearings should also allow for virtual participation as well.
- Keep in mind that some regions are dense in population, so be prepared for many hours of testimony. (Note that Michigan held its first or 16 public hearings in May over 150 people signed up to speak!) Other regions may have fewer people, but in-person hearings are very important for the many residents who have broadband and/or transportation issues.
- Consider adding evening and weekend hours, which would allow working Virginians to attend hearings. Many people cannot "attend' Commission hearings because they are working at 10 am and 2 pm. Do not shut them out from the hearings as well.
- I think it is important that **all Commissioners attend every public hearing** either in-person or virtually (as is required of Commissioners in Michigan and California). In order to understand what Virginians want, you must listen to us.

#### **Drawing the maps**

- The Commission should **hire a special master** to draw the maps for the House, Senate and Congressional districts. It's important for those maps to be **drawn "from scratch"** incumbent protection should not be a consideration (which it will be if partisan (legislator) Commissioners take control of the map-drawing process). Because of the 45-day time constraints, a special master may be more efficient in this new map-drawing process.
- Just **one special master** (**or two if necessary**) (rather than 3 separate map drawers) should be responsible for drawing all 3 sets of maps. This would allow the House, Senate and Congressional districts to be coordinated as much as possible so that precincts, municipalities, cities and counties are not split unnecessarily.

#### **Legal Counsel**

I have written about my disappointment in the highly-partisan discussion about hiring two sets of legal counsel. I still hope that RFPs can be issued for a neutral, non-partisan legal team – as well as two RFPs for Democrat and Republican legal teams.

I would like to comment on the process and timeline the Redistricting Commission is using to redraw if needed the state's election maps.

Virginia has a total of 151 distinct election maps that includes:

- 11 Virginia congressional districts
- 40 Virginia state senator districts (representing an equal number of single-member constitutional districts) and
- 100 Virginia House of Delegate member maps.

Assuming the worst-case scenario that all of Virginia's election maps will have to be at the very least modified (or perhaps completely redrawn) this means the Redistricting Commission would have to produce an average of 3.35 new or modified election maps per day, once the 45-day mapping period begins!

I would like to propose a "divide and conquer" strategy for how the Redistricting Commission approaches how it will redraw any election maps. Consider having the 16 members of the Redistricting Commission be divided into three (3) teams of five members each with each team having its own project leader and a sixteen person would be chosen as the overriding Project Manager:

- Team #1 would be devoted to redrawing if needed the state's congressional district maps;
- Team #2 would be devoted to redrawing if needed Virginia's state senator election maps and finally
- Team #3 would be devoted to redrawing if needed Virginia's state delegate election maps.

Public engagement and transparency are the two most valuable requirements in this new redistricting process. I have several suggestions that I hope that you will consider seriously to engage robustly with your constituents and provide maximum transparency. I apologize for the length of this comment, but these issues are very important to me and others.

Rename the subcommittee. Please consider changing this subcommittee's name to PUBLIC Engagement, rather than Citizen Engagement. Using the term "public" is more inclusive and invites all Virginians, not just US citizens, to participate because they are all stakeholders.

Create and maintain a user-friendly, robust website. Hire a webmaster who can create and maintain an informative, well-organized, and user-friendly website. I applaud DLS' creation of a new website that is dedicated to the Redistricting Commission. That is a step in the right direction, but it can be improved. We recognize that DLS staff are devoting many hours to support this Commission and this process; contracting with a professional webmaster would improve public engagement while relieving the DLS staff of this task, allowing them to focus on the other tasks they are charged with.

As Ms. Babichenko and Mr. Abrenio have suggested, the Michigan Redistricting Commission's website is excellent! I urge you to take a look: https://www.michigan-mapping.org/ One of its key features is a user-friendly Citizen Portal to submit comments; it's front and center on the landing page. It is designed as a google form which allows the public to enter the information directly and easily. No one needs to search for the email address. The submissions appear to be uploaded into the website's Gallery in "real time". This Gallery shows all of the submissions for everyone to view. Submissions are tagged and sortable by topic. Currently, Virginia's public comments are uploaded just hours prior to meetings, which is not enough time for Commissioners and citizens to review before the meeting begins. They are "attached" only to the meeting(s) held that day/week.

Schedule numerous public hearings in all regions of the Commonwealth. It is vital to hold as many public hearings as possible, in person, as well as virtually. It is vital that you schedule many more public hearings prior to drawing the lines. You need to hear from Virginians about their Communities of Interest, which you must respect when drawing maps. I submit that 8 hearings are inadequate.

It is important to hold hearings in different geographic areas – especially where broadband and internet are not reliably available to all. Using the 8 Weldon Cooper regions may be appropriate, but do not rely solely on those categories. Please consider using the 21 Planning Districts of Virginia, which provide naturally-organized regions. If a region or district is geographically large and requires long hours of driving, you may need to schedule a second or even third hearing in that area. If a region or district (e.g., Cooper's Northern region) has a very large population, you may need to schedule an extra hearing to accommodate all the citizens who may want to testify.

Also, please realize that each hearing may need to last longer than 3 hours. Michigan's first public hearing a few weeks ago attracted 150 speakers! Also – some or all hearings should be held in the evenings or weekends to allow working Virginians to fully participate. Note that Michigan's 16 hearings are all scheduled for the late afternoon and evening. California's meetings and hearings are likewise scheduled to allow more public participation.

Attendance should be required of all Commissioners at every hearing, either virtually or in person. Note that Michigan and California Commissioners are expected to attend ALL hearings inperson. Michigan Commissioners who cannot attend must file a "Notice of Remote Attendance" that explains why (s)he cannot attend. For Virginia, I strongly believe that at least half (8)

Commissioners should be present, in-person, at every hearing. All others should attend remotely. I agree with this subcommittee's recommendation that there should be a balance between citizens and legislators, Democrats and Republicans.

Yes, this will require more driving and more time of each Commissioner. Transportation and accommodation costs will be acceptable expenses if they allow the public full access to the Commission and this redistricting process.

All California Commissioners traveled to every hearing throughout their state, with few absences in 2011. They felt that their presence was important.

Outreach is critical, but it doesn't need to be expensive. Learning that \$160,000 was spent on publicity by the Selection Committee in December was surprising, even shocking. I wonder how many of the eight citizen Commissioners learned of the application process via those paid **ads.** In other words, were those ads effective and worth the money?

**Hire a communications expert** to determine the best ways to reach the most Virginians as you begin your engagement with the public.

We also suggest that you utilize the network of organizations that have, and continue to, inform the public about the redistricting meetings and process. The League of Women Voters has been reaching out to its members and to the greater public on redistricting for many years. Our efforts to get the word out about the Constitutional Amendment and the Citizen Application process have been strenuous and effective. We continue to attend every Commission and subcommittee meeting, sharing notes via our website and on social media. It is not necessary to spend hundreds of thousands of dollars.

Other community organizations such as VCET, NBNRO, and OneVirginia2021 stand ready as well. Press releases should be widely utilized. Libraries, community centers, government buildings and other public spaces can post flyers. The Commission should also establish its own robust social media presence in order to engage with Virginians.

Accessibility should be improved. As I have mentioned before, sharing information in different languages, and providing accurate closed captioning are vital to reaching many Virginians.

I hope that you will seriously consider all the recommendations that I have provided here.

At a previous meeting of the Citizen Engagement Subcommittee, I was delighted to hear several references to the Michigan Independent Redistricting Commission Web portal.

The new Redistricting Commission Web page is quite nice with lovely pictures and easy to navigate, but it really lacks the capability to organize and share input from the public Have you approached the Michigan Commission to learn the cost for their page? I believe it was developed with the assistance of Moon Duchin of Tufts University's MGGG Redistricting Lab. It might be good to determine the cost for this before your budget is finalized.

As you look further for consultants to assist the Commission, you may also want to discuss with the MGGG Redistricting Lab their capability to evaluate and compare maps from COIs particularly with minority communities in mind. They are a highly respected, nonpartisan group of mathematicians, data scientists, geographers, software developers, and civic researchers that could make a valuable contribution to the Commissions efforts. Ms. Duchin could be reached through contact@mggg.org.

I became familiar with the work of the MGGG Redistricting Lab while volunteering for redistricting reform in Virginia. If I had been selected as a Citizen Commissioner, that is one of the first contacts I would have suggested for the Commission. I am quite happy though to watch as you all begin progress toward fair maps for Virginia and am also pleased to assist in any way in getting the word out to all Virginians.

Note - A version of this suggestion was sent immediately after the May 20 subcommittee meeting, but I didn't receive a response from DLS. A second similar email was sent May 23. This is the third attempt to share my suggestion that the Commission investigate costs for a Web portal similar to that of the Michigan Independent Redistricting Commission. I have received no response and they have not been published under "Comments."

I sincerely hope it will be easier to communicate with Commission members in the future.

To members of the Budget & Finance Subcommittee, and the members of the full Redistricting Commission:

There has been discussion about hiring lawyers. That is a separate topic that I have already addressed. Here are my recommendations for the Commission :: please consider hiring experts in:

<u>Mapping</u> – someone who may be a mathematician and/or political scientist who understands how to draw maps, as well as how to evaluate maps for criteria such ethnic/language/racial- minority representation and compactness, as well as Communities of Interest. Two such experts that I am familiar with are:

<u>Moon Duchin</u>, Tufts University: MGGG Lab\_(Metric Geometry and Gerrymandering Group) <u>https://mggg.org/people/mduchin/</u>

<u>Bernard Grofman</u>, mathematician and political scientist University of California, Irvine. Mr. Grofman was hired as the special master who was hired to re-establish boundaries for Congressional District 3 in 2015, as well as re-drawing the lines in 2019 for the eleven (11) House districts that were racially gerrymandered.

<u>Communications</u> – someone who knows how to provide information to the public in an effective manner. The Commission is charged with providing timely notice in a variety of languages to Virginians. You need an expert in this field to help the Commission accomplish this mandated goal. We, the citizens, were surprised and not pleased to learn that the Selection Committee spent \$160,000 to advertise the Citizen Commissioners Application process. No one that I know ever saw a Selection-Committee's paid media ad or article about this. We wonder how many of the current citizen members of the Commission were motivated to apply because of paid advertising?

One communications consultant that I am aware of is Beau Cribbs https://www.linkedin.com/in/beaucribbs

Website development – to create and maintain an effective, user-friendly website dedicated specifically to the Commission and its work. I would highly recommend the website for the Michigan Redistricting Commission. It is extremely user-friendly and provides information, including a Citizen portal with a user-friendly, fillable "google-form" collects information from the public and automatically uploads the submission into a "Gallery". This Gallery, also very user-friendly, "is a collection of public comments which are sortable by tags ("COIs" "Districting Plan" " Written Testimony"). We are very pleased that DLS has created a separate website that is dedicated to the Commission. It is a step in the right direction. However, improvements can be made. (For one thing, the print on the page is very small; this is difficult for older folks like me to read easily) Currently, public comments are sent to an email address and uploaded only hours before a scheduled meeting, rather than in "real time". (Actually, no comments were posted for yesterday's Commission meeting or today's subcommittee meeting. Why is that? Perhaps DLS staff was overburdened.) Comments that I submitted in February have never been posted; in fact there are NO February comments posted except for one. That seems unusual. Another improvement would be to post new materials as separate documents in the "Materials" tab, rather than appended to the previous document). This is why a website manager may be needed.

Dear Commissioners,

I am a resident of Arlington. I am Co-coordinator of the Redistricting Issues Group of the League of Women Voters of Virginia. I have been working for #fair redistricting for Virginia for many years.

I am writing to encourage you to conduct a thorough and energetic search for the Unicorn. As elusive as it may be, it may be possible to find one if you are determined and resourceful. Perhaps some of our community non-profit, nonpartisan groups can assist you in the search! Most of us are fully-immunized and ready to venture into the world and embark on a hunt for the elusive unicorn with you!

But, seriously, I must protest the highly-partisan nature of the discussion at the first meeting of the Budget and Finance Subcommittee on May 19<sup>th</sup>. Senators Barker and Newman insisted that there is no attorney or law firm on earth that would be neutral or non-partisan :: neither Democrat- nor Republican-leaning. Senator Barker said, "We should make sure nobody's interest is disregarded in any way." May I remind the Commission that the people's interest should be represented. The Senators' statements demonstrate a negative and highly partisan attitude that they have perhaps developed over decades of political life. This is exactly why Virginia voters voted overwhelmingly for the Constitutional Amendment to establish this Commission. We ask the legislators to put down your political swords and keep in mind the task that we have given you: to draw fair maps for Virginia. As Director Wade stated, the law clearly states that "any attorney would be hired for the full Commission." Not one for the Republicans and one for the Democrats. One for the Commission and the people of Virginia.

We also ask that you respect the hard-working voters of Virginia and use our taxpayer dollars wisely. Hiring two legal experts or firms will be very expensive, I'm sure. I would much rather see that those funds are used to hire experts in other fields, including mathematics/political science/redistricting, communications, and website and graphic design. As Commissioner Kumar suggested, you must be "good stewards" of Virginians' monies.

#### To the Commissioners:

Having monitored most of the meetings of the commission and its subcommittees since the commission was organized, I want to praise the spirit of bipartisanship and civility in which its meetings have been conducted. While the drafters of the constitutional amendment did not call for the appointment of rotating co-chairs to manage the commission's business, that has turned out to be a good solution for what could have been an early source of conflict. This approach has also contributed to the atmosphere of fairness and cooperation that the commission projects.

That's why I listened with alarm this past week as the legislator members of the Budget and Finance Subcommittee called for spending the commission's precious taxpayer dollars on hiring two sets of counsel, one watching out for the needs of each political party, rather than a single lawyer who would represent the interests of the commission—and thus the citizen of the Commonwealth. I agree with those citizen members who said this would be of grave concern to Virginia citizens who worked to ratify the amendment and all of those who voted for it. I also agree that most Virginians would consider this a waste of taxpayer money, particularly when the commission has not yet moved aggressively to improve and expand the communications capabilities of the commission and the Division of Legislative Services staff.

(As an aside, part of the problem on the communications side is that the well-meaning DLS staff traditionally must respond to the questions and needs of the General Assembly. While DLS must communicate about the business of the General Assembly, it does so in an encyclopedic way, not one designed to engage with all of the state's citizens and encourage them to become part of a complicated process. Specific attention to this would also help commission members process all of the input they have and will receive—including this comment I am submitting.)

Legislative members suggested that hunting for non-partisan legal representation would amount to searching for "a unicorn." When I first began working on redistricting reform for the League of Women Voters in 2005, the passage of a constitutional amendment to create a bi-partisan, citizen-led commission also seemed like a "unicorn." But with a lot of hard work by many people and organizations, that did not turn out to be the case.

If the legislators insist on hiring a lawyer to monitor the commission's work for fairness to their particular political party, let the state political parties or the legislature's political caucuses foot that bill. Surely there will be many people, lawyers or not, scrutinizing the commission's ultimate maps. The parties can make their case that a map is not fair to them from the vantage point of "outsiders," not people at the table. The commission will need legal advice on its process and whether the maps comply with civil and voting rights laws, not how well they reflect the concerns of the "communities of interest" of the two political parties.

If the commission votes on this issue and chooses to seek two attorneys, I hope that the commission will at least issue another Request for a Proposal for a single counsel, just to see if that proverbial unicorn is hiding in the woods. I am not a lawyer and have no one to suggest, even if it would be appropriate to do so. I will note, however, that the gerrymandering that

occurred nationwide in the last redistricting cycle fueled an explosion of non-partisan organizations dedicated to monitoring redistricting and wrestling with all of the underlying issues relating to how "fairness" is defined. Further, I suspect there are many younger lawyers who were motivated to make it their field of expertise, in the same way many of us were motivated to work to change the way redistricting had been done in the Commonwealth since the days of Patrick Henry. To cite just one example—and I'm not suggesting he be hired—a member of the College of William and Mary Law School's map-drawing team in the 2010 redistricting map competition in Virginia was so animated by what he learned in that process that he worked for most of the rest of the decade as the executive director of OneVirginia2021 to seek a bipartisan solution.

As one commissioner noted, many eyes are on the commission this year—and not just people who live in Virginia. Amid all the partisan rancor in our country today, the commission has a chance to demonstrate clearly that there is a new way of doing redistricting than the way it has been done in the past.

## Incumbents' addresses and map redrawing

Dear Members of the Redistricting Commission:

Here are remarks that I made as a public participant at the May 10 Commission meeting. I am sending the text in hopes that Commission Members who were absent from the meeting will have the chance to read them. Thank you for your attention and consideration.

I am a resident of rural southern Albemarle County. I represent just myself, not any group or other individuals. This is the first meeting I have been able to attend, though I have watched recorded videos of previous meetings.

Today I wish to address an issue that came up in the Redistricting 101 training video, about including addresses of incumbent officials with census and other data used to determine district boundaries.

In the video, this topic followed sequentially after other topics as they were covered by various statutory criteria deriving from either federal law or Virginia Constitution or code.

But it should be made clear that incumbency as a factor does not derive from the law, the Constitution, or regulatory code. It is not a statutory requirement.

The fact that the Joint Reapportionment Committee in October 2020 "approved ... legislator addresses" as part of data, should not confer any regulatory status upon such data, or require its use.

Neither does the fact that using such data was accepted practice in past redistricting cycles. In fact, it does the opposite. The demand for a nonpartisan redistricting commission arose from the need to do away with such past practices.

Virginia's electoral maps belong to the voters of Virginia, not the incumbents. Even the hint that even one district might be drawn to accommodate a sitting elected official smacks of the kind of back-room manipulation that plagued past practices.

The addresses of current incumbents is information that should not be considered part of any values or criteria that the Commission uses to determine how to draw a fair map.

Dear Commission.

I am a Virginia resident and I'm tired of living in a non-competitive district. Our congressional representative, H. Morgan Griffith, does very little for our area (District 9) and yet there is no way to hold him accountable, because he easily wins with about 70% of the vote every time. He has even said so himself; he knows he is guaranteed a win no matter how much or how little he does. He has declined to meet with constituents, or hold town hall meetings, because he complains that the district is too large to do so. Our district IS large--it's slightly larger than the state of New Jersey, in fact. Even a key endorsement he received, from a local paper, in 2018, endorsed him only reluctantly, acknowledging the fact that he doesn't work hard for our district, doesn't bring in jobs or talk to constituents or help solve their problems, and spends most of his time posturing to demonstrate his allegiance to the Republican Party, rather than finding out what our district needs and working to help us in measurable ways. The endorsement rested only on the paper's acknowledgement that "most people in the district want a conservative representative," and his was the name with an "R" next to it on the ballot. This situation is frustrating, to say the least.

I hope that the commission will take the trouble to draw district lines that ensure that every district is competitive. Non-competitive districts are good for no one except incumbents; no one even bothered to run against Griffith in 2020, recognizing the hopelessness of the situation, and leaving voters with no choice at all. I hope the commission also makes districts physically smaller, so that politicians can't hide behind the excuse of physical size to avoid meeting with and being accountable to the public.

Independent Redistricting Commissions Prepare Preliminary Data

The Colorado Independent Congressional and Legislative Redistricting Commissions have both approved a data set to allow them to prepare preliminary redistricting maps. Because census redistricting data will not be released until August 2021, the commissions agreed that proceeding with preliminary data gives them the best chance of completing their work and receiving valuable feedback without delaying the 2022 election calendar.

Redistricting commissions staff and the Colorado State Demography Office have worked together to create the data set, using as a benchmark the recently released state resident population from the US Census Bureau of 5,773,714. The preliminary data comes from the Census Bureau's American Community Survey and state population forecasts, and its distribution is based on the Census Bureau's Master Address File. The total population number will match the redistricting data exactly, and the distribution should be a close match.

The preliminary maps will be prepared on 2010 census blocks, which means the geometry will not align exactly with the 2020 census blocks that will be used for the final maps. This allows the data to be more accessible to the public, and the commissions believe it will only marginally impact the quality of the preliminary maps.

Once it is complete, the commissions' data set will be publicly available, and interested persons will be able to draw their own maps using the commissions' redistricting GIS portal.

The Independent Congressional Redistricting Commission anticipates receiving a preliminary congressional map from staff by June 23, 2021. The Independent Legislative Redistricting Commission will receive preliminary State House and State Senate maps by June 28, 2021. Both commissions will review these preliminary maps and seek public comment on them through a series of public hearings held throughout the state in July and August.

When the full, block-level redistricting data is released by the Census Bureau in August, staff will prepare maps for the commissions using this final data on 2020 census blocks. Thus no final approved maps will use the preliminary data set. The commissions have also set aside time in their schedules to allow for public review and comment on the proposed final maps.

# May 17 Citizen Engagement Subcommittee Meeting: Points to Consider Further

The Citizen Engagement Subcommittee meeting was substantive, moving through the agenda efficiently but with thoughtful discussion.

Here are the points in the discussion we think are important to consider further:

#### 1. The public hearings

Pre-map drawing hearings:

- Timing: the pre-map drawing hearings should occur well before the Census numbers are received by the Commission, concluding by the end of the first week in August.
- Number of pre-map drawing hearings: there should be pre-map drawing hearings in at least 7-8 regional hubs based upon
  - the eight hearing locations used by the joint House and Senate Committees in 2011 (see p. 11 of "Drawing the Line 2011" in attached pdf) OR
  - regions based on those identified in the University of Virginia Weldon Cooper Center "Virginia's Demographic Regions" (see attached pdf)
- Format: We believe each pre-map drawing hearing should be held in-person with a virtual component. The Subcommittee can decide on the number of Commissioners to attend in person. Citizens should be able to access the meeting in person. The remainder of the Commission and all interested citizens should be able to attend the same hearing virtually. This would maximize the citizen participation possibilities.

Given that the 2020 constitutional amendment and subsequent code provide a much stronger mandate to engage the public than existed in 2011, we believe the Commission should have at least as many in-person public meetings as were held in 2011.

Post-map drawing hearings:

- Timing: the post-map drawing hearings should be held after the Commission completes the map drawing and the maps have been posted on the Commission website long enough for the public to study them and formulate specific questions
- · Number of post-map drawing hearings: replicate the number of hearings held pre-map drawing
- Format: due to the time constraint for the Commission to submit completed maps to the General Assembly, each post-map drawing hearing should be held virtually, focused on each of the regions where pre-map drawing hearings were held, but open to everyone.

#### 2. Advertising, accessibility and additional outreach and communication

Many citizens and advocates have commented on the vital importance of the stand-alone Virginia Redistricting Commission website. The website is a key, statutorily-required component of the Commission's effort to both educate the public about its work and to receive public input. It should be accessible in all languages that are used on ballots in state and local elections.

Though aspects of the website were discussed on May 17, there was no specific discussion of the website structure and rollout schedule. We urge the subcommittee to agree on the structure, content and schedule for website completion during the next two meetings.

We would like to associate ourselves with the remark of Del. McQuinn: "We don't let the budget drive us, we drive the budget." This should apply to the website as well as other functions of the Commission.

During the discussion about additional outreach and communications needs, several Commissioners asked questions about citizen-produced community-of-interest (COI) maps - how are they to be received? One Commissioner asked specifically, to paraphrase - if the Commission had a question about a COI map, how would they ask it if they are not permitted to speak directly with citizens? The DLS staff response indicated that this type of exchange would be permitted during the public meetings. There must be more permissible avenues of communication between the commissioners and the public; the website, open to all, would be such an avenue.

We suggest that the Subcommittee and the entire Commission study the Michigan Independent Citizens Redistricting Commission's (MICRC) Online Public Comment Portal located on the home page of the MICRC website: https://www.michigan.gov/micrc/ Virginia could stand up a portal as a component of the stand-alone Commission website, working with the group that created the Michigan portal. The Virginia portal would facilitate the collection of citizen

These are the remarks that I presented in-person (virtually) at the April 26th Commission meeting. It has come to my attention that several Commissioners were not in attendance at that meeting. Furthermore, my suggestions have not been "acted on", so I thought I would forward my remarks to you in written format.

Good morning! My name is Chris DeRosa. I am one of the co-coordinators of the Redistricting Issues Committee of the League of Women Voters of Virginia.

The League has long supported a fair, non-partisan, transparent redistricting process. We encourage all Virginians to participate in this process. As such, we are hosting a Redistricting Information Session this Thursday, April 29<sup>th</sup> @ 7 p.m. as part of the national League's Redistricting Day of Action. All Virginians, including the members of this Commission and DLS staff are invited to join us at this virtual event.

Now for a few comments for the Commission:

**To ensure full transparency**, the League suggests 3 simple things that will assure the public that you are operating in full sunshine.

First, we ask that the Commissioners appear in Gallery View. In 3 meetings, we have only seen a handful of you on our screens; we want to see all of you!

Second, please publish the "chats" on the DLS website.

Third, we suggest that the Commission provide closed captioning during meetings to reach Virginians who are currently unable to access your meetings.

**Next,** the League encourages the Commission to take advantage of the extra time you have been granted due to the census delay.

Please schedule public hearings beginning in early summer, rather than waiting until July and August. Hearings should be concluded before you receive the census data in mid-August. Remember to publicize the hearings widely, in different languages, and with timely notice to the public.

We recommend that these hearings be held in person as well as virtually, and in all corners of the Commonwealth. Many Virginians may prefer to testify in person, especially those who lack access to reliable internet and technology.

**Finally,** the League suggests that the Commission devote a portion of every meeting to discussion. Ask questions. Respond to citizens' questions and comments. Yes, this may require extending your meetings beyond the scheduled 120 minutes; but it would be valuable as you work towards the drawing of fair maps.

#### To the Commissioners:

I want to commend the Virginia Redistricting Commission for the thoughtful way in which it has approached its work since it was organized. In the spirit of full disclosure, I will note that I have worked with several organizations in support of redistricting reform for more than a decade and also applied to be a citizen member of the commission. However, I am submitting this comment as a private citizen, drawing on my experience as a former journalist who has provided communications support to several non-profit organizations.

I commend the commission's decision to create two subcommittees to facilitate its organizational work, and am pleased that one of those subcommittees will focus specifically on the important work of citizen engagement.

When she proposed creating the subcommittees at the commission's April 26 meeting, Co-Chair Greta Harris said the Citizen Engagement Subcommittee's tasks would include devising an "advertising plan" for promoting the commission's meetings and public hearings. Ms. Harris may have used that term casually, but I wanted to respond more specifically on budgeting for advertising, per se.

When the Division of Legislative Services reviewed the commission's budget at the April 12 commission meeting, it reported that the Redistricting Commission Selection Committee had already spent \$160,516, or 15 percent of the budget for this fiscal year, on advertising to encourage citizens to apply for the commission. The retired judges on the committee were clearly committed to making the commission as diverse as possible and reaching out to all parts of the commonwealth. Further, the judges and DLS staff faced very tight deadlines for developing a communications strategy.

The fact that 1,238 Virginians applied for the commission demonstrated that "the system" did, in fact, work. However, I doubt whether paid advertising played much of a role, if any, in the decision of persons to apply. I suspect most applicants were encouraged by someone they knew, read stories or editorials in newspapers, saw a televised news report, received an email from an organization that was committed to redistricting reform, or saw a social media post by one of these groups or a personal friend. As it plans its communications strategy, it might be helpful for the commission to review how its own eight citizen members found out about the application process and decided to apply.

The commission *will* likely have to deal with advertising requirements as they relate to its procurements. However, I believe there is no requirement that the commission spend its precious dollars on advertising, per se. A better use of the funds would be to bolster the communications capabilities of the DLS staff by contracting for public relations support and/or spending the funds to improve the commission's website and update it regularly. Advocacy groups—such as the League of Women Voters, OneVirginia 2021, the National Black Non-partisan Redistricting Organization, the Virginia Citizens Engagement Table and others--stand ready to help the commission publicize its meetings and public hearings. Making better use of these existing

networks—and addressing any gaps that may exist—would be a more efficient and effective use of the commission's limited time and funds and help us all involve as many Virginia citizens as we can.

As it begins its work, the Citizen Engagement Subcommittee may find it helpful to reach out to advocacy groups to better understand the nature of their own "reach" and how the commission could work more collaboratively with them to achieve their mutual goals. This could also be done more formally through an online survey, the solicitation of public comments, or scheduling a public hearing with subcommittee members to address that specific question. That kind of upfront planning should serve the commission well down the road, and save the commission from having to "reinvent wheels" that are already rolling.

## Introduction

## Background

In 2020, a Virginia constitutional amendment to end gerrymandering in the state was passed and a Virginia Redistricting Commission was established. The Virginia Redistricting Commission's mission is to redraw Virginia's election maps for both its congressional districts and for its state legislative delegates. Public comments on the redistricting process are being encouraged by the Commission.

## Redrawing of Virginia Election Maps

The overriding principle for redrawing Virginia's election maps should be that it is "data driven" not partisan driven. This implies that key demographic factors such as ethnicity/race, industry/occupation and educational levels of residents should be driving forces in shaping the new election maps.

## **Redistricting Criteria**

#### Overview

The drawing of Virginia's new congressional district maps should be guided by the following criteria:

- 1. Incorporate the concept of communities of interest/communities of place
- 2. Their land areas must be contiguous and be of equal population as much as possible
- 3. Allow for racial fairness
- 4. Don't give a partisan edge
- 5. Preserve existing geographic boundaries
- 6. Reflect the U.S. census data as concerns the number of congressional districts allocated to Virginia.
- 7. The land area chosen for each new congressional district map should be reflective of key demographics.

## 1) Communities of Interest/Communities of Place

The *Virginia Redistricting Commission* has established that one of the criteria for redrawing any Virginia election maps is that the maps reflect "communities of interest" or "communities of place". The *National Conference of State Legislatures* (NCSL) has also established this criterion for every state in the United States. Communities of interest share similar historical, cultural, or economic interests. **However, they should not be defined by political affiliation.** 

Wikipedia defines a community of place as such:

"A community of place or place-based community is a <u>community</u> of people who are bound together because of where they reside, work, visit or otherwise spend a continuous portion of their time." Such a community can be a <u>neighborhood</u>, <u>town</u>, <u>coffeehouse</u>, <u>workplace</u>, <u>gathering</u> <u>place</u>, <u>public space</u> or any other geographically specific place that a number of people share, have in common or visit frequently...."

# 2) Contiguous Space and Equal Populations

Per past U.S. Supreme Court rulings, each congressional district's land area must be contiguous and each district within the same state must be of approximately equal size in population. In the case of Virginia,

this implies that each newly designed district's population must be within a 5% +/- range of one-eleventh of Virginia's current population (currently at **784,201**). At the present time, the following Virginia congressional districts do NOT fall within a 5% +/- range of 784,201: VA-01, VA-02, VA-05, VA-09, VA-10.

## 3) Racial fairness

The redrawn congressional district maps should not intend to or have the effect of diluting the power of minority voters or their ability to elect candidates of their choice.

## 4) No Political Party / Candidate Advantages

The newly redrawn Virginia congressional district maps must not give a partisan edge or advantage to any one political party, candidate or incumbent.

## 5) Preserve Existing Geographic Boundaries

The newly redrawn Virginia congressional district maps should adhere to the guideline of not splitting existing city, town, or county boundaries as much as possible.

## 6) Reflex U.S. Census 2020 data

Unless the U.S. census data 2020 for Virginia indicates otherwise, the number of Virginia congressional districts will remain at eleven (11).

## 7) Reflective of Key Demographics

The newly drawn congressional district maps must take into consideration percentage breakdowns of the following demographics:

- a) Race/Ethnicity % Distribution (White, Black, Hispanic, Asian, etc.)
- b) Industries and Occupations
- c) Urban/Rural breakdown
- d) Education (Enrollment/Level of Educational Achievement)

# Proposed Strategy for Redrawing Virginia's Congressional District Maps

## Overview

The proposed strategy for redrawing Virginia's congressional district maps is based on a **hub-and-spoke** architecture where the hubs are Virginia's 25 most-populated counties and the spokes are adjacent smaller populated counties. The proposed overall congressional district maps architecture is modeled after how the **Virginia Association of Counties -Regions** ("**VACo**") is organized which currently has thirteen designated state regions and a subset (80+) of all existing counties in the state of Virginia.

## District Architecture -the Hubs

Virginia's 25 most populated counties represent significant communities of interest and place and account for two-thirds of Virginia's total population. These counties can be used as the <u>hubs</u> for any new congressional districts because that is where:

- Most people live in Virginia
- Highest concentration of schools exists
- Highest concentration of jobs and industries exist
- The largest collection of major shopping centers occurs
- Where many major religious centers are located
- And further these counties provide a wide-array of government products and services to their residents and neighboring smaller counties (e.g.; Police, Courts, Utilities, Election Polling Locations & Libraries).

## District Architecture – The Spokes

Each district hub will have attached to it adjacent smaller populated counties going out in wider arcs until a congressional district population of one-eleventh of the total population of Virginia is achieved. The total population of Virginia as of 2020 was: **8,626,210**. The total population of the twenty-five (25) most populated counties in Virginia is: **5,756,900**.

Candidates for the adjacent counties must satisfy the following criteria:

- Either be adjacent to the congressional district hub and/or each other to be in compliance with the "contiguous" rule.
- Should have similar demographics as much as possible as regards:
  - a) Race/Ethnicity % Distribution (White, Black, Hispanic, Asian, etc.)
  - b) Industries and Occupations
  - c) Urban / Rural breakdown
  - d) Education (Enrollment/Level of Educational Achievement)

## Candidate Virginia Congressional Districts to be Redrawn / Rationale

The overriding rationale for redrawing the map for any particular Virginia congressional district is to have its demographic attributes fall within a 95 % to 105% range of the averages for those demographic attributes for all of the state congressional districts.

The demographic attributes recommended to be used as benchmarks for redistricting are:

- 1. Urban versus Rural percentage breakdown of a congressional district
- 2. Congressional District Population (use actual count not averages)
- 3. Land Area (square miles)
- 4. Median Household Income
- 5. Race/Ethnicity %s Distribution (White, Black, Hispanic, Asian, etc.)

## **VA-01 Congressional District**

Rationale for redrawing district's map:

- <u>Current population</u> not within 95% to 105% of 1/11 of Virginia's total population. Has an excess of **48,945** current residents.
- <u>District's Urban Land Area</u> is **69.54%** and deviates from the state-wide average of **75.51%** by a negative **5.97%**.
- <u>Current Percentage (%) of White Residents</u> exceeds the state-wide average by 6.83%.

## **VA-02 Congressional District**

Rationale for redrawing district's map:

- <u>Current population</u> not within 95% to 105% of 1/11 of Virginia's total population; shortfall of **52,070** residents.
- <u>District's Urban Land Area</u> exceeds the state-wide average by **16.99%**.

#### VA-05 Congressional District

Rationale for redrawing district's map:

- <u>Current population</u> not within 95% to 105% of 1/11 of Virginia's total population; shortfall of **40,231** residents.
- <u>District's Urban Land Area</u> falls short of the state-wide average by **40.21%**.
- Entire Land Area is 10,030 square miles that exceeds all of the other Virginia congressional districts total land areas. VA-05 is larger in area than six US states (Vermont, New Jersey, Rhode Island, Connecticut, Delaware, and New Hampshire).
- Current Percentage (%) of White Residents exceeds the state-wide average by **9.41%**.
- Current Percentage (%) of Hispanic Residents falls short of the state-wide average of **5.5%**.

#### **VA-06 Congressional District**

Rationale for redrawing district's map:

- <u>District's Urban Land Area</u> falls short of the state-wide average by **11.17%**.
- Current Percentage (%) of White Residents exceeds the state-wide average by 18.07%.
- Current Percentage (%) of Black Residents falls short of the state-wide average by 7.83%.

## **VA-08 Congressional District**

Rationale for redrawing district's map:

- <u>District's Urban Land Area</u> exceeds the state-wide average by **24.2%**.
- Current Percentage (%) of White Residents falls short of the state-wide average by 9.49%.
- Current Percentage (%) of Hispanic Residents exceeds the state-wide average by 9.74%.
- Current Percentage (%) of Asian Residents exceeds the state-wide average by 6.51%.

## **VA-09 Congressional District**

Rationale for redrawing district's map:

- <u>Current population</u> not within 95% to 105% of 1/11 of Virginia's total population shortfall of **71,919** residents.
- <u>District Urban Land Area</u> falls short of the state-wide average by **33.76%**.
- <u>Current Percentage (%) of White Residents</u> exceeds the state-wide average by **25.62%**.
- Current Percentage (%) of Black Residents falls short of the state-wide average by 8.33%.
- Current Percentage (%) of Hispanic Residents exceeds the state-wide average by 9.74%.
- Current Percentage (%) of Asian Residents exceeds the state-wide average by 6.51%.

#### **VA-10 Congressional District**

Rationale for redrawing district's map:

- <u>Current population</u> not within 95% to 105% of 1/11 of Virginia's total population; excess of **81,696** residents.
- District Urban Land Area exceeds the state-wide average by 10.02%.
- Current Percentage (%) of Black Residents falls short of the state-wide average by 12.62%.
- Current Percentage (%) of Asian Residents exceeds the state-wide average by 8.96%.

#### **VA-11 Congressional District**

Rationale for redrawing district's map:

- <u>District Urban Land Area</u> exceeds the state-wide average by **24.46%**.
- Current Percentage (%) of White Residents falls short of the state-wide average by 15.79%.
- <u>Current Percentage (%) of Hispanic Residents</u> exceeds the state-wide average by **9.43%.**
- Current Percentage (%) of Asian Residents exceeds the state-wide average by 13.81%.

## Demographics Data Collection/Organization

As of March, 2021, I have downloaded U.S census data for 2019 for the state of Virginia as it pertains to the existing congressional districts of Virginia and its twenty-five most populated counties. The data has been organized into a set of multiple separate Microsoft Excel 2019 workbooks. Each Excel workbook contains multiple worksheets presented in several formats; raw data, data ranges, tabular and charts (e.g., funnel charts) The data that has been captured includes:

- Congressional district population counts, median incomes and land areas in square miles
- Current political party representing the Congressional district
- Urban/Rural Percentage breakdowns of Congressional districts
- Congressional district ethnicity percentages and population counts
- Congressional district educational levels and resident counts
- Congressional district income brackets and resident counts
- Congressional district industry types and corresponding employment counts
- County population counts, median incomes and land areas in square miles
- County ethnicity percentages and population counts
- Henrico County Programs & Services
- Compilation of a list of all the community colleges in Virginia; enrollment counts and location

We are writing to you about the Commission's "Revised Draft Proposed Timeline" presented at the March 30, 2021, Commission meeting. We are particularly concerned with the public participation provisions in the Timeline.

The proposed Timeline is an important first step, but it needs to be fleshed out to provide more detail and more specific deadlines. A more detailed Timeline will ensure the Commission and the public have a clear understanding of the steps in the process—and the role that citizens will play at every step. Clear public participation guidelines are needed so that citizens can provide input that is both useful and timely. The comments and suggestions that follow are based on the expected receipt of 2020 Census data information in mid-August when the 45-day "clock" begins to tick.

First, the "Administrative Decision Points" listed in the March 30 Timeline, including the Public Participation Guidelines, need to be finalized and publicized no later than the end of April.

We also suggest that several tasks regarding the submission of Communities of Interest (COI) maps be moved earlier on the draft Timeline to ensure the public has time to provide useful input well before the map drawing process begins in mid-August. Specifically, we suggest that the public participation guidelines for map drawing should be completed by the end of May. Public hearings to receive input should be completed at least a month sooner than indicated in the timeline, e.g., on or about June 30.

These suggestions are important because citizen input is central to protecting communities of interest, one of the criteria to be used in the map drawing. Protecting communities with similar interests from being split up is essential to making sure that communities have fair representation. There will be many valuable inputs from individuals and good government groups regarding how they define their communities. Analyzing all inputs and presenting them to the Commission in a useful way will take a considerable amount of time and effort and is but one aspect of the effort necessary to prepare for the map drawing process.

We suggest the Commission consider increasing the number and duration of Commission meetings to broaden the opportunity for public engagement. We support the recommendation of Erin Corbett of the Virginia Civic Engagement Table that some Commission meetings occur during the evening when working citizens are available. Meetings should include time for the Commissioners to discuss and respond to public comments.

The Commission website is an essential means to communicate with the public and encourage public engagement; it should be updated as soon as possible. As required by Virginia law, the website must be able to "disseminate information about the Commission's activities" and "be capable of receiving comments by the citizens." We refer you to the suggested website improvements listed in our March 23 letter; these suggestions are based on our analyses of redistricting commission websites in 5 other states.

In conclusion, we urge the Commission to provide for substantial public input in accordance with the law, such that Commission members, particularly the citizen members, can fully represent the interests of citizens of the Commonwealth. This will counterbalance the purely political considerations which have often driven redistricting in the past and will result in maps that will be seen as fair in the eyes of the citizens.

Good morning. My name is Ken Chasin and I live in Charlottesville. I am a retired Information Technology professional and one of my areas of expertise is data analysis.

I would like to comment on the process and timeline the Redistricting Commission is using to redraw if needed the state's election maps.

The public was informed in the Commission's prior Zoom meeting of three facts:

- 1. Training for Redistricting Commission members and staff on how to use the mapping software chosen will be sometime in May.
- 2. The U.S. 2020 Census data for Virginia will arrive sometime in mid-August to September and
- 3. Once the 2020 Census data arrives, the Redistricting Commission and its staff has been given <u>45 days</u> to analyze existing state election maps for gerrymandering and redraw the state election maps as needed.

Well, Virginia has a total of **151** distinct election maps for the:

- 11 Virginia congressional districts
- 40 Virginia state senators (representing an equal number of single-member constitutional districts) and
- 100 Virginia House of Delegate members

Assuming the worst-case scenario that all of Virginia's election maps will have to be at the very least modified (or perhaps completely redrawn) this means the Redistricting Commission would have to produce a daily average of 3.35 new or modified election maps once the 45-day mapping period begins!

I would like to recommend that sometime in May after the mapping software training has been completed that the Redistricting Commission develop a preliminary set of new election maps using the U.S. Census data for Virginia from the "American Community Survey 2019 5-year estimates" Then once the US census data for 2020 is received, modify as needed the preliminary set of maps.

I myself have done a considerable amount of demographic data analysis using the U.S. Census data for Virginia from the "American Community Survey 2019 5-year estimates which I used to build a set of Microsoft Excel dashboards and charts.

Our House, Senate, and Congressional districts are currently labeled in a manner that is very confusing. Each set of districts is numbered beginning with number one. As a result, there are 3 districts 1-11 (House, Senate, and Congressional) and 2 districts 12-40 (House and Senate). Only districts 41-100 are clearly identifiable as House districts.

I respectfully request that once you have established our new districts, you rename them so there is no longer any question which district one is referring to. My suggestion going forward is:

House and Senate districts would be labeled consecutively. If the final plan includes 100 House districts and 40 Senate senate districts, for instance, the House districts would be labeled 1-100 and the Senate districts would be labeled 101-140. These numbers would be adjusted of course depending on the actual number of districts in the final plan.

Congressional districts would be lettered A-K (adjusted for the actual number of congressional districts in the final plan).

This would make references to the districts so much easier to understand.

#### Dear Commission:

I don't know where you are in the process of district re-drawing for districts of Virginia General Assembly or US Congress. However, I hope you will consider the use of Planning Districts as a basis for common interests. In general, these districts have a history in Virginia of bringing regions together to work on common problems, and thus there is not only a geographic rationale but a working relationship as communities with common interests and a history of working on these interests. I have attached more detailed comments.

The Thomas Jefferson Planning District (TJPDC) of Charlottesville, Albemarle, Nelson, Greene, Louisa, Fluvanna demonstrates the current status of how split a common interest area may be. There are 9 legislators representing this "area" (5 delegates and 4 senators). Parts of TJPDC in the Central Piedmont share legislators from districts across the Blue Ridge (Avoli, Hanger and Deeds) and as far south as the Lynchburg area (Peake, Farriss) and as far east as Richmond (Carter) and to the north east, Spotsylvania (Reeves). I have participated in the League of Women Voters' excellent mapmaking training, but I find the scale of districts of common interest too small as compared to size of congressional or legislative districts.

Our area is but one example where communities of interest have been split into many different districts that do not represent common interests or even common geography. I hope your map drawing will seek to make sure that lines are drawn based on true interests, rather than political parties, and of course include the other criteria as well.

While drawing political district drawing challenges, like assembling a jigsaw puzzle, I propose for a start that you utilize the boundaries of Planning Districts (PDs) as a basis for creating communities of interest, combining PDs and/or portions of PDs to fit the needed population base for General Assembly districts and Congressional Districts.

https://www.dhcd.virginia.gov/pdcs Within their PDs, these communities have worked with each other and generally share common interests and certainly a common geography.

The criteria for redistricting includes contiguous land "preserving communities of interest; ... contiguous territory; ... compact territory; ... does not unduly favor or disfavor any political party." Important also are the requirements not to dilute the voting power of minority communities. For example, the Virginia Piedmont is one such "community of interest."

Planning districts of contiguous counties and cities have historically provided forums for the individual cities and counties to work together on issues of common interest, including housing, transportation, water quality, air quality, and other planning issues. Because the Planning Districts are creations of the state government, using their structure as a template with which to work on redistricting, including potentially combining areas such as or adjacent portions as Congressional districts or state legislative districts, seems appropriate.

For example, Charlottesville and Albemarle County are part of the Thomas Jefferson Planning District 10, which also includes Counties of Nelson, Louisa, Fluvanna, and Greene. The Rappahannock-Rapidan District 9 encompasses Madison, Orange, Culpeper, Rappahannock, and Fauquier. From past census, I understand 768,588 is the ideal size for congressional districts. Clearly for Congressional districts, each PDC alone is too small — TJPDC, 235,000; Rappahannock-Rapidan District, 164,209. But combined, they are almost 400,000. Possibly the two could be combined with another PD to the west or south.

TJPD 10 serves a broad community through Charlottesville's University of Virginia, Piedmont Virginia Community College, the UVA Medical Complex, and a regional library system. To the North, the Rappahannock Rapidan District is served by Germanna Community College and local hospitals but many residents depend on the UVA Medical Complex for acute and critical care. PD 9 serves Madison, Orange, Culpeper, Fauquier, and Rappahannock. PD 9 and 10 (excepting Nelson County) are served by the Culpeper Transportation District. The metropolitan planning districts – utilized for federal funding -- are also developed by looking at the planning districts.

Clearly, the current state legislative districting is awry when districts cross major barriers, like the mountains, and thus serve different issues. For example, while Charlottesville and Staunton

are both cities, Charlottesville and the Central Virginia Piedmont face issues different from those of Staunton and the Shenandoah Valley communities.

The Thomas Jefferson Planning District (TJPDC) of Charlottesville, Albemarle, Nelson, Greene, Louisa, Fluvanna demonstrates the current status of how split a common interest area may be. There are 9 legislators representing this "area" (5 delegates and 4 senators). Parts of TJPDC in the Central Piedmont share legislators from districts across the Blue Ridge (Avoli, Hanger and Deeds) and as far south as the Lynchburg area (Peake, Farriss) and as far east as Richmond (Carter) and to the north east, Spotsylvania (Reeves). See <a href="https://tjpdc.org/your-state-legislators/">https://tjpdc.org/your-state-legislators/</a> As to Congressional districts, all TJPD except for Louisa is in a district that stretches from portions of Fauquier to the north to Danville and the North Carolina border. Louisa County is in the 7<sup>th</sup> Congressional District.

Because Planning Districts meet regularly, the members of various governing bodies have worked together on common issues. Members of the elected bodies know each other through this work which often includes infrastructure issues like transportation, water supply and thus water quality issues, air quality, land use management and planning, and conservation issues.

What physical or manmade barriers should exclude the joining of land masses together in Districts? Lands that are adjacent but separated by mountains or bodies of water should not be joined. The Eastern Shore of Virginia because of population may need to be joined to a mainland area. Otherwise, keeping areas in Northern Virginia, the Shenandoah Valley, Piedmont, Southside, near- and far-southwest Virginia should be practicable.

Thus, I urge the Commission to consider using the Planning Districts as the building blocks for General Assembly or Congressional districts.





Dear Ms. Harris and Ms. Babichenko,

Congratulations on being elected the co-chairs of Virginia's new Redistricting Commission at the January 21, 2021, Commission meeting. We greatly appreciate your commitment to lead this historic effort to draw fair maps through a bipartisan, transparent process. As citizens who worked the last four years to advocate for the creation of the Redistricting Commission, we look forward to supporting your important work.

Drawing new district maps for the United States House of Representatives, the Virginia Senate, and the House of Delegates is a major undertaking that requires a substantial knowledge base on the part of each Commissioner. The Commission must draw fair district maps that adhere to substantive and procedural requirements contained in the Federal and State Constitutions and law. This includes completing numerous logistical and substantive tasks, ranging from the relatively simple (e.g., how to run a public meeting) to the complex (e.g., how to identify communities of interest, and how to draw district maps). The Commission began to tackle these issues at the January meeting with an excellent initial discussion of the work tasks of the Commission as well as the training needs of Commissioners.

The Division of Legislative Services staff indicated a number of resources that they will provide to the Commission. One of these was the National Conference of State Legislatures' "Red Book" which discusses redistricting from a national perspective.

We also recommend the work of the Princeton Gerrymandering Project, a nonpartisan effort to develop tools for drawing district maps that will withstand judicial scrutiny. The Princeton Gerrymandering Project staff is well versed in redistricting issues in Virginia and has published "A Citizen's Guide to Redistricting in Virginia (the "Guide") at <a href="https://gerrymander.princeton.edu/virginia-report">https://gerrymander.princeton.edu/virginia-report</a>.

The Guide includes a thorough overview of the recent history of redistricting in Virginia as well as information on a comprehensive framework for the Commission's work and step-by-step recommendations the Commission can use as it moves forward in developing a workplan. Also, the Guide can provide useful information to assist in identifying and meeting the in-depth training needs of the Commissioners on all aspects of the redistricting process. This includes training on how to organize and conduct meetings and hearings; Virginia's map-drawing criteria; the Federal Voting Rights Act; advanced use of census data, and training and practice in using software to draw maps.

During the January 21<sup>st</sup> meeting, there was discussion among the Commissioners about training needs. We appreciate that the Commission recognizes the necessity for training on all aspects of the redistricting process. All training sessions should occur at regular public meetings to ensure that all members of the Commission receive the same training, and so that the public can fully understand and participate in the map drawing process later this year.

The Guide also makes recommendations regarding the substantial public involvement and transparency requirements of the Constitutional Amendment and enabling legislation. Establishing rules governing public communication will be important for maintaining full transparency. Transparency rules will need to cover public communication with, and between Commission members, especially when it occurs outside public Commission meetings. The Commission discussed this issue at length during the January meeting.

We applaud the decision of the Commission and the Division of Legislative Services to specify in writing what constitutes proper and improper communication both between and among Commission members and between and among Commission members and nonmembers, including other legislators, staff, consultants, and members of the public. This document should also define what constitutes allowable "internal communications" between Commission members, staff and consultants; and explain how such communications will be included in the public record as required by law.

A Commission web site is an essential component of the public involvement and transparency requirements; and we understand that contractor work has begun to create such a web site. We urge that the web site be interactive to provide information to the public on all aspects of the Commission's work, and to facilitate public comment and input on that same work. We suggest that the web site include a feature that allows citizens to sign up for notifications of upcoming Commission meetings and new web site postings.

The January meeting also included a brief discussion regarding the possible use by Commissioners of the "chat" feature during the public video meetings of the Commission. We urge the Commission to weigh this option carefully so that any use of the "chat" feature will not undermine the requirement that the work of the Commission take place in public.

Finally, we recognize that successfully meeting the objectives of the Commission is likely to require resources beyond those already made available to the Commission. The Commission should not hesitate to ask the legislature to provide additional resources so that the Commission can fully execute its mandate, a goal we all share.

We are writing to discuss the Virginia Redistricting website.

The Commission and the Division of Legal Services are directed by § 30-396 of the Code of Virginia to develop a website to facilitate public participation in the work of the Commission. This is an important component of the transparency requirements of the Amendment because the website will be one of the main methods of communication between the citizens and the Commission.

We have reviewed redistricting commission websites from other state and offer the following suggestions for the Virginia website which we believe will be helpful. They are offered from the citizens' point of view. We appreciate your consideration of these suggestions.

## Thoughts on the Virginia Redistricting Commission Website Philosophy and Implementation

The website should meet the needs of citizens with a range of knowledge of redistricting: those who do not have experience with governing, politics and redistricting; those who are somewhat familiar with the process; and those who are highly engaged in state governance. The website should be up to date, intuitive, and easy to use for all users with help/how-to/FAQ section, including guidance for less tech-savvy users. Accommodation for disabled, impaired and non-computer users should be included in the design.

This website should be a one-stop-shop. In addition to enabling and augmenting the work of the Commission, the website should provide references to pertinent information and educational resources, such as Federal and Virginia governance (e.g. relevant pages from Virginia's Legislative Information Services), relevant reading lists, and good governance organizations (e.g. League of Women Voters, Brennan Center for Justice, Princeton Gerrymandering Project).

The website should also clearly describe how citizens can participate in the process – through submitting comments and viewing and/or participating in Commission meetings. These features should be easy to access and well documented.

Time is short. Therefore, the website should be implemented quickly. To accomplish this, the website could be released in phases, with basic functionality released first, and more advanced features coming later. If practical, placeholders could be placed on web pages to indicate not-yet-completed features.

## The Redistricting Commission website should include the following information:

- 1. All legal requirements for map drawing and approval, and commission procedures

- 7. Procedures whereby citizens can provide comments, including definition of the legally permissible methods of contacting the Commission
- 8. All public comments received, whether associated with a Commission meeting or not, should be searchable by keywords to facilitate use by the Commission and the public
- 9. Identification of public commenters should be limited to first name, last name and zip code (or town/city); email and street addresses should not be included
- 10. Meeting minutes or videos, handouts, maps, and other materials discussed at meetings
- 11. A subscription service such that citizens can automatically be notified of meetings, events, and other news
- 12. Links/references to good governance advice on redistricting

## **Survey of Other State Redistricting Commission Websites**

The following page is a spreadsheet evaluating commission websites of 5 states with independent redistricting commissions. We have rated each website on the features described in the preceding section using a scale of 1 (insufficient) through 5 (most functional).

## Conclusion

Virginia has an opportunity to set a standard with its redistricting commission website. We hope these suggestions and the accompanying spreadsheet highlighting other states' redistricting commission websites will be useful in doing so.

I have developed a redistricting strategy proposal for Virginia's congressional districts which I emailed to the Commission last week. This proposal lays out seven (7) criteria for drawing Virginia's new congressional district maps and are in agreement with the criteria set forth by the Virginia Redistricting Commission, US Supreme Court rulings concerning redistricting/gerrymandering and criteria used by other states for redistricting. The seven criteria very briefly are:

- Incorporate the concept of communities of interest/communities of place 1.
- Ensure that the congressional districts' land areas be contiguous and be of equal population as much as possible
- Allow for racial fairness
- Don't give a partisan edge
- Preserve existing geographic boundaries of city, town, and counties
- Reflect U.S. census data as concerns the number of congressional districts allocated to Virginia and
- The land area chosen for each new congressional district map should be reflective of key demographics.

As Virginians who support fair redistricting and transparency in government, we were delighted to receive the release of the draft timeline for your work over the next year. - 5. Do you plan to communicate with the public through traditional media, social media, email, or more frequent updates to the website? If so, how?
- 6. How will you organize your inbox so that public feedback doesn't get overlooked? Would you consider hiring a third party to develop a portal for this input?
- 7. Will you reach out to individuals or organizations who specialize in fair and equitable redistricting to supplement your training?
- 8. Will you conduct direct outreach to diverse communities across Virginia to ensure that the Commission receives a full picture of the Commonwealth? If yes, what is your plan?
- 9. What will be your policy on attending public events organized by groups or individuals in which community mapping concerns are being addressed?

- 10. Do you plan to reach out or would you consider reaching out to other commissions or subject matter experts other than those listed in the draft timeline?
- 11. How many public hearings do you plan to conduct? Are you able to do more if they are in a virtual format?

I, Jeffrey C. Jacobs, a citizen of the Commonwealth of Virginia, do respectfully request that the Redistricting Commission establish the following 3 guiding principles when designing our new districts. I am aghast that no-one from the fastest-growing region of the Commonwealth, the Dulles Tech Corridor, is not on this committee so I hope my words can express what the silent voices of a forgotten region wish to express.

I wish for this committee to adapt 3 core principles that are of hierarchical importance:

### 1) Respect the Voting Rights Act:

Make sure areas of large minority communities have at least 55% representation in their district, such that the result is out of 100 districts (i.e. the House of Delegates) there be 19%–20% of seats me majority African-American and 4%–5% be Latino-American.

#### 2) Political Efficiency

Make sure there are no wasted votes. Try to make as many districts as possible competitive. A 50%/50% district is an idea and a 60%/40% wastes 10% of votes since only 50% is needed to win a district and the other 10% could have just stayed home. Also, Districts, be they House, Senate, or Congress, should be efficient and represent the statewide will of the people. In analyzing the last twelve years of electoral data in the Commonwealth, we can clearly see a properly destricted House of Delegates should expect to have 51% Democrats, 48% Republicans with one seat that could go to a third party or to either of the two major parties. I expect districts following the census to follow this 51/48 principle.

#### 3) Compact

Mathematicians define a circle as the most compact region. It has the lowest perimeter for unit area of any shape. Obviously, not all districts can be circles. However, I would demand of my Redistricting Commission that they follow the simple  $C/2\pi A$  metric, where the closer to 1 your districts are, the more compact they are. Thus, try to minimize the Compactness metric to keep all values as close to 1 as possible and to use an algorithm to maximize that metric.

All that said, I'm a software engineer, and I can tell you machine learning and game theory would be perfect to solve this problem, respect the VRA, maximize political efficiency, and be compact. I hope the commission will consider this route to make itself redundant and give ourselves the fairest districts possible!

Thank you for your e-mail requesting the issue I wish to raise with the Redistricting Commission.

I ask — and urge — the Commission to disqualify Mr. Gilliam and Mr. Feliciano because of inherent conflicts of interests faced by each of them.

Mr. Feliciano's expression of such unbridled support for President Trump ("GREATEST PRESIDENT IN MODERN DAY HISTORY") and in Mr. Trump's unfounded assault on the results of the 2020 presidential election indicate he is incapable of rendering clear judgment untainted by partisan bias. His comments were part of his Twitter account which had been deleted but were reported by The Virginia Mercury on January 5.

Mr. Gilliam has, according to VPAP, donated \$927,019 to candidates — almost all to Republicans — over the years, including to more than 40 candidates for the General Assembly. That includes a total of \$33,500 to his current Delegate, Israel O'Quinn. Such personal investment in districts to be considered by the Commission create the appearance that Mr. Gilliam would be unable to participate fairly in redistricting of the General Assembly.

I am looking forward to watching as the first Virginia Redistricting Commission to include citizens holds its first meeting this evening. I was very appreciative of the Selection Committee's deliberations in choosing these eight citizens and felt they were in general very careful to follow the requirements of the Statute to ensure the citizens were "as a whole, representative of the racial, ethnic, geographic, and gender diversity of the Commonwealth."

I do have concerns, however, about two of the citizen members that were selected. I understand the need to have a citizen from the large southwest region of Virginia, and that Mr. Gilliam was the only name on one of the lists that met this criteria. I also understand that contributions to a political party did not make him ineligible. His huge campaign contributions brought to light by VPAP, however, do not give us confidence that he will help to redistrict fairly with the needs of all Virginia in mind.

I also understand that Mr. Feliciano was chosen because he was the only Hispanic applicant from the lists sent to the Selection Committee and they were being very conscious of ethnic representation. I also understand they could not have known about his social media posts at that time and were relying on a recommendation by Del. Mark Cole. If there was a way in statute to remove a commissioner, that should certainly happen.

At this point, it would be to the benefit of this new Redistricting Commission if Mr. Gilliam and Mr. Feliciano would take it upon themselves to resign. New members could then be selected from Mr. Gilbert's and Mr. Norment's ;lists that would add to the number of females on the Commission. Six males and two females is certainly not gender balanced.

At the very least, neither Mr. Gilliam nor Mr. Feliciano should be considered for the position of Chairman.

#### Dear Redistricting Commission:

I would like to urge you to include the city of Roanoke in the 9th District. Roanoke is the heart of southwest Virginia. Even its airport is named Roanoke-Blacksburg. The rest of Virginia identifies with Roanoke as a gateway to southwest Virginia. Roanoke County and Roanoke are surrounded by mountains so they seem to be the essence of southwest Virginia mountains.

Also, I urge you to draw districts that are contiguous. That is, the districts should include a whole county if possible rather than dividing up one county into too many Virginia delegate or senate districts. For instance, the 12th district House of Delegates included all of Giles County which was a good thing. But, the district only included part of Blacksburg, some precincts in Radford, Fairlawn, and Pulaski District. A more equitable 12th would include all of Blacksburg and then Giles County.

My reason for advocating for contiguous districts is so that constituents in each district should feel a community connection with each other. This connection is stronger if the district is defined by its community and not by arbitrary lines.

#### Some other recommendations:

- 1. If a district is too wildly configured into lines that go here and way over there or resemble wildly shaped creatures, you can conclude it does not define a community. So, please reject these type of districts.
- 2. The closer a district resembles simple shapes like ovals, circles, squares, or rectangles the better that district will be in representing a community.
- 3. A district should have some landmark or defining area that is at the core of a district. For instance, it makes sense that Virginia Tech would be the core of the 12th District House of Delegates with surrounding areas included (such as Giles County where so many VT employees live). It makes sense that Roanoke would be the landmark for the 9th U.S. Congressional District with the other landmark being Abington on the southwest Virginia border.

So my emphasis is on creating communities with districts. Thank you for your attention to these recommendations.

Hello Selection Committee members,

Thank you in advance for your service to advance a fair and effective redistricting process. You have an incredibly important job (as I'm sure you know!) and the citizens of Virginia are counting on you to represent competing and often contradictory interests. I wish you the best in this challenging but worthy endeavor.

It was natural to see that the legislator "short list" of 64 citizens included primarily Republican citizens from rural areas and Democratic candidates from the urban areas -- since that is how our General Assembly is primarily constituted. However, I would like to suggest that you select at least one of Democratic citizen member of the commission from outside of the urban crescent area.

Why? We have significant Democratic presences in rural Virginia municipalities that should not be overlooked. Our numbers are often obscured by the existing gerrymandering that has split places like Lynchburg into two House of Delegate districts and two State Senate districts (all VERY safely Republican). However, voting within Lynchburg City limits is often very close to 50-50, and indeed went Democratic in the 2019 Presidential election, with 5-2 Democratic representation on the City Council. The message: rural Democrats exist and we should have a voice in the redistricting process.

I'm sure the reverse holds true as well, with Republican contingents in urban areas, and so I encourage you to look broadly at how to ensure a balanced representation across the entire Commonwealth.
